Children's Ministry Programs 2011-2012

Crib and Nursery

Tracy Long, our permanent childcare provider, and Jill Roberts, our substitute, will continue to care for our littlest member of our congregation. We also ask volunteers to help staff this room. We hope all families will find this place to be a caring and nurturing place to leave their children while they have an opportunity to worship. Child care is offered from 9:15 to 12:30 upstairs in the Monticello wing.

Little Explorers three and four year olds

Our focus for this age group is to help these little ones know and experience God's love. The room is separated into a storytelling area, worship area, and play area. Each week the children will have a story read to them; they will then respond to that story using art, drama, or movement activities. In September, the children will participate in stories about their place in the church, and about Jesus' disciples. This class meets from 11:00-12:15 in Room 206.

Children in Worship older 4 year olds-kindergarten

This worship experience allows the children to be in an environment where age-appropriate Bible stories are shared. The children are guided through a worship service and are encouraged to respond to the stories through songs, art, questions and retelling of the stories. The children in this class will also be exploring the significance of the Lord's Supper. Parents and their children will take part in a special class in September as these children learn about this wonderful gift of Communion. More information will be available closer to the date. This class meets from 11:00-12:15 in Room 205.

Pathways to the Promise Land grades 1-5

Our church school for these children is a workshop rotation model. This model focuses on the variety of ways in which the children learn. Each month the children participate in workshops that explore a topic based on the yearly theme. During a three-week rotation (with an occasional 4-week rotation), the children rotate among workshops to experience the same Bible focus in different learning styles. The lessons are designed as a kid-friendly, teacher-friendly, facility-transforming way to teach Bible stories and truths.

The theme for the upcoming program year is the *Messiah*. From the time of the early prophets, the people of Israel placed their hope on the deliverer. The children will be exploring the people and events that lead us to the Anointed One, Jesus Christ, as the Messiah and the central figure in the Christian faith.

The children will be divided this year in the following groups: **Grade 1/2**, **Grades 3/4**, and **Grade 5**.

One of the significant changes in the *Pathways to the Promise Land* program (grades 1-5) is that the children will be attending worship (with very few exceptions) with their families on Sundays when we celebrate the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper. These will be called KISS: *Kids In Sunday Service*. The first *Pathways to the Promise Land* rotation theme will be teaching the children the focus of worship as praise and the pattern of the service. For KISS Sundays the children will receive their own bulletin and quiet relevant activities to help keep them engaged in the service.

There are many ways to help out: hold a baby for an hour, read a story to 3 and 4 year olds, help choose curriculum, be part of an adult core team for our youth groups, be a youth leader, offer your home for youth Bible studies, work with computers..... Martin Luther once proclaimed:

I wish to see all arts, particularly music, in the service of Him who gave and created them. Music is a fair and glorious gift from God. Singers are never sorrowful, but are merry, and they smile through their troubles in song. Music makes people kinder, gentler, more staid and reasonable. I am persuaded that after theology, music is the only art capable of affording peace and joy of heart. The devil flees before the sound of music almost as much as before the Word of God.

Certainly, Martin Luther is suggesting that you join a choir!

The 2011-2012 choir season is about to begin and I'm looking forward to seeing all our FHC musical families getting back to work (and play!). Those who participated in choir last year will receive a letter in the mail, but here's the general information for persons who may be interested in finding out about the musical opportunities at Forest Hill Church:

The Choirs

Chancel Choir (adults): First rehearsal will be Thursday, Sept. 8 beginning with a pot-luck supper and general frivolity at 6:40 in Bodwell Hall. Bring whatever dish you enjoy preparing (or purchasing) and we'll have a fine time getting caught up and electing new choir officers (if you wish to avoid such responsibilities, it's a good idea to show up at the potluck, ahem). The rehearsal takes place from 7:30 to 9:00 pm. Our first choir Sunday is September 11th (rehearsal at 10:30 am; worship at 11:00 am).

Sine Nomine Choir (grades 6-12): First rehearsal will be Sunday, Sept. 11 in the Chapel after worship. Generally we'll meet every other Sunday (with occasional exceptions) for approximately 40 minutes. We'll elect officers at the first rehearsal (looks good on college apps ©).

Descant Choir (grades 1-5): First rehearsal will be Sunday, Sept. 11 at 9:30 am in the sanctuary. The choir practices every Sunday, and after choir (10:15) there is an activities period in youth hall. At 10:45 (unless the children are singing for worship), the children meet their parents in Fellowship Hall and go from there to the sanctuary.

