Pilgrimage to Early Christian Sites in Asia Minor and Greece

March 25 - April 3, 2011

Join members of Forest Hill Church Presbyterian and Pastors Clover Reuter Beal and John Lentz, Ph.D. in New Testament scriptures along with Dr. Timothy Beal, Ph.D. in Hebrew scriptures for a pilgrimage to the cradle of Christianity in Asia Minor (modern Turkey) and Greece.

This is a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to explore some of the great cosmopolitan cities of the Roman Empire where the apostle Paul had great success in preaching the Gospel and where the earliest communities of Christians began to take root and flourish.

Our program is part of a series of adult continuing education and faith formation pilgrimages that began two years ago with a rich pilgrimage to the Holy Land. This program continues our journey and enables us to gain further insight into the historical and cultural context of early Christianity, putting people, events and places together. Local expert guides and our scholars-on-tour, Drs. Lentz and Beal, will open our eyes to some of the most fascinating archaeological sites in the world — such as Ephesus, Sardis, Pergamon, Istanbul, Corinth and Athens. Pastor Beal will guide us in worship at historical venues so that we journey in faith together with Paul and other visionary men and women of faith in the 1st century.

Inclusive Features

Our program includes RT airfare from Cleveland to Izmir (Turkey), from Izmir to Istanbul, from Istanbul to Athens and then from Athens back to Cleveland. We will enjoy 8 nights in first class hotels with buffet breakfast and dinner daily. Local transportation will be in deluxe motorcoach. The program includes local guides, full-time tour manager, and entrance fees per itinerary.

Child care

During the summer months there will be child care for infants through five year olds. Infants and toddlers will be in our nursery and preschool rooms. Youth Ministries

Our youth will be participating in two mission opportunities this summer. Fourteen Senior High youth will explore our faith as they participate in the *Presbyterian Youth Triennium* July 20-24 on the campus of Purdue University. The theme for the 2010 *Triennium* is "For Such a Time as This" – found in the book of Esther, 4:14. The theme will be developed throughout the week through daily presentations, worship, prayer, recreation, and small groups. It is the goal of the event to offer an experience that provides our youth with the opportunity to explore their faith and their faith practices alongside those of the past and present faith communities.

Six Mid-High youth will be participating in the *Pittsburgh Project* July 19-23. The group will spend a week in rebuilding and repairing homes in Pittsburgh neighborhoods. The youth will witness to God's great love and see God in action throughout their visit.

Restoring the Building – Reclaiming the Mission

The project is proceeding on budget and it is anticipated that the work will be completed by the end of August.

Storm Sewer - this phase has been completed

Playground – this phase has been completed

Masonry work – this phase has been completed. The masonry work that consisted entirely of tuck-pointing went well. All of the walls were sound and no loose bricks were found. None of the contingency funds were required for this phase.

Painting – after several weather delays the painting is progressing well. The exterior is being primed with oil based prime and then coated with two coats of Sherwin Williams Resilience latex. The exterior, with the exception of the window sashes, is approximately 50% complete. The painting of the sashes began June 16. No damaged wood has been found to-date. The painting with the exception of the new windows will be completed by mid-July. The new window interiors will be painted in August after they are installed.

Roofing – The roof work began on June 1. The gutters on the Lee Blvd side of Fellowship Hall have been replaced and work has started on the Lee Blvd side of the sanctuary. Some of the wood framing of the gutters has been damaged by water over the years and has now been replaced. It is expected that similar damage will exist in other parts of the building. Contingency funds will cover the cost of this work. It is anticipated that the roofing work will be completed by the end of August.

Windows – The 43 new windows, including the large sanctuary and Fellowship Hall windows, were ordered June 7. Restoration work on 81 windows has begun. The restoration work includes making the windows operational, re-glazing and painting. New storms will be installed on the 23 windows that are without storms. It is anticipated that this work will be completed by early to mid-August.

Music

This summer's exciting news is a special purchase which Barb Hansen and I made a few weeks ago. FHC is starting our own steel drum band! Barb and I drove to Akron to visit the Panyard, Inc. shop and placed an order for a lead pan, double seconds, and triple cellos—plus two small jumbie jams, cases, stands, mallets and music. We're probably the only Presbyterian church around that will have a steel drum band, so this will be a good reason to invite your friends to come to church here! This purchase was made possible by donations to the Lamont Hansen memorial fund and a gift from the endowment fund. Lamont will be smilling from heaven when he sees us gettin' in the groove with our Caribbean beat!

