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#### THE KERYGMA CHALLENGE

A Church-Wide Experience in Bible Study

The Education & Spiritual Development Ministry is offering a new adult education program for 2010-2011. The Kerygma Challenge is a church-wide, pulpit-led, Bible study designed to build community and deepen relationships with God.

The goal is to engage every member of the congregation by not only continuing our 9:15 Sunday morning classes but offer additional study forums including mid-week gatherings and online Scripture study. Four options are planned to meet the needs, commitments and schedules of our diverse church family:

- Sunday worship and sermons
- Sunday morning classes
- personal and/or small group mid-week study groups

## Children's Ministry Programs

All classes and programs begin on Sunday, September 12, 2010. We will have a commissioning service for all Christian Education programs. By the first week of September, all returning families will get a call from the Christian Education office to update registration forms and inform parents of their children's programs.

### **Crib and Nursery**

Tracy Long, our permanent childcare provider, and Jill Roberts, our substitute, will continue to care for the littlest member of our congregation. We also ask volunteers to help staff this room. We hope all families will find this place to be a caring and nurturing place to leave their children while they have an opportunity to worship. Child care is offered from 9:15 to 12:30 upstairs in the Monticello wing.

## Little Explorers: three and four year olds

Our focus for this age group is to help these little ones know and experience God's love. The room is separated into a storytelling area, worship area, and play area. Each week the children will have a story read to them, then respond to that story using art, drama, or movement activities. In September, the children will participate in

stories about their place in the church, and Jesus' disciples. This class meets from 11:00-12:15 in room 206.

### Children in Worship: older 4 year olds-kindergarten

This worship experience allows the children to be in an environment where age-appropriate Bible stories are shared. The children are guided through a worship service and are encouraged to respond to the stories through songs, art, questions and retelling of the stories. The children in this class will also be exploring the significance of the Lord's Supper. Parents and their children will take part in a special class September 26<sup>th</sup> as these children learn about this wonderful gift of Communion. More information will be available closer to the date. This class meets at 11:00-12:15 in room 205.

#### Cherub Choir: preschool

Our pre-schoolers will have the opportunity again to come together for songs, movement, dancing, instrument playing and fun this year. They will be meeting monthly beginning in September in the Chapel from 10:30-11:00. Thank you to Lisa Koops for leading this choir. Post cards will be sent home to families when dates are set.

#### Pathways to the Promise Land: grades 1-5

The focused theme for our rotation model church school, Pathways to the Promise Land, is *The Covenant*. The theme of the Covenant is woven throughout the scriptures. Starting with Noah and Abraham, we witness a special relationship between God and humanity. The descendants will be known as God's people, receiving the Ten Commandments as the laws of the Covenant. Jesus comes to live in our midst as the fulfillment of the Covenant. He lives out the demands of the Covenant, to love God with all ones heart, soul and strength. The Covenant is now between individuals and God. We are called to live into the Covenant as God's people.

The children will begin to explore the Covenant as they participate in the rotation focusing on *Noah*. God made a Covenant with Noah and his descendants that the world would never again be destroyed by flood. We are bound to remember this Covenant through the rainbow. The children will participate in the following workshops as they explore this theme: story-telling, puppetry, art, and movement.

The children will be divided this year into the following groups: **Grade 1**, **Grades 2/3**, **Grade 4**, **and Grade 5**.

#### Youth Christian Education

Our youth in grades 6-8 will participate in the **Trailblazer** program. This age group will explore our faith as they learn about the Bible. The youth will be exploring our faith in the Presbyterian curriculum *FAQ-Faithfully Asking Questions*. This curriculum focuses on the catechism questions that unpack the Apostles' Creed. Each session encourages youth to look to Scripture and to our faith tradition in relevant, responsive ways. This group meets in the MOB room from 9:30-10:30.

