"Write the vision; make it plain on tablets so that a runner may read it." Habakkuk 2.2b

"There's a sweet, sweet Spirit in this place and I know that it's the Spirit of the Lord; There are sweet expressions on each face, and I know they feel the presence of the Lord." (Hymn #498 "There's a Sweet, Sweet Spirit")

Over ten years ago the Session went on a retreat to re-write the mission statement of the church. "What words describe who we are and what we want to be about?" was the question that was raised. The discussion resulted in a vision and value statement that was shaped around three key words: Discover, Celebrate, and Witness. These words are written above the dividing wall in Fellowship Hall. The mission of FHC is to help everyone who enters the door to:

- "discover" who they are as beloved children of God and deepen faith,
- "celebrate" the multitude of gifts that the Spirit has distributed among us and enjoy each other's company in fellowship and,
- "witness" to the transforming and powerful love of Jesus Christ in worship within the walls and in mission beyond the walls.

It was affirming that our guest preacher of several weeks ago, Rev. Dean Myers, complimented us on these words and commended us for living into them. Nevertheless, a church (indeed any institution) needs to revisit its vision and value statement about every 2-3 years. Are the words still descriptive? Do we still use them to shape our life together? Does a majority of the congregation know the vision and value statement?

While I believe these words continue to describe us and that most, if not all, of our programs and missions reflect these positive faithful words, I do not think that most members know them. Furthermore, the Session does not use them consciously to direct its work.

Therefore, the current Session is going through a positive process of reflection and discernment about a new statement. I am looking forward to seeing what the small writing group comes up with. Certainly whatever is written will be shared with you.

In the future each ministry will be asked to reflect upon how their work helps move the mission. Our Church Growth committee is looking into a new logo and marketing process. No doubt a fresh articulation of who we are and who we want to be will help their creativity.

As the prophet Habbakuk wrote long ago, the vision should be able to be read by someone running (or in the 21st C. driving) by – hence our new statement should be brief and bold and understandable by the passer-by.

I believe more so then ever that Forest Hill Church is on the cusp of growth and that our future on the corner of Monticello and Lee is bright. I see more children than ever, more young adults than ever, more visitors than ever. We have raised over \$550,000 for our building restoration campaign. We have welcomed a dozen new members into the church. At every Presbytery meeting Forest Hill Church is celebrated in some way as a leading congregation. Indeed there is a "sweet, sweet Spirit in this place!"

Together we do great things and I am very grateful to you and to God.
