Dear friends,

I returned yesterday from a wonderful two-day retreat with eleven Forest Hill adults. I am on a retreat "high"—the kind one gets when she feels like she's been to the mountaintop. The group of eleven is participating in the Faith Leader program which always begins with an opening retreat away from home. Many of you have heard about this 28-week program that takes a committed group of individuals through a multi-faceted journey in exploring their spiritual development. This is the fourth year we have offered the program at FHC. It has been a joy to witness the growth in each participant's faith and life. We spent the weekend exploring the theological and biblical concepts of our spiritual gifts, those gifts and skills that an individual outwardly expresses in his or her daily life. Do you ever get so caught up in something you love that you lose track of time? Do you forget the world around you? What do you love to do that comes naturally for you, that you are good at, and that others recognize you do well? Your answers most likely point to your spiritual gifts.

Trusting that God has gifted each of us differently, we can be assured that God wants us to love what we do! God wants us to use our gifts for the building up of the body of Christ, as well as serving the world. But God doesn't want our service to be something we dread doing. The key to the theology of spiritual giftedness is that if we are using our God-given gifts, we will be energized by our activity, not enervated.

The Nominating Committee, led by Elder Kate Burleigh, has worked diligently to identify, discern, and invite individuals into elected positions of leadership through this belief in each person's gifts. The committee is commissioned to elect officers to serve in positions that are well-matched to their spiritual gifts. A person who is wellmatched to an office that expresses his or her God-given passion is likely to love what she or he is doing, and less likely to burn out.

If you are interested in exploring what are your spiritual gifts, let me know. I would be more than happy to discuss it with you and help you uncover and claim your God-given gifts. All the gifts are essential for building up the Body of Christ, said the Apostle Paul in 1 Corinthians 12. We depend upon each other!

Little Explorers

Three and Four year olds

Julie Ann and Robert Yoe will lead this class in November. The children will explore the story of Moses after the Exodus from Miriam's viewpoint. They will participate in activities that will also explore how God's people say thank you.

Children in Worship Older four year olds and kindergarten

It is through a Covenant relationship with God that the Hebrews begin to understand how to live out their lives. They will explore this topic through discussions and activities around scripture on how this Covenant is relative to their lives.

Consecration Sunday Is Coming

Congregations that approach financial stewardship from a biblical perspective do not view the money Christians give to their church merely as a way to pay its bills. Rather, such congregations see financial contributions as a way to help people grow spiritually in their relationship with God by supporting their church's mission and ministry with a percentage of their incomes.

Our congregation's Ministry of Stewardship has selected the *New Consecration Sunday Stewardship Program* as a way to teach the biblical and spiritual principles of generous giving in our stewardship education emphasis this year.

New Consecration Sunday is based on the biblical philosophy of the need of the giver to give for his or her own spiritual development, rather than on the need of the church to receive. Instead of treating people like members of a social club who should pay dues, we will treat people like followers of Jesus Christ who want to give unselfishly as an act of discipleship. *New Consecration Sunday* encourages people toward proportionate and systematic giving in response to the question, "What percentage of my income is God calling me to give?"

During morning worship on Consecration Sunday, we are asking our attendees and members to make their financial commitments to our church's missionary, benevolent, and educational ministries in this community and around the world.

Every attendee and member who completes an *Estimate of Giving Card* does so voluntarily by attending morning worship on Consecration Sunday. We urge people to attend who feel strongly opposed to completing a card. The procedure is done in such a way that no one feels personal embarrassment if he or she chooses not to fill out a card.

We will do no home solicitation to ask people to complete cards. During morning worship our guest leader will conduct a brief period of instruction and inspiration, climaxed by members making their commitments as a confidential act of worship. We will encourage participation in Consecration Sunday events through the Consecration Sunday team and governing board members. Since we will make no follow-up visits to ask people to complete their cards, we will make every effort to inform, inspire, and commit everyone to attend Consecration Sunday worship.

Once all the tactics were completed, we engaged with Erick Brock, a talented member of our church, Heights High student and passionate artist to assist with the very important finishing touches of the room - the Noah's Ark murals. We gave him creative liberty and overnight it seems - the animals were jumping out from the walls in vibrant colors. All I can say is that when you stop by, just look at the childrens' faces. WOW!

This is a story of designers and doers with a little bit of action oriented talking. I have to say personally, it was one of the most pleasant projects I've ever been involved with and it was because of the people involved, combined with this wonderful place.

The deadline for the Tower is usually the second Monday of every month. The **TOWER** schedule is as follows: November 9, December 7 (one week early), January 11, February 8.


