Dear Friends,

The old year passes and the new year is before us. I am always reminded at the turning of the year of the words of Dag Hammerskjold, who wrote in his diary on a New Year's Eve long ago: *For all that was - Thanks! For all that is to be - Yes!*

That is a powerful way to live: between "Thanks" and "Yes." It seems to open unlimited possibilities for creativity and hope. It challenges me to think about how I live. Sometimes we leave the old year harboring regrets and resentments. Sometimes we enter the new year concerned about the future. In truth, for many of you, last year was not easy; there was death, there was sickness, there was job loss. Perhaps the best we can say is "thanks that the year is over!" In truth, for many of you, looking ahead into 2010, the word "No" seems to better describe your feelings.

I don't want to belittle any of it or simply dismiss the negative. However, as beloved children of God, we are called to see our world and to interpret our lives through a larger, more graceful perspective. It isn't just about us. To be grounded in "Thanks" and "Yes" means that we are placing our ultimate trust in a power that is larger than our personal experiences. We are placing our hope in a God who creates and restores and redeems and forgives and calls us to be in community. We are placing our lives at the feet of a God who loves us. We are placing our faith in a God who has shown us in Jesus Christ that even suffering and death does not separate us from the divine passion.

It is a discipline to see the world through the lenses of "Thanks" and "Yes." To imagine that whatever you went through is part of a larger narrative and that whatever will happen is part of a redemptive story. So in the new year, don't isolate yourself. Keep to your prayers. Read your bibles. Practice hospitality and generosity.

And, by the way, you all make it very easy for me to say "Thanks" and "Yes." For you witness to Christian hospitality and grace in so many ways. We have done so much together. You are always affirming even when critical. You love even when you disagree. You support even when you wonder. You laugh a lot and cry some too. You are creative, imaginative, dedicated and joyful. God is so good. So, thank you for a marvelous 2009 and I definitely will say "YES" to 2010. For I can imagine that the Spirit of God has much in store for us.

Ministry of Justice and Mission

Sustaining Community through "The Big Give"

Forest Hill Church's "THE BIG GIVE" faith-in-action initiative stimulated an amazing array of creative efforts by members of our congregation. It seemed appropriate, therefore, that for the final allocations of "BIG GIVE" funds, the Ministry of Justice & Mission seek suggestions from church members of small projects that would be *faith-based, local, and have a sustainability component.* The following activities will be supported in the coming year:

The Big Give Gardens – This project ties together the success of "Abundance Acres" and the ongoing needs of the FHC food pantry with the notion that locally grown food is best for our health, reduces energy use, and builds community. Our \$2,400 will help support first time gardeners in the Heights area with the purchase of basics such as tools, fertilizer and seeds. The project will offer advice on gardening techniques from experienced "Abundance Acres" volunteers, and may possibly secure a site for a larger community garden, extending such opportunities to renters and others who do not have appropriate back yards. Equipped with tools and knowledge to get closer to the earth, "BIG GIVE" gardeners will provide healthy sustainable food for their families, and will be encouraged to give back 10% of their yield to others. Steve Sedam will be creating a committee with interested persons to implement this project.

FAITHS Alive – Our ongoing connection with Boulevard School in Cleveland Heights, whereby FHC provides school supplies, books, Christmas Angel gifts, as well as hats and mittens to needy students, was the inspiration for this project. Several other churches and synagogues have adopted additional Heights schools using our original model. The goal is to match a congregation with every building. Our \$975 will be used to start a fund that school social workers can call on to assist families with special needs during these difficult financial times. Other Faith-based institutions Actively volunteering In The Heights Schools will be invited to contribute to the fund to sustain this resource in coming years. Joan Bacon has recruited a group of volunteers to coordinate the project.

Forest Hill Church's "THE BIG GIVE" initiative netted over \$13,300. Commitments to other mission projects in Greater Cleveland, the U.S. and Africa are summarized on the Kiosk in Fellowship Hall.

