Dear Friends,

October is traditionally the month when the Stewardship Ministry focuses our attention about making pledges for the mission and ministry of the church. On Sunday, October 17 the Stewardship Season will begin with a "Festival of Giving." This year's theme is "More than Enough" and is grounded in the passage from 2nd Corinthians. St. Paul in his letter reminds us that God is able to provide every blessing in abundance. We always have enough of everything and therefore we share the abundance in every good work.

Let's face it: the economy is still struggling, there are many out of work, and all of us have financial commitments that press upon us. It seems as if there is not enough to go around and that our lives are shaped by scarcity. Leave it to God to turn things topsy-turvy. In the Bible it is always about abundance: lands flowing with milk and honey, overflow baskets of fish and bread, the finest wine, a wedding banquet, a feast for a prodigal son. Gifts are given to be given. You are blessed to be a blessing. Focus NOT on what you don't have, but rather what you have been given. Take an inventory of your blessings, and give thanks.

Make a pledge. Even if you don't think you can contribute much, make a pledge anyway. Start with an amount that you believe you can fulfill. Then fulfill it. The Stewardship Ministry wants to celebrate 100% membership pledging.

Let me share the success story of 2010. The economy was just as bad, if not worse. The anti-gospel of scarcity was everywhere proclaimed. But YOU increased your giving (again!) and we will meet our budget (perhaps even a surplus?!) YOU made commitments to fund fully the building renovation project. If you have been reading the reports you know that we are on target and actually ahead of the pace of projected contributions. Talk about sharing the abundance! I doubt that there are many churches in America like Forest Hill Church, Presbyterian.

Forest Hill is a special place. Our staff is the best, our programs inviting and engaging, and our future strong. Given your track record of generosity I am confident that we will reach our gift/pledge goal for 2011. God HAS and will continue to provide us "with every blessing." If we each do our part we will have "enough of everything" and continue to thrive.

Freedom From Religion

Professor Amos N. Guiora (S.J. Quinney School of Law, University of Utah) will be giving a talk at Forest Hill Church on Sunday, October 3 from 7-9 p.m. in South Hall. Professor Guiora, a good friend of Dr. Lentz's (they were roommates at Kenyon College) has just published a challenging and thoughtful book in response to the growing concerns over terrorism in our world. He poses the question: Are we at a time in our history when the "sacred" protections of free speech and assembly may have to be curtailed in order to stem the apparent growing tide of violent fundamentalism in Islam, Judaism and Christianity?

The talk is free and open to the public. Professor Guiora's book will be sold after the program and he will gladly sign copies. Save the date, bring a friend. See you there as we engage in thoughtful reflection on issues that shape our world.

This book ultimately proposes actions that governments could and should take in responding to religious extremism. When I presented some of the ideas that will be described in greater detail in subsequent chapters – broadening the definition of incitement, for example – they were rejected outright by my British audience. While these theories had not been met with universal acclaim – some American colleagues expressed concern with certain premises and disagreed with my conclusions – the level of political correctness in my British meetings was qualitatively different. In one meeting, an extremely thoughtful academic literally refused to use the phrase "religious extremism," except to suggest that I not use the term.

The political realities in the UK prevent the adoption of what I recommend – re-articulation of free speech and free exercise limitations.

Children's Ministry

Little Explorers Three and Four year olds

This month the children will focus on the stories about Noah and Moses. The children will explore how God is continuing to offer his love to all people. After participating in the story the children are welcomed to respond to the theme in art, movement and retelling.

Children in Worship Older four year olds and kindergarten

The children in this age group are asked to respond to the stories they've heard through "I Wonder" questions. There is also a craft response to help them better understand the story. During the month of October the children will explore and participate in stories about Creation, Noah and Moses.

Pathways to the Promise Land Grades 1-5

We see the making of art as one of many ways that we can prayerfully deepen our understanding of the Bible. As we deepen our knowledge of the Bible through the use of the Kerygma materials, we will also deepen our appreciation of the imagery, feeling, and spirit of the text through the use of art.

