We enter April shaped by the reality of both the worst and the best. April 1<sup>st</sup> is Palm Sunday. Jesus enters Jerusalem with much fanfare but we know that soon there will be Peter's denial, and Judas' betrayal. Jesus will be handed over and abandoned by his friends. He will be crucified by the Romans and mocked by the religious powers. Jesus will

feel the abandonment of God in the garden and on the cross. NOTHING could be more dismal. To help us enter this passion, we will hold a Maundy Thursday service on April 5<sup>th</sup>. In this very poignant and moving service called Tenebrae we begin in light and end in darkness. On Good Friday, April 6<sup>th</sup>, we will hold a service in the Chapel at noon. We will remember the dark day and ponder the awesome love of God and the final moments of Christ's life.

Then, on Sunday, April 8<sup>th</sup> we gather to worship the risen savior on Easter. Easter is a glorious season of celebration! We re-claim our foundation as a people of hope and resurrection. I am always profoundly moved by the shattering good news that Christ is alive and death and sin no longer has dominion. It seems to me that if the promise of the resurrection is true and the Spirit of Christ is alive in our world – then the way I live my life and look at the world, the way I engage is radically changed. How can I be cynical, fearful, doubtful, or hopeless if I trust that Jesus lives? Even the very worst is trumped by God's very best. We are called beyond the tomb of doubt into the new life of joy, hope, service and faith.

PLEASE join us for worship on Easter Sunday. There will be two services: 9:00 am in the Chapel and 11:00 am in the Sanctuary. The Sacrament of Holy Communion (The Eucharist) will be celebrated at both services. Bring a friend. Let them experience the welcome, the good news, the power of the music and preached word at Forest Hill Church.



In the weeks following Easter we see the re-birth of nature, the bloom of buds, the return of the birds, the warmth of the air and lengthening of days, AND the start of the baseball season. In such a season of joy we are called to service to others, care of the earth, praise of God, and generosity of spirit.

I have been thinking a great deal about the idea of church growth lately. Hundreds of books have been written about it. We talk

about it in our church. We have a separate task force committed to focusing on church growth. But the idea begs the question, What do we mean by "growth"? Are we speaking about the number of bodies we want in our pews on a Sunday morning in worship? Do we mean growing the number of people involved in activities and programs in our church regardless of their worship attendance? Do we mean growth by the number of pledging units/dollars we add to the church budget? Do we mean a person growing in depth and understanding of God so that he or she feels more confident in her or his Christian beliefs and practices? Do we mean growing in diversity in our congregation's make-up: race, age, disabilities, and/or sexual orientation? Do we mean, by growth, a greater involvement in the world through service, mission and justice work? There are many ways to measure "growth" and perhaps we mean "yes" to all of these questions when we use the terminology. However, we have a great challenge to define the term as our starting point in order to implement our plans for intentional growth.

One of the simplest (maybe not the easiest) ways to increase our numbers is for each member to invite a friend to church. Studies show that 80% of church go-ers became involved in a church because someone invited them. It starts there. Think about how you came to Forest Hill. Were you invited by a neighbor, friend, or co-worker? How did you hear about us? What got you through the door? Most importantly, what kept you here?



We challenge to you during this springtime to INVITE A FRIEND TO CHURCH (or neighbor, co-worker or the Starbucks barista who serves you your morning latte). Easter is a wonderful day to invite someone to participate in a worship service that is hopeful, joyful and full of good news. Rather than being allergic to the thought of inviting someone to "Come and see," consider this: if church means a great deal to you because you have found God and a community of faith to be good news in your life, then others might find God and a community of faith to be good news for them too. You are not proselytizing; you are sharing your own faith story. Giving witness to how God is important to you is merely being honest and authentic. After the resurrection of Jesus, his friends were given the task to share what they had seen and heard. Take the challenge!

We will see you in church, of course. We hope to meet the friend you bring along!

