Dear Friends,

Every January our nation remembers the life, ministry and message of the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Dr. King is truly a hero of mine. I never met him. I heard him speak once at the New York Avenue Presbyterian Church in Washington, D.C. My parents used to drag me to civil rights marches in our nation's capital and we even hosted a person from Appalachia during the "Poor People's Campaign" in 1968. Dr. King was assassinated in April of that year. His friend and second in command, the Rev. Ralph Abernathy organized the campaign to begin in May to honor his fallen friend's last wish. Dr. King believed that the richest country in the world should do more for its poor. Poverty was the twin evil of racism.

My eyes still water and the skin still tingles every time I read his "I Have a Dream" speech delivered on the steps of the Lincoln Memorial in August of 1963. I am chilled when I read his final words given the night before he was shot and killed in Memphis.

*Like anybody, I would like to live a long life. Longevity has its place.
But I am not concerned about that now. I just want to do God's will.
And he has allowed me to go up to the mountain.
And I've looked over.*

*And I've seen the promised land. I may not get there with you.
But I want you to know that I am happy tonight, that we,
as a people will get to the promised land.
And I'm happy tonight.*

*I'm not worried about anything. I'm not fearing any man.
Mine eyes have seen the glory of the coming of the Lord.*

Much has changed for the good since 1968. Whether you voted for him or not, the fact that we have an African-American President is remarkable. However, we are, as a nation, have still not reached the "promised land." Poverty still bewitches us. The urban core is desolate. Issues of race still stir both openly and not too far under the surface. In the Heights, the demographics of the schools do not

match the demographics of the general populace. We still are wary of difference.

At a luncheon after church in early November about 50 church members discussed the events in Pepper Pike where FHC members Demo and Reni Solaru were confronted by police. One particular comment stirred me to believe that it was time for those who are interested to come together and address the issue of race both within the walls and outside the walls of Forest Hill. I envision something longer and deeper than a one-off night of discussion. I want to move beyond embarrassment *and* politeness.

Ron Register, Mark Chupp, Doris Allen and I have been meeting with representatives from the YWCA to shape this discussion. I will let you know how the plans unfold but I wanted you to be aware. Forty-two years after Dr. King was killed the dream still lives and the spirit moves us onward toward living and being the beloved community.

Dear friends,

As the month of March draws closer, I want to update you on the upcoming FHC pilgrimage, "In the Footsteps of Paul: A Pilgrimage to Turkey and Greece" that 25 members of our congregation, as well as five persons from other congregations, will embark upon from March 25 - April 3, 2011. Thirty pilgrims in total! What a transformative experience this pilgrimage will be, not only for the participants, but for the whole community. That's what pilgrimage is about. It's not just a trip or vacation; one is not just a tourist. Pilgrimage requires one's openness in mind, heart, soul and tenacity. A pilgrimage challenges a person to open her or himself up to transformation through the new relationships forged within the group and outside of the group. Travel is the way that we become citizens of the world—becoming more compassionate as we learn about and encounter others unlike ourselves along the journey. Most importantly, a pilgrim is opened to God's spirit in the preparation, on the pilgrimage itself, and in the reflections done upon arriving home.

In preparation for the pilgrimage – and to get the whole congregation in the same frame of mind and heart – the adult education team committed to a church-wide study of The Acts of the Apostles for nine weeks this winter. We want to ground people in the life of the early church and its establishment in the ancient Greco-Roman world. We can learn a great deal about the mission for the 21st century church by studying and reflecting upon the challenges of the early church.

We are offering three lectures in preparation for the pilgrimage. These classes are open to everyone!

This option allows you to set up a recurring donation to Forest Hill Church and saves the church money by avoiding the fee charged by Paypal for gifts processed through your PayPal account or your credit card.

On Sunday, January 16th the congregation of Forest Hill Church, Presbyterian held its annual meeting of the Congregation and Corporation.

Highlights included:

- A wonderful lunch provided by Morag Keefe (thanks too to Brynn, Molly and Tom!)
- The celebration of four successes of 2010: The Kerygma/Small group programs, the Restoring the Building – Reclaiming the Mission project, Interfaith Hospitality Network mission, and Abundance Acres;
- Elders, Deacons, Trustees were elected as was the Nominating Committee for 2012;
- A lengthy and open discussion about the 2011 budget occurred. Sadness was expressed by several members about cuts to Benevolence giving. Concerns were raised about the need to rely on funds from Endowment. Members of Session spoke to both their concerns for and support of this budget. Session has formed a task force to re-affirm our mission and to address future budgets.

Once again, Forest Hill Church Presbyterian showed itself to be a vital, honest, hopeful congregation.