A quick primer: steel drums are also called pans and the jumbie jams are small pans which only cover an octave. The lead pan plays the melody and has lots of pitches on one pan. The double seconds play the alto part and require two pans because the pitches are lower and need more resonating space. The triple cellos play the tenor part and comprise three pans. We'll need an upright or electric bass player to cover the bass part—any bass players out there? And lots of percussion players, perhaps a drum set. If you are interested in learning to play the pans or would like to participate as a percussionist or bass player, please contact me (contact info below).

Many thanks to our summer guest music leaders: On July 4th, we'll have home-grown talent leading the music (Pastor Lentz and Kurt Haas on guitar, Arvid Whitmore on sax, and Caty Himmelman on clarinet). Carmen Massaro will serve as guest organist/choir director on July 11th and Lynn Balaze will serve in the same capacity on August 15 and 22. I'm always delighted to hear how hospitable the FHC folks are to our guest musicians—thank you for showing your warm appreciation to them.

My summer travel includes a week at the University of Louisville, Kentucky (Jazz Camp), and nine days exploring the Northwest (Seattle, Victoria and Vancouver). Everyone always raves about this area (especially Clover who grew up there!), so I'm going to see for myself.

Have you sung in the Summer Choir yet? This group is not just for regular choir members—it's also for singers who can't commit to the regular Thursday evening rehearsals during the year. A half-hour rehearsal is held on Sunday mornings at 9:30 a.m. in the downstairs choir room. The music is easy to learn (unison or two parts), and children (even babes in arms) are most welcome to sit with you. It's so nice to see new faces trying out the choral experience. Summer Choir continues through July. Anyone wishing to offer his/her vocal or instrumental gifts during August, please let me know.

I hope you will consider joining a choir when the fall season begins in September. Music is one of the ways we make sense of our lives, one of the ways in which we express feelings when we have no words, a way for us to understand things with our hearts when we cannot with our minds. The Greeks believed that music is the study of invisible relationships between internal objects. I'm not quite sure I wholly understand that, but it rings true!

From the lectionary reading for July 4

Self-Development of People (SDOP) Grants

The Presbyterian Church (USA)'s **Self-Development of People** program empowers grass-roots groups of economically poor or disadvantaged people who are organizing non-profit community organizations or small business enterprises. Established by the General Assembly forty years ago, the program aims to support economic and social justice as envisioned in the Gospel of Matthew, Chapter 25. This spring, three new SDOP projects in the Cleveland area have been funded by different levels of our denomination:

The Presbytery's Self-Development of People committee has selected **EcoVillage Produce**, **LLC** as this year's primary recipient of support. This four-year old market garden enterprise on the mid-West Side of Cleveland was created from abandoned or land bank lots. Three objectives guide the group: providing fresh vegetables and fruit to the neighborhood, e.g. at the Gordon Square Farmer's Market; improving the financial well-being of its partners; and modeling successful economic development for the Detroit-Shoreway area. A Self-Development of People grant of \$4,700 will help EcoVillage Produce become more productive through the installation of fencing, a rainwater catchment structure, and a modest marketing campaign. Three other smaller grants were also approved by the Presbytery SDOP committee this Spring.

The Synod of the Covenant Self-Development of People committee recently approved additional funding of \$10,000 to facilitate expansion of **Round Two**, a resale shop in Euclid that employs several previously out-of-work individuals. A grant from the Presbytery in 2009 helped Round Two purchase a used van, allowing it to pick up and deliver bulky items such as furniture and appliances. Goods and services this enterprise provides are most welcome in the current economic climate.

Finally, the National Committee on the Self-Development of People, part of the PC(USA) General Assembly Mission Council, has just announced a grant of \$20,000 to **ASL Advocates**, also based in Euclid. ASL (for American Sign Language) is a group of visually and/or hearing impaired persons. They have developed training for themselves and help other organizations become more user-friendly to persons with physical problems. The Synod provided SDOP funding to them last year.

Self-Development of People is entirely funded out of the *One Great Hour of Sharing* Lenten offering. One of every six dollars given in our Presbytery returns to our Presbytery committee for use in local SDOP projects, with additional projects being selected by Synod and National bodies. Your generous support of the One Great Hour of Sharing is paying dividends in our community.