Cleveland Homeless Stand Down

The *INTERACT CLEVELAND 2010 HOMELESS STAND DOWN* expresses the concern of people of diverse religious backgrounds for our neighbors who spend Cleveland's winter without a home of their own. Participants, mainly single adult men and women who live in shelters or on the street, will be assisted with clothing, hot lunches, health services, and compassion from over 600 volunteers at the Cleveland Convention Center at three events – Sunday, February 7, Sunday February 28, and Friday, March 5, 2010.

There are several ways you can help with the Homeless Stand Down:

<u>Volunteer</u> to greet and register guests, guide them around the events, assist with meals or distribution of clothing and personal care items. Help is also needed with sorting donations, making name badges, and preparation and dismantling of the events. No special skills are required (although doctors, nurses, and hair stylists are welcome). Required training sessions for volunteers will be held at Pilgrim Congregational Church, 2592 W. 14th Street in Tremont on Mon. Jan. 25 (6-8PM) or Sat. Jan. 30 (10AM-Noon), *or* at Calvary Presbyterian Church, E. 79th & Euclid Avenue, on Tues. Feb. 16 (6-8PM) or Sat. Feb. 20 (10AM-Noon). Go to:

<u>www.interactcleveland.org</u> to sign up online for a specific shift and task, or call (216) 241-0230. All volunteers must sign up by <u>January</u> <u>20th</u>. If you would like to work together with others from Forest Hill, contact Scott Lafferty (440-449-2361 or <u>swlaff@sbcglobal.net</u>) or Dick Obermanns (216-752-9776 or <u>obermanns@aol.com</u>) before you fill out an application.

<u>Contribute</u> personal hygiene products vital to help men and women renew and maintain good overall health. Pack a large ziploc plastic bag with small sizes of: liquid soap, shampoo, lotion, a toothbrush & toothpaste, lip balm, deodorant, and a wash cloth. Care kits for men – who are three-fourths of the Homeless Stand Down guests – should contain a razor & shaving cream. Care kits for women should contain maxi pads and/or tampons. (Info on optional items to include will be posted at the Church.) Mark bags "M" or "F" and bring to the stage in Fellowship Hall any Sunday in January.

A Note on the Monthly Hunger Offering

The first Sunday of each month is "Hunger Sunday" at Forest Hill Church. We collect a free-will offering of cash or checks in envelopes marked "Hunger" to be used 100% for support of local hunger programs. In recent months, programs we have assisted at First Presbyterian Church of East Cleveland, and Garden Valley Neighborhood House in Cleveland, have been discontinued due to the decline of their host institutions. This in turn sadly reflects the distress of Cleveland's inner city neighborhoods. While the need continues to be great, our avenues for addressing it are diminishing.

The demand for distribution of food for hungry families is also on the increase in the Heights area. For now, we will continue to support the Heights Emergency Food Center (founded by the Heights Interfaith Council and situated at Disciples Christian Church on Mayfield Road) with the proceeds from the monthly "Hunger Sunday" collections, while considering other options by which to obey Christ's instruction to his disciples to "give them something to eat."

This letter was mailed to the FHC family in early December:

Dear Friends,

For the last year and a half the Session and the Ministry of Trustees of Forest Hill Church, Presbyterian have been investigating the conditions and maintenance needs of our building and grounds. Areas that have been thoroughly investigated include those relating to drainage, roofs, masonry, windows, doors, lighting and painting.

The Session and the Ministry of Trustees have identified issues that need immediate attention and those that will be addressed in the future. Perhaps you have seen the signs of work around the foundations of the building. The significant work necessary to solve the issues of draining water away from the building has begun. The flaking paint and leaking gutters are also problems that may have become noticeable to you. In the spring work will start on the exterior of the building to remedy these issues.

The Session and the Ministry of Trustees have also developed a financial plan to support the needed repairs and maintenance. Forest Hill Church, Presbyterian is taking out a bank loan to pay for the initial work. The premiums on the loan will be paid from the dividends of our Endowment Funds. In the New Year (2010), the Session will ask that you, the members, participate in a capital campaign to pay back the loan as well as proceed with other important building matters.

As more details come forth we will make sure to keep you informed. As with your house and so too with the "House of God," basic maintenance and repair are essential so that the vitality within the walls is expressed by the care of the walls so that mission beyond the walls can thrive.
