Happy Easter! Christ has risen! He has risen indeed!

In this season of new life and new hope, your Session has called two groups together to discern God's direction for Forest Hill. Both groups will include opportunities for congregational involvement.

Exploring Racial Diversity and Inclusivity within Our Church Community

Since last November Mark Chupp, Ron Register, Doris Allen and I have been exploring ways of engaging the Forest Hill Church community in a deep and courageous conversation about race. With the expertise offered by Cassandra Washington and Gina Cheverine from the YWCA and Adele Kious, from Currere, Inc. we have fashioned a program that will guide us in this pilgrimage of trust, honesty, hope and power.

The purpose of this conversation will be to "engage willing and interested members of Forest Hill Church in exploring what racial diversity and inclusivity means to their community and congregation." Some initial guiding questions include:

- While we are known as a welcoming and hospitable congregation, what does racial diversity and inclusivity mean to us?
- What is the experience of people from different backgrounds in our congregation? What insights do they have about how we could be more welcoming and hospitable?
- Is racial inclusivity a current core value? If so, what would it be like and look like to live that value more fully?

The process will include a 4 hr. opening retreat after church on Sunday, June 5^{th} , three dinner dialogues led by a trained facilitator during the summer, a congregational summit in August and a closing retreat in the fall.

The hope is to find 40-50 people who would be interested in joining this process. If you are interested please talk to Mark Chupp, Ron Register and Doris Allen.

Session Task Force on Envisioning Our Future

In response to the difficult budget decisions made last January, the Session has called together a task force to re-articulate Forest Hill Church's core values and how they will shape our faithful decisions about church growth, financial stability, and our future on the corner of Monticello and Lee. It is important to note that the capital campaign formed to restore the building was called: "Restoring the Building and Reclaiming the Mission." We believe that we have restored the building and now it is time to pursue the second of the promises made.

The Task Force will be co-facilitated by Elders Melody Obery and Jeff Smith. Others who will be serving include: Chuck Smith, Peg Weissbrod, Elizabeth Shaw, Barb Hansen, Dave Bell, Barb Cloud, Stephen Sedam and Jeannine Gury.

The work will include gathering data and learning of our past; auditing our present programs, staffing roles and giving patterns; receiving input from the members; describing how FHC has responded to God's call in the community; and finally, investigating future trends in church and society. Based on what they learn, the task force will articulate our core values and apply them to both our short term and longer term decisions about budget, benevolence, staffing, program, and building.

God has blessed us richly with talented and faithful leaders who bring skill sets suitable to the tasks before us. Please be in prayer for the work that is ahead of us. Support us with your time, talent and treasure.

In this season of "resurrection madness" let us be open to the spirit of the risen Christ among us.

Dear friends,

I cannot believe that our group of pilgrims has been home from Turkey and Greece for over two weeks already! When we were away, it was so easy to immerse myself in the beauty of the countryside, the magnificence of the ancient sites we visited, the daily laughter and reflections of our group, the spiritual quiet of the presence of God in each place, and the immense gratitude I felt leading a tremendous group of people. A few more days on the Greek seacoast would have suited me well.

We returned from our long-awaited and much-prepared-for pilgrimage as changed people. I think each person could give testimony to a particular moment that held deep meaning for him or her. The difference between a tour and a pilgrimage is the depth of intention one brings to the experience. The tourist enjoys the sights; a pilgrim is changed by the sites. The tourist takes from the experience; the pilgrim is transformed by each experience during the trip. Our pilgrims were intentional about their journey by preparing themselves intellectually and spiritually. While there, they engaged in the spiritual practices of journaling, reading scripture, praying, worshiping, and enjoying Christian fellowship.

There were many, many highlights. One of them for me took place on the first morning in Turkey. We gathered on that sunny Sunday morning for worship around the fifth-century baptistery within the ruins of the Basilica of St. John near Ephesus. We sang "Let All Mortal Flesh Keep Silent," the lyrics taken directly from the fourth century liturgy of St. James that inspired our worship. A Christian gentleman from Delhi, India joined us; he was surprised and delighted to have found a Christian group worshiping in that ruin. It's a challenge to find many Christians in Turkey today. It was a profound experience praising God under the open sky, in an ancient land, connected to early Christians nearly 2,000 years before us.

I encourage you to ask those who went on the trip to share what was most meaningful to them about the pilgrimage. We will be offering a slide show with reflections on May 15 in Adult Education, 9:30 a.m. I hope you can join us. Enjoy the reflections also in this Tower written by a few of the participants. I hope you are inspired and might consider coming along on a pilgrimage in the future.

Clover Reflections from Our Pilgrims

As we visited one ancient site after another and saw the ruins of temple after temple to the old deities, our leaders frequently reminded us that this was the world into which Paul, and others like him, carried the Gospel. It was a world of many gods, a world of emperor worship, a world in which the idea of <u>one</u> God through whose Son we might gain relationship with God must have seemed preposterous, a world in which "the Way," the teachings of Jesus, must have seemed absurd. Yet the message Paul carried took root. The ancient civilization crumbled and the old deities are no longer worshipped, but Paul's message is still challenging those who will listen. Just as we finished our communion service not far from one of those ruined temples, bells rang out from a church we could see just beyond the ruins. Their sound was a powerful reminder of the enduring truth of Paul's message.

At the same time I was struck with the notion that as Christians today, we, like Paul, bear witness in a world which worships many false gods. Indeed, I too often pay tribute to these gods myself. Artemis and Apollo and Athena may have lost their place, but gods like money and material possessions and social position and national power and a sense of entitlement and a desire to protect what we think is ours – the list is endless – these gods stand in opposition to the Gospel message just as surely as did those old gods. Doubtless they <u>are</u> the old gods in a twenty-first century form! So I think the pilgrimage challenged me to live in a way that reflects the truth that Paul preached, that I am being saved by grace to turn away from false gods, follow as closely as I can teachings of Jesus, and share my experience of the good news with others.