Voices in Bronze: First rehearsal for our handbell ringers will be Thursday, Sept. 15 from 6:20-7:15 pm in the upstairs bell room. This group is open to both adults and high school students. An understanding of rhythmic notation is required. Start doing your wrist calisthenics now, ringers!

I hope to see lots of new faces and fresh voices intermingled with the "regulars" in the choir family this September.

That quote will be the guiding light in our special arts offerings this program year. The details are still being worked out as of this writing, but here's the general outline. Once per month, the worship service will be enhanced by a particular art form: music, visual art, dance, drama, poetry. The first one will be on Sunday, September 11 as we remember the 10th anniversary of the terrible events of that day. 16-year-old violinist Michael Ferri will weave the music of Bach throughout the service. Personally, I find the sublimity of Bach's music comes closest to expressing the inexpressible. Michael, a violin student of Paul Kantor at the Cleveland Institute of Music, was recently featured on the PBS program *From the Top*, a television program which showcases America's brightest young musical stars.

On October 2, both world music and global visual arts will help us celebrate World Communion Sunday. On November 20th (Christ the King Sunday), we'll celebrate the 20th anniversary of our Elizabeth Popely Husni Casavant pipe organ will major organ works played by yours truly. Mark your calendars also for Lessons and Carols which will be held on December 18th this year. Stay tuned for more news on our art-enhanced liturgies.



KERYGMA Bible Study Challenge! Fall 2011: September 25 to November 27

After a tremendously successful 2010-2011 Bible study program with over 90 participants, the Adult Christian Education and Spiritual Formation program will continue engaging in a church-wide Kerygma Bible Study Challenge! This year's programs will continue to offer a variety of opportunities for studying scripture in a small group setting.

Option I: EXODUS: "Gateway to the Bible" Sunday mornings 9:30-10:30 am or Sunday evenings 5-7 pm

The book of Exodus, often called the source book of the Bible, initiates great themes of the faith - salvation and revelation, promise and fulfillment, covenant and community. Participants will see how the stories of Exodus lay the foundation for the covenant relationship between God and God's people that forms the cornerstone of the entire Bible. Anchoring us in the testimony of scripture, the study will strengthen and enrich, enliven and inform our faithful living today.

10 sessions / resource book \$20

Option II: EXODUS: "Drawing the Bible" Tuesdays, 7:00-9:00 p.m.

Like all the other FHC Bible study groups this fall, this group will use the Kerygma Exodus materials - but will have a special added feature: exploration of the Bible through creating art. Daryl Musick, who has a Master's degree in Art Therapy, will co-facilitate this group with Peter and Ann Williams, who both love making art. We see the making of art as one of many ways that we can prayerfully deepen our understanding of the Bible. As we deepen our knowledge of the Bible through the use of the Kerygma materials, we will also deepen our appreciation of the imagery, feeling, and spirit of the text through the use of art. You do not need to be an "artist" to be in this group. You simply need to be curious enough to explore the Bible using color, form, and symbols. To allow ourselves enough time for both study and art, this group will meet for 2 hours on Tuesday evening, 7-9 pm. We understand that a 7 pm starting time may stress some people's schedules. So we plan to have a simple supper of soup & bread available at the church at 6:30, immediately before the group

Option III: EXODUS: "Listen to the Bible with Heart" Sunday mornings, 9:30 a.m.

This group will explore different contemplative practices as they pertain to listening to Scripture speak to us today. We will share personal discoveries in the group, giving the opportunity to learn and grow together with our hearts open to the Word and to each other. We will read the Kerygma Exodus course material individually prior to each session to inform and enhance our time together. However, it will not be the focus of our shared time together. Sunday mornings, 9:30 a.m., in the chapel. Drop-ins are welcomed.

Option IV: BIBLE 101: "Your Bible! The Study Begins" Sundays, 9:30 a.m.

This seven-week course of study will acquaint you with the Bible in a broad yet concise way. A brief survey of its two main testaments will help participants see how the parts are related. This brief study will help you improve your knowledge of the Bible. This is a great study for those who feel the need for a stronger foundation in order to feel more confident in reading *Your Bible!*

8 sessions / resource book \$12

How will the program work?

There are a variety of ways to be involved in Bible study this fall. Here are some of the ways you can participate in our church-wide Bible Study Challenge:

- Come to Sunday worship and hear the sermons that will be preached from the passages from Exodus studied that week.
- Prepare for Sunday worship through your own independent study of the Kerygma resource book for EXODUS.
- Join a small group that will meet each Sunday morning at 9:30 a.m. during the adult education hour, or Sunday evenings from 5-7 p.m.
- Join the "Listen With Your Heart" group, which will utilize the Exodus passages through contemplative practices Sunday mornings in the chapel.
- Join the Tuesday evening group, "Drawing the Bible."

