It really isn't about being prepared, for the epiphanies of God come precisely at unexpected, unprepared-for moments. God comes whenever God comes. Christ is born wherever Christ is born.

Don't feel bad if this season doesn't meet expectations or if you can't get to all the shopping or the decorating or the cooking. Forgive yourself if you are not prepared. God will be delivered whether or not we are looking. Salvation comes even if we don't feel it. And it might just be in the year of least preparedness that we receive the greatest surprises.

Dear friends,

In adult education this Advent, we are offering a two-week course, December 11th and 18th, on the theme, "From Longing to Receiving." Elder Barry Hartz, one of our very talented teachers, will be leading the class.

My thoughts this past week have moved toward the season of Advent, and the idea of longing as integral to what it is to be human. As Blaise Paschal is often quoted as saying, "There is a God shaped vacuum in the heart of every [human] which cannot be filled by any created thing, but only by God, the Creator, made known through Jesus." Whether the quote is his exactly, the intent resonates with me. Deep within us there feels to be a desire that draws us toward God, the Divine, or Love. We long for true intimacy, we long for another one to love, and who will love us; to know and by whom we can be known. Perhaps the Creator put this longing within us in order to keep us pressing toward a deeper Truth that only can be realized when we are in a whole relationship with God, self and others. When we are at our best and our healthiest, we seek to fulfill this holy desire of being in connection with God, self and others.

In Advent, we celebrate the miraculous reality that God longs to be close to us. God longs for us to know God more fully. God longs for us to be in relationship in an unmediated way. God comes in Jesus to be fully present with us, God-with-us, Immanuel. Each of us is on a journey toward our spiritual home, I believe. Our spiritual home is where God resides, where our deepest self exists. The deepest, holiest longing within us is to be in communion with God, but we don't always realize it. Tragically, we humans often seek to fulfill the Holy longing instead with disastrous behaviors or with people that leave us unfilled and ultimately bankrupt of real love.

This Advent, as we move toward the coming of God, the birth of Jesus, I pray that each of us contemplates and pays attention to the deepest longings in our lives. That deep longing might point us in the direction of our truest desire which is to know and be known by God. The astonishing news is that we are already known, for God longed for us even before we took our first breath. May we be open to receive the good news that is already with us, and yet, is coming again.

"I'm Dreaming of a 'Green' Christmas"

Not exactly a rendition of the ol' Bing Crosby classic......but the upcoming holiday season has your Earth Care Green Team thinking about how we can honor God's creation in several ways this month to care for our earthly home. Here are just a few ways to enjoy 'Green Holidays':

- 1. Shop 10,000 Villages for economic justice and resource sustainability (you can do this at FHC on Sunday, December 18).
- 2. Buy a live Christmas tree and then re-plant it—or buy an artificial tree and re-use it.
- Use gift wrapping paper made from recycled paper—and recycle last year's gift paper, and/or use re-usable gift bags. Newspaper pages and magazine covers also make interesting gift wrap.
- 4. Send Christmas cards that not only portray the true reason for the season, but also reflect nature. Of course you'll want to purchase cards produced from recycled paper—or even make your own!
- 5. Buy organic foods (and local products) for your holiday table.
- 6. For the children on your list, purchase educational gifts that have a nature, ecological, or environmental theme.
- Pare back (or even eliminate!) the outdoor lighted displays which consume electricity and therefore increase fossil fuel usage. Alternatively, buy LED lights which use a fraction of the energy that traditional holiday lights use.
- 8. Provide food for your local wildlife—the birds and the beasts around you—squirrels, birds, etc.
- Provide gifts of charity to the world and its peoples (Heifer International or Presbyterian Disaster Assistance, for example).
- 10. Put on your favorite sweater (or two!), turn down your thermostat and cozy up to a nice cup of (fair trade) hot chocolate or tea!

FHC Work and Exploration Trip to Haiti

Diana Woodbridge, Keith Logan, and Laura Steiner: what do these three passionate Forest Hill members have in common? Each of them identified a social need and followed a call to take specific action, and, hence, Forest Hill Housing Corporation (now Heights Housing Resource Center), LINKS, and Abundance Acres were launched.

Whether it is social justice in the Cleveland Heights community or financially supporting a church in Ghana, Forest Hill Church has demonstrated our commitment to social justice as well as an openness and encouragement to help individuals pursue their vision and call.

So today, another Forest Hill member has emerged with a vision and call~

Haitian- American Ralph Jean-Mary, a hospital administrator at the Cleveland Clinic, has discerned a call to explore the possibility of opening a self-operating medical clinic in the central region of Hinche, Haiti where his parents live and operate a hotel. We sense the Spirit's nudging and leading, and we want to act on helping Ralph explore his vision.

April 9-15, 2012: Forest Hill Church will offer a "Work and Exploration Trip" to Hinche, Haiti. The seven-day trip will include five days of hands-on work with Habitat For Humanity in a local building/construction project, and two days exploring our possible partnership with existing medical endeavors (or possibly creating a new reality!) 12 spots are available and the cost will be in the \$1800 range. Air, food, and housing are included.

Familiarity with a hammer and shovel would be helpful, but not required.

Being open to possibility, exploration and joy is also necessary.

Ralph Jean-Mary and John and Deanne Lentz will be leading this adult work/discernment trip. An information and interest meeting will take place soon. Look for further details! For information contact: lentz.deanne@gmail.com.