Ephesus (in Turkey) was dripping with empire. The streets are magnificent, and the vista down the main road, lined with temples to various deities (including the emperor), conveys the grandeur and power for which Rome was justly famous. That empire allowed the construction of a library that was one of the largest in the ancient world. And it was in the very amphitheater where we sat that Paul's "no small disturbance" with the silversmiths proceeded (see Acts 19.19-29). The city came to have some identity for me, a sense of place, of personality. I feel that I know more about the Ephesians to whom Paul wrote. It presents the "other" side of the Roman empire,

that there were parts that really worked well. And the patronage system fed, supported, and ultimately corroded it. That was the world into which the Apostle Paul tried to introduce a new way of understanding power - Rome sought peace through victory; Paul preached peace through equality and justice.

Istanbul (then called Byzantium) was a city that so far as we know Paul never visited. But it was too good to pass up since we were in Turkey. I marveled at the Blue Mosque, the Hagia Sophia (originally a Byzantine church, later a mosque, and now a museum), and the indulgent splendor of the Topkapi Palace, with its breathtaking views of the Bosphorous, the Golden Horn and the Sea of Marmara, its successively more restricted courtvards, and its projection of unimaginable wealth and the power of empires. What really struck me, however, was listening to Dr. Fearer, a Presbyterian pastor working in Turkey to facilitate connections with members of the Muslim community. In a country of some 70 million people, Dr. Fearer believes that perhaps 3,000 Muslims have been converted Converts to Christianity in this and adopted Christianity. overwhelmingly Muslim country face threats and violence, loss of jobs, and being shunned by family and others. The impetus for these conversions is simple direct human compassion. It has not been theology, but love which has brought about the conversions. That speaks to the task before Paul, and the one we face today.

The Rise and Fall of the Bible: The Unexpected History of an Accidental Book 9:30 a.m.; May 1, and May 8

FHC member Tim Beal has been a favorite presenter in our Adult Education classes for several years. His work as the Florence Harkness Professor of Religion at CWRU and as the author of the recent books Roadside Religion and Biblical Literacy explores the interaction of religion and culture. His latest book explores the ways in which the development of the Bible from a collection of scrolls into a single bound and canonized volume has affected our interpretation of its contents. Tim's book includes some of the latest research available on "biblezines", manga Bibles, and other contemporary formats for the ancient scriptures. Tim's classes on May 1 and May 8 will continue to discuss the historical development of the Bible and shed light on ways in which the format of our Bible can influence our interpretations in ways we may not even be aware of. Tim's engaging teaching always provides thought provoking experiences both for people who haven't cracked the binding of a Bible in years and for grizzled veterans of our Adult Ed classes. REMEMBERING OUR SOLDIERS AND THEIR FAMILIES

Do you know someone fighting on the front lines in Iraq or Afghanistan? How about a family in your town that has a loved one serving? Legendary newsman Tom Brokaw says if you can't say yes to one of these questions, then you don't really care about the war or the men and women who are fighting in it. Tom says what concerns him most is that people don't think about the sacrifices that these brave soldiers and their families are making for our freedom.

The current wars in Afghanistan and Iraq are the longest in United States history—longer than World War II and Vietnam. Tom says it's not just the length of time that has made these current wars different than past ones—it's our country's level of engagement. He says World War II united our country in an effort to save the world, and while we were deeply divided during Vietnam, the whole country was still very aware about what was happening. Today's wars are not something the typical American thinks about every day, and according to Tom, "less than 1 percent of the American population is bearing 100 percent of the burden of battle."

"I, as a political reporter, believe very strongly that this democratic republic cannot have something that involves our blood and treasure assigned to only a very small part of our population, and nothing else is asked of the rest of us," Tom says. "That's not just unjust. In a way, it's immoral."

Tom says we all have to "re-enlist as citizens." That means raising our consciousness about the wars—to think about the men and women who are fighting every day and losing their lives—and also to do something about it.

"However you feel about the war and the appropriateness of it, you must honor these people and their families," Tom says.

This information is from an Oprah show this season that introduced you to some of the soldiers that have been injured, their families and the struggles they share; along with the stories of those who have given their lives in service to their country. The Deacons are planning to gather items that can be sent in care packages to soldiers within the FHC family. We will have a box on the Fellowship Hall stage starting May, 1, 2011. Following are some of the items that are needed:

- Baby Wipes packets are better than tubs.
- Beef Jerky/Slim Jims
- Energy Bars (Power Bar, etc.)
- Hot Sauce (Tabasco, Red Devil, etc.)
- Sunflower seeds
- Peanuts
- Seasoning Salt (Lawry's, etc.)
- Atomic Fireballs / Jolly Rancher hard candy (for service member use)
- Smarties or SweetTart candies (for local children who prefer sour style candy to build relationships with community)
- Powdered Energy/Electrolyte Replacement Drink Mix (Gatorade, etc.)
- Chewing Gum
- Avon Skin So Soft great for removing face paint and also reputed to be an effective bug repellant (the latter seems variable based on personal experience and reports)
- AA-cell Alkaline Batteries
- Personal Hygiene Gear: Disposable Razors, Toothbrush and Tooth Paste
- Eye Wash / Drops for flushing dust and sand out of the eyes
- Pre-paid Phone Card so service member can call home

We ask that all members who have a relative serving in the military anywhere, not just in a war zone, please contact us with their mailing address so we may include them in our efforts. We would also like to show our support to their families that are waiting here at home with cards of support, so please let us know their contact information.
