I wish you all a blessed New Year – one full of happiness, love and a renewed generosity of spirit as we recover from the hustle and bustle of the holidays.

On January 8th, we look forward to singing "We Three Kings" as our three FHC kings, decked out in their beautiful, flowing robes and bright headgear (given in memory of Bill Tapie), journey down the aisle, offering their glittering treasures to the Christ Child.

On Sunday, January 22nd, our fifth AEL (arts-enhanced liturgy) will feature the spiritual power of poetry. Jean Reinhold, a very fine poet herself, and I are crafting a service during which poetry will replace many of the traditional elements of the service. For example, instead of a musical prelude, there will be a poetic one. Cleveland Heights Point of Dispensing (POD) Training

Dear Forest Hill Congregation, Friends and Family,

During a public health emergency, when preventive medicine or vaccine is being offered to the community, we need many people to assist in distributing these medicines or vaccines. The public health emergency can be the result of a natural occurrence of a disease (i.e. pandemic flu or SARS), exposure to a pathogen (i.e. anthrax or smallpox) resulting from an act of bioterrorism, or other community emergency requiring rapid dispensing of preventive medicine or vaccine.

In Cleveland Heights, we will establish a Point of Dispensing (POD) in conjunction with the Cuyahoga County Board of Health. Our POD will be located at the Cleveland Heights Community Center and will be staffed primarily by Cleveland Heights volunteers, 18 years of age and older.

Find out more about the operation of a POD. Point of Dispensing (POD) training will be held Tuesday, January 10, 2012 from 7:30 to 9 pm in Fellowship Hall at Forest Hill Church.

We hope you can plan to join us in learning more about this important community service.

If you are unable to attend, but are interested, let us know. There will be additional sessions scheduled throughout Cleveland Heights. Let us know if you have questions or comments.
