Acts 4: 1-20

While Peter and John were speaking to the people, the priests, the captain of the temple, and the Sadducees came to them, much annoyed because they were teaching the people and proclaiming that in Jesus there is the resurrection of the dead. So they arrested them and put them in custody until the next day, for it was already evening. But many of those who heard the word believed; and they numbered about five thousand.

The next day their rulers, elders, and scribes assembled in Jerusalem, with Annas the high priest, Caiaphas, John, and Alexander, and all who were of the high-priestly family. When they had made the prisoners stand in their midst, they inquired, "By what power or by what name did you do this?" Then Peter, filled with the Holy Spirit, said to them, "Rulers of the people and elders, if we are questioned today because of a good deed done to someone who was sick and are asked how this man has been healed, let it be known to all of you, and to all the people of Israel, that this man is standing before you in good health by the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth, whom you crucified, whom God raised from the dead. This Jesus is 'the stone that was rejected by you, the builders; it has become the cornerstone.' There is salvation in no one else, for there is no other name under heaven given among mortals by which we must be saved." Now when they saw the boldness of Peter and John and realized that they were uneducated and ordinary men, they were amazed and recognized them as companions of Jesus. When they saw the man who had been cured standing beside them, they had nothing to say in opposition.

So they ordered them to leave the council while they discussed the matter with one another. They said, "What will we do with them? For it is obvious to all who live in Jerusalem that a notable sign has been done through them; we cannot deny it. But to keep it from spreading further among the people, let us warn them to speak no more to anyone in this name." So they called them and ordered them not to speak or teach at all in the name of Jesus. But Peter and John answered them, "Whether it is right in God's sight to listen to you rather than to God, you must judge; for we cannot keep from speaking about what we have seen and heard."

In the Works for October 2012...

Even though spring has just sprung and summer is yet to be, it's not too early to start thinking about autumn and a trip being planned October 13-14 to Washington D.C.

The genesis of this trip arose from the discussion following the Courageous Conversations on Race held at Forest Hill last summer. Many wanted to journey to the key sites of the civil rights movement and to discover and celebrate the history and places of importance to all Americans: Memphis, Birmingham, Atlanta, Selma, Jackson, Washington D.C.

While the thought of doing a week-long trip to see all the cities and sights is exciting to contemplate, it is a big trip to coordinate. Therefore, a weekend visit to the nation's capital to see the new Martin Luther King, Jr. Memorial seemed a better first attempt at on-going domestic pilgrimages.

In addition to spending time at the monument we will also visit the African-American Civil War Museum, the exhibit of African-American history and culture at the Smithsonian Museum of American History, and other sites of importance. We may worship Sunday morning on the steps of the Lincoln Memorial which is where Dr. King gave his "I Have a Dream" speech.

This journey will be more than a tour. It is a journey of on-going transformation as we become a more hospitable, inclusive and diverse church family. We will have time to reflect upon our experiences and how traveling the road of the past will help shape our future at Forest Hill Church.

Plans are in the works for a bus [or buses], hotels rooms, a tour guide and meals. This trip is being coordinated by Barb Cloud and Anne Smith. Anne and Barb will have an information table in Fellowship Hall after worship on May 20. Please come for updates on this exciting adventure, and sign up for the Washington D.C you may or may not have seen before.