You do not need to be an "artist" to be in this group. You simply need to be curious enough to explore the Bible using color, form, and symbols.

To allow ourselves enough time for both study and art, this group will meet for 2 hours on Tuesday evening, 7-9 PM. We understand that a 7 PM starting time may stress some people's schedules. So we plan to have a simple supper of soup & bread available at the church at 6:30, immediately before the group begins.

- b. Persons may enter into active church membership in the following ways: by profession of faith, reaffirmation of faith in Jesus Christ, or transfer of certificate from some other church.
- c. When persons baptized as infants reach an age when they are ready to make public their profession of faith and accept their responsibility in the life of the church, the session should invite, encourage, and help them prepare for their responsibility as active church members.

Restoring the Building – Reclaiming the Mission

The project is proceeding on budget and it is anticipated that the work will be substantially completed by the end of September.

Storm Sewer – this phase has been completed

Playground – this phase has been completed with the exception of the fence which will be replaced.

Masonry work – this phase has been completed.

Painting – The exterior portion of this phase is complete. All damaged wood has been repaired and all new windows have been installed. This will allow all the remaining painting to be completed by the end of September or early October.

Roofing – Work on the sanctuary roof is complete. All gutter work was completed by mid-September. Some of the wood framing of the gutters has been damaged by water over the years and has now been replaced. Fortunately the damage turned out to be less than originally thought it would be. Contingency funds will cover the cost of this work. The flat roofs will be replaced by the end of September.

Windows – All 43 new windows have been installed. Restoration work on 81 windows has been completed with the exception of the installation of 12 storms, which should be installed by early October.

Doors – Minor repairs to the weather stripping is in process. Most brass hardware has been restored.

Sanctuary Portico – The new slate has been installed. The front steps have been reset and six stone steps have been replaced. The railings have been restored and painted. All brass has been restored. Fifteen feet of concrete across the bottom of the steps and five cracked blocks have been replaced.

Parking lot – Sufficient funds are available to resurface one-third of the parking lot. This work will be done this fall.

Landscaping – McKnight and Associates, a landscape architectural firm, has been hired to create a master plan for the grounds. The plan will be competed by early October and will be available for review by the congregation.

2 Corinthians 9

The Collection for Christians at Jerusalem

Now it is not necessary for me to write to you about the ministry to the saints, for I know your eagerness, which is the subject of my boasting about you to the people of Macedonia, saying that Achaia has been ready since last year; and your zeal has stirred up most of them. But I am sending the brothers in order that our boasting about you may not prove to have been empty in this case, so that you may be ready, as I said you would be; otherwise, if some Macedonians come with me and find that you are not ready, we would be humiliated—to say nothing of you—in this undertaking. So I thought it necessary to urge the brothers to go on ahead to you, and arrange in advance for this bountiful gift that you have promised, so that it may be ready as a voluntary gift and not as an extortion.

The point is this: the one who sows sparingly will also reap sparingly, and the one who sows bountifully will also reap bountifully. Each of you must give as you have made up your mind, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver. And God is able to provide you with every blessing in abundance, so that by always having enough of everything, you may share abundantly in every good work. As it is written,

'He scatters abroad, he gives to the poor; his righteousness endures for ever.'

He who supplies seed to the sower and bread for food will supply and multiply your seed for sowing and increase the harvest of your righteousness. You will be enriched in every way for your great generosity, which will produce thanksgiving to God through us; for the rendering of this ministry not only supplies the needs of the saints but also overflows with many thanksgivings to God. Through the testing of this ministry you glorify God by your obedience to the confession of the gospel of Christ and by the generosity of your sharing with them and with all others, while they long for you and pray for you because of the surpassing grace of God that he has given you. Thanks be to God for his indescribable gift!
