I recently had breakfast with a pastor-friend. We were sharing our thoughts about the perennial challenge of recruiting people to volunteer their time and energy for the good work of mission and ministry. We have numerous elders, deacons, trustees, elected leaders, mission volunteers and servers, and ministry members working during the week. This work is not any work. The call is one of listening to the Holy Spirit and working creatively to fulfill God's commission to bring forth the kingdom of God into the world around us.

I hope you can celebrate with us the activity and energy of this congregation. Especially, we invite you to explore what area might be of interest to you. Where is God calling you to live out your passion? In what arena would you like to use your particular gifts or skills in building up the body of Christ? I guarantee that we will find a place for you, or we might discern a new area of ministry for our church. Don't let fear hold you back. Ask a pastor or another church leader if you are so moved. Our Senior High Youth meet at 9:30 am for a time of discussion and study on the Book of Proverbs and the wisdom the book has to offer us today.



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We Hear....

An Interview with John Lentz

Members of the Discernment Task Force interviewed many Forest Hill members and friends over the summer, including several staff members. Here are a few snippets of what Barb Hansen and Peg Weissbrod learned from interviewing John Lentz. The remainder of the interview can be read on our website at:

What first attracted you to Forest Hill?

"Deanne saw the search committee's ad and showed it to me, saying 'I think this is something you want to take a look at.' I remember the ad had an outline of the church and described Forest Hill as this dynamic, challenging, socially engaged, church in an inner-ring suburb— it gave me a sense that this was not the usual Presbyterian church. It seemed to have a sense of having identified its future--and a bit of a swagger—and I was intrigued."

What makes you proud to be a part of Forest Hill?

"When people outside the church--even outside the presbytery--say, "Oh, Forest Hill Church, that's a really dynamic church". . . continued online

If you could wave a magic wand and make Forest Hill exactly as you want it to be, what would you do?

"I'd get rid of the pews in the Sanctuary and do something really respectfully architectural with our wonderful sanctuary space." John said he'd turn it around so that the Narthex wasn't cut off from the rest of the church, and enclose the Courtyard to be the main entrance--a really welcoming space to walk into instead of the long narrow Fellowship Hall hallway.

Other physical changes would include having a video screen available for worship--he wouldn't want it up all the time, but he thinks our worship could be enhanced occasionally by visuals. . . . continued online

"Because I'm at my best when I do--it's fun--and I want to be part of a community that claims Jesus as its model. Plus it's a way to support the community, especially when the church is clear about its needs and why it's asking. . . . I would want to be part of Forest Hill Church even if I wasn't on staff here." continued online

Describe the one thing we need to keep "doing or being" in the next ten years.

"I think it's absolutely imperative to continue emphasizing small group spiritual formation. People want to belong to something, and small groups are where people get that sense of belonging." . . . continued online

What are the biggest issues Forest Hill faces right now?

"The biggest issue right now is NOT money," John said, "because that will sort itself out. The biggest issue is the viability and vibrancy of Cleveland Heights." He believes that if Cleveland Heights fails and our core membership moves away, that Forest Hill Church could disappear as well. He sees our future tied to Cleveland Height's future, and Cleveland Height's future tied to the City of Cleveland's future. . . . continued online

October 2: World Communion and Peacemaking Sunday

Lend your mementos and enrich our worship!

World Communion Sunday is intended to remind us of our rich connections to Christians in other parts of the world. This year, for the October 2 service, we would like *you* to participate in that remembrance... by loaning whatever *visible* objects, pictures, and mementos you would care to offer for public display during World Communion Sunday worship. This "enhanced worship exhibition" will be set up on Saturday (by Ministry of Worship volunteers) and will take place *in the sanctuary*, as a part of our worship on Sunday morning.

Each loaned object should

- be visually appealing and/or interesting -- and somehow relate to your own sense of the worldwide church (objects of all sizes, colors and descriptions are welcome and encouraged!)
- be accompanied by an attached 3 x 5 index card -- which includes the owner's name and briefly expresses how it symbolizes, or reminds you of, its connection to Christians in other parts of the world
- not be unduly fragile, irreplaceable or precious. (Those setting up the display agree to take very prudent care of the objects loaned, however, those loaning the objects agree to do so with the understanding that the church and its volunteers cannot be held responsible for any accidental loss or damage that may be beyond their control.)

