The Children Ministry team is looking for a permanent child care provider. We are asking volunteers to help out a little more until we find the right person. We hope all families will find this place to be a caring and nurturing place to leave their children while they have an opportunity to worship. Child care is available from 9:15 to 12:30 upstairs in the Monticello wing.

### Little Explorers: three and four year olds

Our focus for this age group is to help these little ones know and experience God's love. The room is separated into a storytelling area, worship area, and play area. Each week centers around a Bible story that is chosen because of its age-appropriateness and then is explored using art, drama, or movement activities. In September, the children will participate in stories about Creation and Noah. This class meets from 11:00 - 12:15 in Room 206.

### Children in Worship: older 4 year olds - kindergarten

This worship experience allows the children to be in an environment where age-appropriate Bible stories are shared. The children are guided through a worship service and are encouraged to respond to the stories through songs, art, questions and retelling of the stories. The children in this class will also be exploring the significance of the Lord's Supper. Parents and their children will take part in a special class September  $27^{th}$  as these children learn about this wonderful gift of Communion. More information will be available closer to the date. This class meets from 11:00 - 12:15 in Room 207.

### **Cherub** Choir

Our pre-schoolers will have the opportunity again to come together for songs, movement, dancing, instrument playing and fun this year. They will be meeting in the Chapel from 10:30 - 11:00. Thank you to *Lisa Koops* for leading this choir. The first rehearsal will be September 27 at 10:30. Post cards will be sent home to families as a reminder.

### Pathways to the Promise Land: grades 1 - 5

This year's theme of our rotation model church school, Pathways to the Promise Land, is *Witness to God's Presence*. The theme starts with Genesis and continues through the Bible as faith stories are told. The Bible is full of people who witness the very existence of God in their lives and pass that experience on to future generations. To know, feel, sense and experience God in our own personal and corporate lives is a continuing witness to that existence. We are called to share that witness.

On September 13<sup>th</sup> we will gather to celebrate the beginning of the new program year and learn about what will be explored this year. On September 20<sup>th</sup> the first rotation will begin with the theme *Creation.* The children will participate in Movement, Puppetry, and Storytelling workshops to explore that God is present in all Creation CHECK OUT THE WEBSITE www.fhcpresb.org SEE WHAT'S NEW! 7 and in turn, all of Creation acts as agents through which God expresses that presence.

The children will be divided this year in the following groups: Grade 1, Grade 2, Grade 3, and Grades 4/5.

### Youth Christian Education: grades 6 - 8

These youth will participate in our **Trailblazer** program. This program runs on a three year cycle. This year's focus is *The Word of God*. The youth will explore this theme as it is passed on to us through the Bible and the lives of the faithful. It is from theses words that we receive guidance and support as we travel on the journey of faith. From the ancient text of Genesis to the power of Revelation, God's word continues to be relevant to our lives. During the month of September the youth will participate in activities that focus on How the Bible Came to Be. This group meets in the MOB room from 9:30 - 10:30.

### Senior High Church School: grades 9-12

These youth will participate in discussions that encourage them to see how faith can be relevant in their lives. The theme for the fall will be *Creation*. The youth will explore this topic through discussions and activities around scripture, stewardship and gifts of the earth. Throughout the year this group will be given opportunities to worship at other churches at other Christian and non-Christian denominations. The Senior High Church School youth meet Sunday mornings from 9:30 - 10:30 in Bodwell Hall.

### Ministry of Justice & Mission Sponsors Bread For The World Offering of Letters

This fall, FHC's Ministry of Justice & Mission will be asking you to join in the 2009 Bread for the World Offering of Letters. Bread for the World (BFW) is an organization that includes 45 faith traditions, creating a collective Christian voice that urges Congress and other leaders to end hunger at home and abroad. BFW believes we have the resources to do this in our time. But each of us must do our part.

### Advocacy for Lasting Change

Among other things, BFW sponsors an Offering of Letters each year, where people are encouraged to write personal letters and emails to members of Congress about a particular hunger-related issue in this country or abroad. Working through churches, college campuses and other organizations, BFW engages people in advocacy. Why do they do what they do? Jesus was an advocate. So were the Old Testament prophets. They spoke out on behalf of hungry and poor people. They held their leaders accountable to do what was right. One person taking action makes a difference. Many people taking action can create lasting change.

#### **Background Information**

This year BFW is focusing NOT on getting more money for hunger relief, but on making our foreign aid more efficient and effective. Foreign assistance or foreign aid refers to the funding that the US provides to countries for a wide variety of reasons. Sometimes aid is given directly to a country's government, either in cash or "in-kind," meaning items such as tents, food or weapons. US development aid is predominately delivered by nongovernmental organizations directly to local communities to address their needs and support their development efforts.

Since the Foreign Assistance Act of 1961 was passed, there have been 400 directives added, with ~140 priorities. Over 50 US government agencies are involved in administering parts of this assistance. The Department of Defense administers 25% of the money. No one coordinates all these efforts. The top 10 recipients of our foreign aid are NOT poor countries; in fact, poor countries get only \$1 out of every \$16.

### Offering of Letters to support Congressional Initiatives

There is a huge need for reform, for a comprehensive national strategy for global development, and a need to make US foreign assistance more streamlined, accountable and transparent.

This year a bi-partisan bill, HR 2139, was introduced in the House of Representatives on May 20, that does just that. This Initiating Foreign Assistance Reform Act has been taken up by the House Foreign Affairs Committee. There are already about 83 sponsors; the goal is at least 100. This bill is a critical first step in making foreign assistance more effective, efficient & transparent.

Senate Bill 1524, the Foreign Assistance Revitalization and Accountability Act, is also a bipartisan bill that is a good first step to making our foreign assistance more effective and accountable. It calls for a comprehensive foreign assistance policy to promote global development and help reduce poverty and hunger.

### Music Notes

Does singing in a choir make you healthier? A recent study at the University of Frankfurt (Germany) demonstrates that choral singing has a positive health impact including improved lung capacity, high energy, relieved asthma, better posture, and enhanced feelings of relaxation, mood, and confidence. Singers also reported intense happiness while singing, felt less stressed, and experienced heightened adrenaline and wakefulness.

### THE CHOIRS

**Chancel Choir** (adults): 1st rehearsal will be Thursday, Sept. 10th beginning with a pot-luck supper and general frivolity at 6:45 in Fellowship Hall. Bring whatever dish you enjoy preparing (or purchasing) and we'll have a fine time getting caught up and listening to the choir president's farewell address. New choir officers will be elected (if you wish to avoid such responsibilities, it's a good idea to show up at the potluck, ahem . . .) We'll move to the choir room for rehearsal from 7:30 to 9:00 p.m. Our first choir Sunday is September 13th (rehearsal at 10:30; the service is at 11:00 a.m.).

Led by Dr. David Cooperrider, a world-renowned expert on the Appreciative Inquiry method, we envisioned and then committed to working towards a city that could become the most sustainable city in the nation by the year 2019. "Cleveland: A Green City on a Blue Lake" became the driving imaginative hook. The year 2019 was picked because it was in the year 1969 that Cleveland became known for the burning river. We want to celebrate the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary on a positive note!

"Going green" is not some fanciful environmentalist ploy. Rather, moving Cleveland towards an economy that emphasizes our greatest asset (Lake Erie) would transform our industrial base, create new jobs, bring stability to urban core neighborhoods, and change the life style and health of our citizens through recreation and play.
