Is it February already? I am still trying to recover from Christmas and the busy schedule of January. Well, as they say, "times flies when you are having fun!" And it IS fun and joyful to share ministry with you. We are blessed. Thanks be to God.

However, February is the month when we are called as a Christian community to "celebrate" the season of Lent, to ponder our interior lives and to re-align our spirits with God's spirit. Lent is a season of sobriety and doing without, preparing for the darkness of Christ's crucifixion and not leaping too quickly to the certain triumph of Easter. Lent is a time of spiritual discipline and worship.

Here is the schedule of our Lenten Season at Forest Hill Church. Mark it on your calendar and journey with us as we move through the wilderness of reflection towards the light of the Resurrection.

Tuesday, February 16 - Shrove Tuesday, 6:30 p.m

Traditionally, the day before Ash Wednesday is a time for communities to have their last party. We will be holding our second annual Fat Tuesday / Mardi Gras feast. Pancakes and sausages will be served. Our Fellowship Hall will be decorated for Mardi Gras. An operetta of the delightful Dr. Seuss classic *Green Eggs and Ham* will be performed.

Wednesday, February 17 – Ash Wednesday, 7:30 p.m.

Come to the Sanctuary at 7:30 p.m. for our annual Ash Wednesday service. This is a beautiful liturgy as we impose ashes on our foreheads and remember that "we are dust and to dust we shall return." We will also begin the Lenten journey with the sacrament of Holy Communion. Note that there is no dinner before the service.

Wednesday evenings, March 3 and 17, 6:30 p.m.

All are welcome to gather in Fellowship Hall for a simple soup and bread fellowship meal before moving into the Sanctuary for vespers. These will be contemplative and beautiful services.

Thursday, April 1 – Maundy Thursday, 6:30 dinner, 7:30 worship We will commemorate Maundy Thursday, Jesus' last supper with his disciples, remembering Christ's new mandate that we are to "love one another." A meal will be served in Fellowship Hall. Those who come will be expected to offer a side dish, salad or dessert to the gathering. After dinner the very dramatic liturgy of Tenebrae will be observed and Communion will be served.

Friday, April 2 – Good Friday, 12 p.m.

Clover and I will lead our annual remembrance service in the chapel from 12 noon - 1 p.m.

Sunday, April 4: Easter Sunday, 9 and 11 a.m.

We will arise to celebrate the good news of Christ's resurrection and our liberation. Services will be held at 9:00 a.m. in the chapel and 11:00 a.m. in the Sanctuary.

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The Clover Patch

Dear friends,

I read this excerpt from comedian Steven Cobert's address to a college graduating class last spring. It was inspiring to me, and I hope you will find it inspiring as well.

So, say "yes." In fact, say "yes" as often as you can. When I was starting out in Chicago, doing improvisational theatre with Second City and other places, there was really only one rule I was taught about improv. That was, "yes-and." In this case, "yesand" is a verb. To "ves-and." I ves-and, you ves-and, he, she or it yes-ands. And yes-anding means that when you go onstage to improvise a scene with no script, you have no idea what's going to happen, maybe with someone you've never met before. To build a scene, you have to accept. To build anything onstage, you have to accept what the other improviser initiates on stage. They say you're doctors – you're doctors. And then, you add to that: We're doctors and we're trapped in an ice cave. That's the "-and." And then hopefully they "yes-and" you back. You have to keep your eyes open when you do this. You have to be aware of what the other performer is offering you, so that you can agree and add to it. And through these agreements, you can improvise a scene or a one-act play. And because, by following each other's lead, neither of you is really in control. It's more of a mutual discovery than a solo adventure. What happens in a scene is often as much a surprise to you as it is to the audience.

Well, you are about to start the greatest improvisation of all. With no script. No idea what's going to happen, often with people and places you have never seen before. And you are not in control. So say "yes." And if you're lucky, you'll find people who will say "yes" back.

Now will saying "yes" get you in trouble at times? Will saying "yes" lead you to doing some foolish things? Yes it will. But don't be afraid to be a fool. Remember, you cannot be both young and wise. Young people who pretend to be wise to the ways of the world are mostly just cynics. Cynicism masquerades as wisdom, but it is the farthest thing from it. Because cynics don't learn anything. Because cynicism is a self-imposed blindness, a rejection of the world because we are afraid it will hurt us or disappoint us. Cynics always say no. things. Saying "yes" is how things grow. Saying "yes" leads to knowledge. "Yes" is for young people. So for as long as you have the strength to, say "yes. And that's The Word.

May you say "YES-and" to all God's surprises for your life in 2010.

Children's Christian Education

Little Explorers – 3 and 4 year olds

Ministry of Justice & Mission Report on 2009 Benevolences

The Ministry of Justice & Mission is responsible for allocating the benevolence funds and other outreach gifts to specific worthy projects on behalf of the congregation of Forest Hill Church.

