Dear Friends,

It was a year ago that fifty people gathered after a church service to discuss the disturbing events in Pepper Pike and the emotional ordeal of Demo and Reni Solaru, young members of FHC. Their experience opened again the fragile layer that covers the issue of Race in America.

At the lunch meeting Ron Register challenged Forest Hill Church to look inward while we were gazing outward. From that meeting, Ron, Doris Allen, Mark Chupp and I began to meet. Through the winter we planned the course of action. In May, on a beautiful Sunday afternoon, a group of over 50 met and organized themselves into small dinner groups. At each of the dinner groups, held over the summer, short segments of the DVD "Mirrors of Privilege: Making Whiteness Visible" was shown and discussed. On Sunday, September 25th after church all the participants met again to share their experiences and to look ahead.

Talking about race is not easy. But over the summer, new relationships were formed, stories were shared, awareness was cultivated and we grew the capacity to talk about deep things, and to move onward in hope.

Thank you to the small group facilitators who dedicated their summers to leading the dinners: Kate Monaghan, Doris Allen, Ron Register, Mark Chupp, Elaine Turley, Diana Woodbridge, Chris Henry, John Lentz, Vikki Nowak and Todd Webster.

The process is not over. Talking about race and building the beloved community envisioned by the prophets is not an overnight, follow-the-dots kind of thing. There are no simple instructions to construct an inclusive, diverse community.

There were some identifiable, shorter and medium term goals that we will press on to implement. These plans include:

- The next One Book One Church selection be written by an African-American;
- A "pilgrimage" to, for example, Memphis, Birmingham, or Washington D.C. in order to visit the "holy" sites of our own national formation;
- A bike trip up the Underground Railroad trail starting in Cincinnati;
- Inviting new folks to join a discussion group and re-create the experience shared by the 50.
- Encouraging every member of the church to get to know someone of a difference race, or background;
- Learning from and visiting progressive, open churches that have "succeeded" in growing diverse congregations.

Some Sunday in November, everyone will be invited to a bag lunch in Bodwell Hall. At that gathering members of the summer conversation will report on their experience. New people will be invited to join the work. Together we will press on!

God bless you. We are blessed to be part of a congregation that is willing to have such conversations!

Dear friends,

I have just returned from a clergy renewal conference called CREDO where I spent one week in gorgeous southern Washington state in Skamania County on the spectacular Columbia River gorge. The PC(USA) Board of Pensions hosts the event for clergy who have been serving in ordained ministry for at least ten years. The conference is a way to foster renewal and wellness in mid-career pastors. Sadly, the burnout rate among clergy is very high. We luxuriated in the pleasure of not planning or implementing any worship services, meditations, studies, prayers, or leadership of any sort! We were able to drink in the care from the seven-person leadership team whose capabilities were extraordinary.

Pastors don't routinely honor the Sabbath for themselves. Pastors rightly are caring for their parishioners' needs, but often without paying attention to the physical, spiritual, financial or vocational areas of their own lives. Tragically, the divorce rates are unusually high for clergy marriages, probably for some of the aforementioned reasons.

I heard stories of joy and challenge from colleagues who led churches with memberships of over 2000 and some with churches of only 35 members. There was much laughter and tears shared over the course of the week. We were given the difficult tasks of honest reflection of our own gifts, passions, and sense of call. We were exhorted to find again the reasons why we entered the ministry of Jesus Christ and to articulate our vision for our way forward. It was clear that some pastors present were in the crossroads of a decision to continue in Christian ministry or not. Sadly, I believe some will be leaving the ministry, at least for a time. Giving witness to the pain in some cases was sobering.

On the last day, we had to present our CREDO plan that consisted of three goals with steps for accomplishing them. I began my presentation admitting that I had felt some guilt over the course of the entire week because I, unlike so many present, am very content with and grateful for my ministry among our congregation. I probably sounded like I was in denial because I bragged on our church family so much! I did set three personal goals however that hopefully will help keep me focused and healthy for my ministry. I want to model good health – in body, mind and spirit – as essential in ministering among you.

I started the week in Washington joy-filled and grateful for our church. I ended the week still joy-filled and grateful for our church, but sprinkled with cautionary wisdom for keeping myself that way. Thank you for supporting me in this time away and through this experience. You were all in my heart.

Discernment Task Force Update

After interviewing 49 people representing a cross section of the FHC community, conducting a church-wide survey, visiting local churches, examining 40 years of our history, and capturing members' stories, our report is nearing completion. The report will summarize what we did, what we found, what are the future trends in churches, and most importantly how our core values guide us to do God's work and reveal His plan for us.

This has been a humbling and exciting journey for the task force members as we discovered and rediscovered what an amazing church we were in the past, we are now, and will be in the future. A final report, complete with recommendations for consideration, will be presented to Session this month. Session will in turn share the report with the ministries who will, with the assistance of the Task Force, further discern the information presented. Our report will also be communicated to the full congregation for comment and input.

The Task Force is grateful to Session for this opportunity given us and especially to the full congregation for their deep and loving participation in this most important process in the life of our church.

New Life Community

In the summer of 1990 four families moved into their apartments in a building on Kinsman and East 154th Street as part of a pilot project called New Life Community. New Life Community had been shaped gradually over two years through an ecumenical prayer group organized by Tom and Grace Uhle after Tom was awakened in the night with a clear sense of a call to provide a transitional housing program for the homeless families of Cleveland. He invited others to join him in prayer as they developed a ministry to the homeless. New Life was modeled after a program in Dallas called Interfaith Housing Coalition.

In 1992 the founders of New Life Community bought the St. Cecelia's Parish School building for \$1 from the Catholic Diocese of Cleveland, and raised the money to renovate the interior into 14 apartments with offices and program space on the lower level.

The space in the building has been set up very much the same as it was when the building was first renovated. The programming has occurred onsite and has always been comprehensive in nature. 20 years ago and today the head of household learns how to manage finances, improve parenting skills, learn job skills, find housing, and most importantly, how to believe in themselves. The outcomes have consistently been outstanding: 85% of the families who complete the program leave with employment and permanent housing.

While New Life Community was always a non-denominational program, it was founded in prayer and the same prayer group – now called the Mission Group – has met weekly since the founding of the organization. The love and concern for each resident exhibited by the staff and volunteers was the basis for the program's success. When someone believes in you, it is easier to believe in yourself.