# **Beyond Black History Month**

The celebration of Black History Month was an overwhelming success. The action started on Sunday, January 15 when 12 members attended the annual Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Day celebration at Cuyahoga Community College. On Sunday, January 29, 50 people attended the screening of *Red Tails*, a film about the Tuskegee Airmen. On Sunday, February 5, 50 attended the special program led by students from SGORR (Student Group on Race Relations) from Shaker Heights High School. The next Sunday, February 12, almost 30 stayed after church to see the film Gifted Hands: The Ben Carson Story. On Sunday, February 19 we were blessed by the presence of Professor Maghan Keita, who preached at the 11:00 service and then spoke to a group of 30 about Haiti and the birth of a nation that arose from the ashes of colonialism and slavery. Finally, on Sunday, February 26 Ajah Hales led a book conversation on *Kindred* by Octavia Butler. *Kindred* tells the story of a African-American women living in present-day Los Angeles who gets pulled back to the time of slavery on a Maryland plantation of the early 19th century.

We will continue to celebrate the gifts of women and men from all cultures, races, creeds, abilities and orientations as we grow towards the fulfillment of becoming the "Beloved Community" of Jesus Christ.

### A Personal Energy Efficiency Earth Day Memo

As we approach the 43<sup>rd</sup> Earth Day, many of us at FHC are working to educate members of the congregation regarding how we can be better stewards of God's/our great Earth. There are many practical tips/ideas listed in the Carbon Lenten Fast document that has been handed out at church. In addition, I reflect on things my family and I do to decrease our collective Carbon Footprint and take better care of what my daughter Kate calls "Mr. Earth".

- The age old question paper or plastic? Neither take reusable cloth shopping bags to the grocery and other retail stores.
- We joined a CSA (Community Supported Agriculture) and purchase a share of produce from a local farmer in Ashtabula County. Eating locally grown produce helps reduce transportation costs and fuel and supports local farmers. We also toured "Farmer Mick's" farm last year which gave Kate (and us) a new appreciation for where our food comes from and the extensive work and resources it takes to feed our planet!
- Eat what is in season while we are certainly not perfect at this, we try to eat produce that is "in season" so we aren't eating strawberries imported from Chile in January.
- I've been composting for the past 6 years, somewhat successfully. It's pretty easy to throw grass clippings, leaves, shredded paper, produce scraps and egg shells into a bin and let it 'cook'. But I've discovered making a usable form of compost is more challenging than it sounds, especially in a cooler climate like Cleveland. This summer I'm going to build a second bin to transfer partially decomposed material to continue breaking down, and I'm also going to purchase worms to help speed up the rate of decomposition. If that sounds too complicated, consider throwing your yard waste in a pile in the corner of your backyard instead of sending it to the landfill.
- Turn lights off when leaving a room.
- Use cloth napkins instead of paper
- Recycle this has been a good chore for Kate to help me with each week. I consider it a victory on the few weeks when the pile of recyclables is larger than the trash pile.

As for our 92 year old house ....

• The first thing I did after moving in was switch about 80% of the light bulbs to compact fluorescents (CFLs) – the following month we noticed a substantial decrease to our electric bill.

- Replaced old, drafty single-pane windows with new, double-pane windows for several areas on the first and second floors. Not cheap, but definitely a wise investment!
- Covered hot water supply pipes from the water heater with foam insulation.
- Last fall we participated in our gas utility's (Dominion's) energy audit program, which identified numerous holes and leaky spots throughout the house. Since that time, I have been walking around with a caulk gun looking for holes to fill. "Air-sealing" is the technical term! I've added fiberglass insulation to a crawl space, inserted triple expanding foam into cracks/holes in our foundation and other places, capped an unused chimney and flue, and caulked and covered unused windows with plastic film. Call your gas utility today – it's the best \$50 you can spend!

Please join us for the Adult Education program on **Earth Day, Sunday, April 22.** A variety of earth friendly tips will be shared including information about local foods, lighting, and energy efficiency – plus, you will learn about Brett and Annette Himes' home solar array and how you are can engage in renewable energy.


