Friends.

We are in the liturgical season of Lent. The Oxford Dictionary of the Christian Church describes Lent as "The fast of forty days before Easter." The first mention of a Lenten fast occurred as early as 325 C.E.:

The custom may have originated in the prescribed fast of candidates for baptism, and the number forty was evidently suggested by the forty days' fast of Moses, Elijah, and especially the Lord himself. During the early centuries the observance of the fast was very strict. Only one meal a day, taken towards evening was allowed, and flesh, meat and fish, and in most places also eggs were absolutely forbidden.

These strict expectations were relaxed by the 15<sup>th</sup> century:

Lent is generally observed as a time of penance by abstaining from festivities, by almsgiving, and by devoting more than the usual time to religious exercise.

Frederick Buechner, a contemporary Christian author, has a slightly different take on Lent. In his book Whistling in the Dark: An ABC Theologized, he writes:

After being baptized by John in the river Jordan, Jesus went off alone into the wilderness where he spent forty days asking himself the question of what it meant to be Jesus. During Lent, Christians are supposed to ask one way or another what it means to be themselves.

#### Buechner continues:

When you look at your face in the mirror, what do you see in it that you most like and what do you see in it that you most deplore? If you had only one last message to leave to a handful of people who are most important to you, what would it be in twenty-five words or less? Of all the things you have done in your life, which is the one you would most like to undo? Which is the one that makes you happiest to remember? Is there any person in the world, or any cause, that, if circumstances called for it, you would be willing to die for? To hear yourself try to answer questions like these is to begin to

hear something not only of who you are but of both what you are becoming and what you are failing to become. It can be a pretty depressing business all in all, but if sackcloth and ashes are at the start of it, something like Easter may be at the end.

My hope is that you take advantage of this season to slow down and reflect upon your life, your faith, and your priorities. This year the Green Team of Forest Hill Church, led by Dave Neff, is encouraging us all to consider how we use the resources of our lives, how we care for the earth and for ourselves. The Green Team offers you a Lenten Carbon Fast calendar (available electronically on the website: printed copies are available at church. Contact the office if you'd like one sent to you). Each day it will suggest certain practices of doing more with less and becoming more aware of the energy you use. Take a look at the schedule of programs and services for Lent. The theme of this year's Lenten season is: "Care of the Earth, Care of Self."

God bless you during this holy season. May the preparation you give bear great fruit in Easter rejoicing.

Relations (SGORR) from Shaker Heights High School visited our church and led over 50 adults and children in

activities on increasing race and diversity awareness. Currently our son, Seth, (and before him, our daughter, Sophie) is involved in this very demanding student-led organization. The intentionally integrated small groups of students meet weekly to engage in conversations and activities around the issues of race, and then four times in the school year they go into an elementary school classroom and lead the children in activities and conversation about racial diversity, stereotyping, labeling and other destructive patterns to community. SGORR is an outstanding organization and one which Shaker Heights schools is very proud of. I am pleased that FHC hosted them and that the student leaders who came to our church were given the opportunity to shine!

Here is a poem that SGORR uses in their curriculum and it speaks so well to the life of faith in God. Faith is a risk, but only the one who lives a life of risk lives freely. Amen!



# Haiti Exploration Trip April 10-16, 2012

With the support of the Ministry of Justice and Mission and after Easter, a team of 8 intrepid and passionate FHC members will travel to Hinche, Haiti to explore the potential for Forest Hill Church establishing an ongoing partnership with a Haitian community or organization.

Team members will observe projects in the Hinche central plateau area north of Port Au Prince sponsored by the Presbyterian Church USA, the Catholic Church and independent organizations. Some of these projects include an eco-village, nutrition clinic, rural school, orphanage, hospital and midwife training center.



Ralph Jean-Mary first envisioned the trip to Haiti. As a graduate of the "Faith Leader" program, Ralph's Personal Plan for Ministry (PPM) was to establish a medical clinic in Haiti. Because Ralph grew up in Haiti and now lives in the United States,

he has a unique perspective. His parents live in Pandiassou and operate a hotel where the group will be staying. Ralph's vision brought the other team members together.

Deanne Lentz, a new elder on Justice and Mission ministry, has always wanted to do adult work trips. She shared: "Mission trips were a formative part of my faith development during my teenage and young adult years. I can only imagine that to travel to Haiti with adults will be even more powerful and transformative." Deanne also thinks it is no coincidence that Ralph was "brought to Forest Hill." "All my years at FHC, I hoped we could start an ongoing international partnership. Forest Hill does everything else!"

Pix Mahler, the World Mission (PCUSA) partnership facilitator for Haiti, will work with the Forest Hill team preparing them for the trip and connecting them with the projects in Hinche. The Presbyterian Church (USA) is involved in various projects in Haiti. One such project is the Peasants' Movement of Papaye (MPP). The MPP creates eco-villages that offer agricultural skills to the huge influx of urban citizens moving into the rural areas after the devastating earthquake of 2010.

After 5 days of observation and listening to the needs and dreams of Haitians, the FHC team will return home and discern potential long-term ongoing partnerships for the church. Possibilities include financial support for a specific project and/or developing a more personal relationship.

Beside Ralph and Deanne, the FHC Haiti Team includes Kermit Lind, Anne and Jeff Smith, Steve Sedam and Virginia Weiss, and Pastor John Lentz. Keep these people in your prayers as they seek to broaden our church's commitment to justice and equity locally and globally.