The **Senior High Church School** youth will participate in discussions that revolve around topics that encourage them to see how faith can be relevant in their lives. This year the curriculum is the Presbyterian *Faith Questions* series. Each session is patterned around the marks of membership from the *Book of Order*. It is specifically designed for older youth. We will begin with a six week focus that explores the question, "Where Are You, God?" by connecting the question with the Bible, creeds and confessions of the PCUSA. This group meets in the Koinonia Room from 9:30-10:30.

**Confirmation** classes will begin in January. More information will be available in October.

The 2010-2011 choir season is about to begin. I'm looking forward to seeing all our FHC musical families getting back to work (and play!). Those who participated in choir last year will receive a letter in the mail, but here's the general information for persons who may be interested in finding out about the musical opportunities at Forest Hill Church:

## The Choirs

Chancel Choir (adults): 1st rehearsal will be Thursday, Sept. 9th beginning with a pot-luck supper and general frivolity at 6:40 in Fellowship Hall. Bring whatever dish you enjoy preparing (or purchasing) and we'll have a fine time getting caught up and listening to the choir president's farewell address. (Or are you running for reelection, Jaired?) New choir officers will be elected (if you wish to avoid such responsibilities, it's a good idea to show up at the potluck, ahem). The rehearsal takes place from 7:30 to 9:00 p.m. Our first choir Sunday is September 12th (rehearsal at 10:30 a.m. service at 11:00 a.m.).

Sine Nomine Choir (grades 6-12): 1st rehearsal will be Sunday, Sept. 19th after worship in the Chapel. Generally we'll meet every other Sunday (with occasional exceptions) for approximately 40 minutes. We'll elect officers at the first rehearsal (looks good on college apps ©). Extra credit for anyone who can get Kristen to sing with us!

**Descant Choir** (grades 1-5): 1st rehearsal will be Sunday, Sept. 12th at 9:30 a.m. in the sanctuary. The choir practices every Sunday, and after choir (10:15) there is an activities period in youth hall. At 10:45 (unless the children are singing for worship), the children meet their parents in Fellowship Hall and go from there to the sanctuary.

**Voices in Bronze**: 1st rehearsal for our handbell ringers will be Thursday, Sept. 16th from 6:20-7:15 p.m. in the upstairs bell room. This group is open to both adults and high school students. An understanding of rhythmic notation is required. Start doing your wrist calisthenics now, ringers!

A recent *Plain Dealer* article cited findings by a local bank that it cost parents nearly \$500 out-of-pocket to send a child to an elementary school this year. Even their school supplies expense was estimated at over \$100, which may be a stretch for some parents in our community.

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## From the Oversight Committee

## **Restoring the Building – Reclaiming the Mission**

The project is proceeding on budget and it is anticipated that the work will be completed by the middle of Septemebr

Storm Sewer - this phase has been completed

Playground - this phase has been completed

**Masonry work** – this phase has been completed with the exception of replacing 5 bricks.

**Painting** – The exterior portion of this phase is substantially complete. The painting of the interior sashes will begin in about one week. Completion of this work will be dependent on the installation of the large sanctuary and fellowship Hall windows. Some damaged wood has been found in the Fellowship Hall portico columns and the fascia trim near the prayer garden. The repair work is in process and should be completed in two weeks.

**Roofing** – The gutters on Fellowship Hall and the Lee Rd side of sanctuary have been replaced. Some of the wood framing of the gutters has been damaged by water over the years and has now been replaced. It is expected that similar damage will exist in other parts of the building. Contingency funds will cover the cost of this work. Work on the sanctuary roof is about 90% complete. It is anticipated that the roofing work will be completed by early to mid September.

**Windows** – 27 of the new windows have been installed. Delivery of the sixteen large sanctuary and Fellowship Hall windows has been delayed until late August or early September. Restoration work on 81 windows has been completed with the exception of the installation of 23 storms. The storms should be installed by the end of August.

**Sanctuary Portico** – The new slate has been installed. The front steps have been reset and approximately six stone steps will be replaced within two weeks. Following the completion of this work fifteen feet of concrete across the bottom of the steps will be replaced.

**Parking lot** – sufficient funds are available to resurface one-third of the parking lot. This work will be done this fall.

