Salaries were frozen, programs were cut, and, perhaps most painful of all, there was a significant reduction in our benevolences. Due to this new reality, the Session called a small group to re-frame and re-claim our mission, and plan for financial responsibility in the future.

In order to keep our excellent staff, support our programs, maintain our building and increase giving to agencies that promote our commitment to social justice we have to increase revenue. Yes, we can add a pledge here and there, and some may be led to increase their annual giving. However, sooner or later, we must come to the reality that this is not sustainable. We have to increase membership.

Since the Congregational Meeting in January, Elders Chuck Smith, Laura Steiner, Barb Hansen, Kurt Haas, Mark Chupp, Laurie Logan, Joanne Shaner, Peg Weissbrod, Clover and I have been meeting. The entire Session will be going on their annual retreat at the end of the February to discern God's direction on our future. By May the Session will have a plan that will faithfully address our renewed commitment to be a thriving and growing church.

In time, you, the members of the congregation, will be asked for your input; this kind of crisis calls for everyone's involvement. At this point in time, the small group is attempting to frame the directing questions which will lead our discernment.

It has been a blessing to me to experience the excitement and faithfulness of this team of leaders. I have no doubt that this present crisis is presenting us with a powerful opportunity to deepen our commitment to praise God, equip the saints for ministry, serve others, show hospitality, and build Christ's beloved community.

Here are some things that you can do to help the process:

- 1. Pray for the Spirit's guidance.
- 2. Invite someone to church, or to a special program. The best way to grow the church is by personal invitation.
- 3. Stay current with your pledge.
- 4. Let me know what is the most important part of your Forest Hill Church experience.

Dear friends,

We begin preparing ourselves for Easter (April 24th) by paying attention to our interior lives during the six weeks of Lent beginning with Ash Wednesday, March 9. Lent is a time to take a deep breath and let go of the illusion that we are perfect (or are trying to attain perfection). We can open ourselves to the welcoming hand of God. We can sit still and allow God to be God, and us human.

Many of you have shared with us that you struggle with saying the Confession of Sin in our worship service each week – that it makes you feel unnecessarily guilty. This piece, written by Martin Copenhaver, a UCC minister, addresses this feeling. Copenhaver's view of the rightful place of the Confession of Sin is, in my opinion, right on, theologically astute and humanly honest. Please read it carefully and contemplate what he's written. Rejoice, for we are all sinners. There is great peace that comes when we "come clean," release our need to be perfect, and receive forgiveness. Blessings as you walk the honest and unburdening journey of Lent.

Christians are Joyful Sinners, by Martin B. Copenhaver Excerpt from Isaiah 6:1-5: "Woe is me! I am lost, for I am a man of unclean lips, and I live among people of unclean lips; yet my eyes have seen the King, the Lord of hosts!"

Does worship in your church include a prayer of confession? If so, it is probably near the beginning of the service. One reason for this placement is that God's presence reveals things to us. In God's clarifying presence we see things about our lives that we might not see otherwise. So when Isaiah had a dramatic encounter with God in the temple, his first response was confession. And it can be the same for us in our worship.

Some congregations no longer include a prayer of confession in their worship because the practice is considered too "negative." They contend that people have enough difficulties in their lives without the church adding to the burden. But confession is not about adding a burden. Quite the opposite. It is about being unburdened. Ultimately, there is no joy in denial. But there can be great joy in receiving forgiveness.

As Christians we don't need to traffic in denial. We can afford to be realists. We are free to face the truth about ourselves: good and bad are inextricably intertwined within us. Sometimes we act nobly, but even then our motivations can be mixed. This is not a hopeless admission. We are free to be realists because our hope is in God. In confession, we rely not on our own goodness, but on God's forgiveness. The God in whose presence we see our lives with jarring clarity at the same time shows us that we are loved, nonetheless.

Prayer

Dear God, when given a chance, I mess up. Sometimes, when not given a chance, I mess up anyway. So I am grateful that I do not have to rely on my own goodness, but rather on your forgiveness. Amen.

Ministry of Justice and Mission Benevolence Report: 2010

The Ministry of Justice & Mission allocates or recommends benevolences and various other outreach gifts for specific worthy projects on behalf of the congregation of Forest Hill Church.

In 2010, we provided \$35,000 in grants from budgeted benevolences to 17 projects in the Heights area, Greater Cleveland, the U.S. and Internationally. Also, 4 projects (marked "E") received \$17,000 in funding from FHC's endowment. Projects are listed below.

Another \$35,000 in support was provided to Presbyterian Church (USA) mission through Presbytery, Synod, and General Assembly.

Additional funds from freewill offerings overseen by the Ministry went to local hunger centers, Haitian disaster relief, and other needs of poor or vulnerable people. Forest Hill members gave generously in 2010, showing the love and justice of Jesus Christ to the world.

Three of the six Lenten Sundays fall in March this year, and the music will reflect the more contemplative atmosphere of this liturgical season.

During March, music by two of our FHC resident composers will be sung. Jed Koops' *My Lord Knows the Way* is well suited for Lenten themes, particularly finding one's way through the wilderness. Jaired Birks is making his compositional debut with a lovely setting of the *Kyrie eleison* text (Greek for Lord, have mercy). Jaired is only 17, but the Chancel Choir is in agreement that he has great potential as a composer.

The Sine Nomine Choir will have a special treat in March. During their rehearsal on March 6th, Geoffrey Golden, a specialist in gospel music, will teach the choir a song which they will sing in worship the following Sunday, March 13th. Geoffrey, though only a sophomore at Cleveland Hts. High School, is a master at choir directing and leads the music at his home church.

On Sunday, March 20th, music from Turkey and Greece will be sung—a little musical farewell to the FHC folks travelling to that region later in the week. Lynn Balaze will be the guest organist that day as I will be on tour with the Heights choirs that week. That morning, I will be worshipping at the Cathedral of St. John the Divine, a magnificent Gothic cathedral with amazing acoustics.

Mark your calendars for our 4th AWE service on Sunday, April 17th at 7:30 p.m. It's our annual *Swing to the Lord a New Song* service, featuring our Chancel and Sine Nomine Choirs accompanied by a jazz combo led by trombonist Paul Ferguson (my brother) and trumpeter Jack Schantz. Also appearing will be the Heights Barbershop Group, (Jack Lentz, Josh Toombs, and Jaired Birks from FHC sing in this group).

Choirs (and everyone else), please note that Daylight Saving Time begins on Sunday, March 13th, so remember to set your clocks ahead one hour and go to bed early the night before!