In 2009, we provided \$43,175 in grants to projects in the Heights area, Greater Cleveland, the U.S. and internationally, including \$13,175 raised through "The Big Give" last Spring. Projects are listed below. Several projects also received funding from FHC's endowment. In many cases, projects supported by our benevolence dollars were reinforced by gifts of our members' volunteer hours and skills, leadership by our staff, and the use of our facilities. Another \$35,000 in undifferentiated support was provided to mission of the Presbyterian Church (USA) through Presbytery, Synod, and General Assembly. Whether pursued through denomination, interfaith or other auspices, these commitments reflect our desire to show the love and justice of Jesus Christ to a community and world in need of it.

E City Means Opportunity

E CITY (Entrepreneurship: Connecting, Inspiring, and Teaching Youth) is a nonprofit organization offering entrepreneurial education to inner-city and at-risk youth, mainly through the Cleveland City Schools. It makes business education relevant to the real world, teaching Cleveland students to use their street smarts and creativity to start and operate their own small businesses. Along the way, it shows youth a new way of looking at money, life, and their own futures.

E CITY was founded by successful entrepreneur and Presbyterian elder John Zitzner in 2002. It offers students a 70-hour program developed by the National Foundation for Teaching Entrepreneurs (NFTE) of New York City, with programs in 21 states. Several hundred Northeast Ohio businesspersons help put on its programs.

Forest Hill Church made a "Big Give" grant of \$2,500 to E City and hosted an Adult Education program on their work at the end of 2009. But since the essence of the program is quality time spent with aspiring young entrepreneurs, we wish to highlight the following volunteer opportunities for Forest Hill Church members and friends:

Speak to a Class: Classroom instruction is brought to life when an entrepreneur or business professional comes in to speak to students about their jobs, inspirations, successes – and failures too.

Host a Field Trip: Real-life experience stimulates classroom learning when students tour a business and meet a person working there.

Coach a Student: Business plan coaches work one-on-one with youth to help them format presentations and prepare for class competitions.

Judge a Competition: Business plan judges provide feedback and support to students during in-class and E CITYwide competitions. Some students have also won national honors for their projects.

The Ministry of Justice and Mission encourages you to get to know New Life Community by reading the article below by Grace Uhle and by checking out the materials posted on the kiosk in the fellowship hall. NLC is one of the organizations supported through FHC benevolence funds.

New Life Community, with which Forest Hill Church has had a strong supporting connection through the years, is approaching its 20th anniversary. Located in Cleveland's Mount Pleasant neighborhood, NLC continues its mission to inspire, teach and empower homeless, jobless families to transition to self-sufficiency and celebrates the fact that it has served over 700 families, including 1300 children, since opening in 1990. Unfortunately there is a never-ending population of Clevelanders who need such services. Those now applying for this intensive, comprehensive four month residential program bring with them additional hard-to-hurdle factors, and it takes more weeks for them to find jobs and turn the dream of a better life for their children and themselves into reality. Over and over graduates of this faithmotivated program declare their gratitude for being believed in and firmly supported in their efforts to find permanent housing and work and stabilize their family situation.

A number of the families who have progressed as far as they could in Interfaith Hospitality Network have then proceeded to New Life for increased time to become self-sustaining. The two agencies cooperate in smoothing the way.

Forest Hill Church members have been instrumental in the growth and success of NLC. Tom Uhle, founder, teamed with a dedicated mission group who prayed and tended NLC's early development. Betty Stauffer was executive director for a few years and other members have rolled up their sleeves and pitched in with important volunteer jobs there. The Ministry of Justice and Mission has designated significant FHC benevolence dollars in support over these years because FHC sees it as a vital expression of care for families in our city in need of the most basic essentials for living. There are a variety of creative volunteer opportunities, both for individuals and groups, open at NLC. 1 Corinthians 13: 1-13 NRSV

If I speak in the tongues of mortals and of angels, but do not have love, I am a noisy gong or a clanging cymbal. And if I have prophetic powers, and understand all mysteries and all knowledge, and if I have all faith, so as to remove mountains, but do not have love, I am nothing. If I give away all my possessions, and if I hand over my body so that I may boast, but do not have love, I gain nothing.

Love is patient; love is kind; love is not envious or boastful or arrogant or rude. It does not insist on its own way; it is not irritable or resentful; it does not rejoice in wrongdoing, but rejoices in the truth. It bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things.

Love never ends. But as for prophecies, they will come to an end; as for tongues, they will cease; as for knowledge, it will come to an end. For we know only in part, and we prophesy only in part; but when the complete comes, the partial will come to an end. When I was a child, I spoke like a child, I thought like a child, I reasoned like a child; when I became an adult, I put an end to childish ways. For now we see in a mirror, dimly, but then we will see face to face. Now I know only in part; then I will know fully, even as I have been fully known. And now faith, hope, and love abide, these three; and the greatest of these is love.