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**Landscaping -** sufficient funds are available to contract a master plan and to start the implementation of the plan.

This past July, almost 1,000 delegates representing the PC(USA) and its sister churches around the world gathered in Minneapolis for the bi-annual meeting of the General Assembly. Emily Wolleager, a college student who is an FHC member, was elected by our Presbytery as a Young Adult Advisory Delegate. Here are a few highlights:

- Cynthia (Cindy) Bolbach was elected as the moderator. Cindy is a member of the National Capital Presbytery. She is a good friend of the Lentz family. She taught John in Sunday School. Cindy will be preaching at Forest Hill on Sunday, May 22, 2011!
- Delegates voted to drop the ban on ordaining non-celibate gay and lesbian Presbyterians to the Ministry of Word and Sacrament, Elders and Deacons. This action will require affirmation from a 2/3 majority of Presbyteries nation wide. Debate and voting will take place over the next two years.
- The GA voted to affirm the traditional definition of marriage between a man and woman.
- The GA passed a report on the Middle East reaffirming its historical stands for a two state solution, an end to violence and pressing for an end to settlements in the West Bank.

Despite the many contentious issues facing the assembly, the General Assembly was praised for its civility and unity.

In fact, the Online Directory is actually more private than your printed Directory because it can be seen only by individuals whose pictures are already in the Directory and those whose identities and right to access the Online Directory are validated by the Forest Hill Church administrator.

## Expressions of Compassion

During an informal service in Fellowship Hall earlier this summer, John Lentz asked if members of the congregation had experienced acts of compassion by other members. There was silence and then a few examples were given. I, myself, had several examples, but I remained silent because just thinking about them evoked such strong emotion. I later wondered if that were not the case for others. The greatest acts of compassion seem to occur when we are in the greatest need and therefore most vulnerable. Emotions run high and threaten to overwhelm.

This spring I had foot surgery and expected an uneventful recovery, perhaps lulled by how easy it had been after cataract surgery. For the first three weeks after surgery, things went well but then depression, poor mental functioning and greater pain ensued. Finally obvious infection of the foot pushed me to go to Urgent Care on a Sunday morning. When I was told I needed to go to the UH Emergency Room and possibly be hospitalized, things hit rock

bottom. Perhaps it was fortunate that it was Sunday morning and the service was still going on since I didn't have phone numbers with me. A call to the church got the answering machine but in the message it said press the star key to ring all phones. Liz Wollaeger answered and got Peter and Kathryn Eloff out of church. They immediately abandoned any plans they had and came and got me. They took me and my car home and then took me on to UH. Peter stayed with me until they decided they were going to admit me. Later they went to my house and retrieved items and brought them to me. Talk about compassion, is there any greater?

Two days later, I was told to select a Home Health Care Agency from a long list. Another call to the church resulted in Lynda Bernays' looking up information for me. And then the next day she looked up numbers of people who might help me get home. Again, a member of the congregation who lives fairly close to me, Dick Obermanns, came to the rescue. He abandoned a planned activity to come and fetch me. And luckily kept his wits about him and remembered to take me to the pharmacy to drop off prescriptions before taking me home — I had totally forgotten about the prescriptions as I neared home.

And those are not all the examples. Earlier Mary Ball, a deacon who had also recently had surgery, called to ask if I could serve coffee the next Sunday. Of course, I couldn't, but on Sunday after church Steve Marunowski arrived on my doorstep with the flowers from the service. Even in the course of her own recovery, Mary was thinking of others. Over the course of my recovery Joy Stang, Carol Scott and Cathy Ghiandoni all called several times. And, of course, there was the visit from John Lentz himself, in addition to his calls and emails, and cards from a number of other people.

All acts of compassion experienced because I belong to a congregation that is rich in acts of compassion. I truly believe that we didn't hear more during that Sunday service simply because it is very difficult to retain enough composure to relate these to a large group of people.

Such is what makes a congregation a dynamic, vibrant, thriving community.