Logistical details

- No more than two contributions per person, please.
- Loaned objects (with cards attached) should be left in the Lee Road transept of the sanctuary on September 28, 29 or 30 (the office is open 8:30 – 5; please call for other times)
- After the October 2 worship service, loaned objects should be picked up by their owners; 12:45-ish at the earliest.

Peacemaking - Far and Near

The Peacemaking Offering, to be received on World Communion Sunday, October 2, supports efforts of the Presbyterian Church (USA) to live out a deeper commitment to peacemaking as part of our faithfulness to God. The Presbyterian Peacemaking Program and our Ministry at the United Nations work for the protection of individual integrity and human rights, for elimination of poverty and homelessness, and to halt open warfare and abate violence in many forms.

The Peacemaking Offering also allows congregations to designate one-quarter of the funds collected for some local project. This year, we will support the Home Repair Resource Center. Longtime church members will recall that in 1971, following an adult education class, the church created a nonprofit Housing Corporation as a faithful response to racial tensions and "white flight" that characterized Cleveland Heights at the time. The thinking was that by ensuring the upkeep of the community's older housing stock, property values would be maintained, and peaceful racial integration and economic stability would more likely succeed.

In the four decades since that seed was planted, the Forest Hill Church Housing Corporation – now the Home Repair Resource Center – grew into a broad-based community housing organization. It made good on its initial goal of building community confidence, facilitating about \$14 million in repairs to Cleveland Heights homes, and enabling hundreds of homeowners to respond positively to their housing maintenance needs with financing and hands-on training. More recently, HRRC began offering foreclosure prevention counseling for those with distressed mortgages, and has been rehabilitating vacant Cleveland Heights homes for resale to new owner occupants. HRRC continues "to support the community's rich diversity" through its multi-faceted work.

Forty years is a long time – whether in the wilderness or in a community. On World Communion Sunday we will celebrate the faithfulness of this unique Peacemaking ministry created and supported by Forest Hill in worship, by our offering, and with personal reflections and refreshments following the service in Fellowship Hall. Please join us!

Prayers of the People

It did not seem right to leave
the prayers of the people
on the lectern for someone to find later.
Two notes about death,
three more about needed healing,
one of hope, and a long scrawled message
about Tuscaloosa, Alabama,
the devastation there.
The prayers had been said already
to nodding heads and silence.
They were just dust on the air molecules now.
Specks and flecks on streaming light,
not really seen, but moving between us,
breathed in and out or whispered
or sung as lullabies.

But I could not leave them there, even after the spoken prayers had been said. The scraps of paper, the original words. So I carried the notes out to my car, and they sat in the passenger's seat beside me. To Whole Foods, then with the bag of muenster cheese and oven-roasted turkey. To Home Depot, to the drive through post-office box, even to the movies. They sat alone for 112 minutes as it started to rain.

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Then I parked them for the night, went inside, and watched TV, especially when the President said we had killed the enemy. Yes, even then, the prayers were in the car, while fraternity boys climbed street poles and waved the flag and people gathered outside the White House singing, "America, America, God shed his grace on thee."

The next day the prayers rode beside me, first to school, then from school, then to the gas station.

Just staring at me, with their death, their disease, the tornado, and slice of hope.

Each prayer in a different print, some stiff and formal, one in perfect school-teacher cursive, one with the words sliding down the page.

I did not know what to do with them -- these six notes. And their cousin prayers alight in me: for the country, for the man who pulled the trigger, for the man who said to send the troops in, for the man inside the president's suit.

I did not know what to do with these prayers, for the thousands of boys with guns slung over their shoulders,

the woman sitting across from an empty chair in Brooklyn, New York, the man who cleaned the rubble for months, the little girl -- pulverized by jet fuel and a World Trade Center -- her body now just dusty sparkles passing between us and across the continents, from Manhattan to Abbottabad.