 Join in a Sunday morning group even if you haven't signed up!

Exodus 1: 8-20

Now a new king arose over Egypt, who did not know Joseph. He said to his people, 'Look, the Israelite people are more numerous and more powerful than we. Come, let us deal shrewdly with them, or they will increase and, in the event of war, join our enemies and fight against us and escape from the land.' Therefore they set taskmasters over them to oppress them with forced labour. They built supply cities, Pithom and Rameses, for Pharaoh. But the more they were oppressed, the more they multiplied and spread, so that the Egyptians came to dread the Israelites. The Egyptians became ruthless in imposing tasks on the Israelites, and made their lives bitter with hard service in mortar and brick and in every kind of field labour. They were ruthless in all the tasks that they imposed on them.

The king of Egypt said to the Hebrew midwives, one of whom was named Shiphrah and the other Puah, 'When you act as midwives to the Hebrew women, and see them on the birthstool, if it is a boy, kill him; but if it is a girl, she shall live.' But the midwives feared God; they did not do as the king of Egypt commanded them, but they let the boys live. So the king of Egypt summoned the midwives and said to them, 'Why have you done this, and allowed the boys to live?' The midwives said to Pharaoh, 'Because the Hebrew women are not like the Egyptian women; for they are vigorous and give birth before the midwife comes to them.' So God dealt well with the midwives; and the people multiplied and became very strong.

Update: Discernment Task Force

The deadline for the Discernment Task Force's September 28 report to Session on God, Life, the Universe, and Everything, especially Forest Hill Church, is rapidly approaching.

As with most task forces, we've bit off more than we can chew. The end of August and the beginning of September find us frantically trying to simultaneously complete our research and pull together all of our findings. Thank you to all who have assisted.

Here's what we've done (or are working on) so far. We:

- read and sorted through 40 years of Session minutes and Annual Reports to understand the larger historical picture of Forest Hill Church
- studied the membership, attendance, and giving patterns of Forest Hill Church and those of other comparably-sized churches in our Presbytery
- conducted one-on-one interviews with at least 50 different Forest Hill members and visitors, both long-time and brandnew, young, old, and in-between

- surveyed the entire congregation about the role church plays in their lives, what moves them to support the church financially and otherwise, what issues they think we are/should be addressing, and what their vision of Forest Hill's future is
- collected people's favorite stories/ experiences of Forest Hill
 Church at after-worship Listening Posts
- visited other local churches, including Antioch Baptist, St. Paul's Episcopal, and Church of the Saviour, to glean their best practices in the areas of staffing, programming, missions and mission giving, and just "funding the faith" during this economic downturn.
- invited former member <u>Dr. Mary Grace Neville</u> to lead a oneday workshop on conclusions to be drawn from our research

How Do We Elect Our Leaders in Our Church? The Presbyterian Nominating Process

The Presbyterian Book of Order states: "Every congregation shall elect men and women from among its active members, giving fair representation to persons of all ages and of all racial ethnic members and persons with disabilities who are members of that congregation, to the office of elder and to the office of deacon...."

FHC has three Elders from each of six ministries, plus a Deacon, a Clerk of Session, the Pastor, and the Associate Pastor who make up the leadership body called the Session. The Clerk, Elders, and Deacons each serve a three-year term and must be active members of the church. The role of the Elected Leader is to serve for one to three years on a ministry, helping to shape the ministry, handle special projects, develop new programs, and give vision for the ministry. Elected Leaders do not need to be members of the church, but do need to be active in the church.

The Nominating Committee is made up of an Elder from Session, five elected members, a Trustee representative, and a Deacon representative. This handful of people is tasked with matching the gifts of the congregation with the leadership needs of this church. As the chair of the committee, let me tell you, it's not an easy task. All of us in this church are gifted in a variety of ways, but those gifts are not always apparent to ourselves, let alone the Nominating Committee. Between February and December, we meet monthly to brainstorm about the needs of the church and the gifts of our congregation. We utilize the Time and Talents survey. We also reach out to the active members on the ministries asking them to nominate individuals who have been involved. When we think we have found a match, we contact the person to invite him or her to serve. We bring the slate of nominees to the congregation who then votes at the annual meeting in January.

The Nominating Committee is always open to submissions of names to be considered for elected office. If you know someone you would like the committee to consider for spiritual leadership in our church, please feel free to contact me, any member of the Nominating Committee or one of the pastors.
