Dear Friends,

From the Pastor

Deanne and I were invited by Jack and Mary Anne Breisch to come with them on a transformative journey (pilgrimage) through the streets and alleyways of Cleveland. We joined a group of students from John Carroll University. **EVERY** Friday night they fill a van with food and clothing and head downtown to find homeless men and women. They call themselves the Labre group. Labre is the last name of Benedict Joseph Labre.

Benedict Joseph Labre was called the beggar of perpetual adoration. He traveled in his sack-cloth, tied with a rope, always on foot. He slept in the streets, his body filthy, picking up food where he could. Benedict Joseph Labre became a Saint in 1881 and we know him as St. Benedict.

I met Paul, who lived in an alleyway off 9th St. and who loves the movie "Titanic." I met T-Bone, who gets work waving your car into the parking lots near the Q and Progressive fields. He sleeps on steps outside an office building. There is a man who sleeps under the pedestrian bridge leading to Browns Stadium. There is Charles who, until three weeks ago, lived in a hole in a wall under the train tracks at 55th and Euclid.

Believe it or not, this experience was far from depressing. I have to admit it was empowering. These women and men are real people, with real stories. They have dignity and compassion. They are gracious and show hospitality. They want to pray and just want to be seen and known. Many have mental illnesses. Many are drug and alcohol addicted. They are all beloved children of God!

Of course, we need, as followers of Jesus, to change the systems and structures that keep people homeless. I have heard that there are between 4,000 and 5,000 homeless men, women and children in Cleveland. Each and every night they look for food and shelter. As Christians we need to encourage investment in housing and food programs. But perhaps first we need to see people as people. We

need to retrain our eyes to seeing Jesus in the faces of women and men who occupy the spaces and places we walk through daily.

Our journey ended at St. Malachi's on the near West Side. There, folks gathered for a meal and a place to spend the night. Mary Ann sketched portraits of some of the women and men there. It was magic to see the interaction, the communion, the fellowship.

We returned to the John Carroll annex located on Green Road next to Heinen's. The group joined in a circle in the kitchen and we prayed for those we had seen and served that night. After each name we prayed:

"Poor in the eyes of women and men but rich in the sight of God, St. Benedict Joseph Labre, pray for us."

Indeed, we are all poor but rich in the sight of God. Continue to bring in canned goods for our food cupboard. Work in the garden. Volunteer during Family Promise week when homeless families stay with us. Just pay attention.

Thanks be to God.

"Spiritual but Not Religious? Please Stop Boring Me"

And I tell you that you are Peter, and on this rock I will build my church, and the gates of Hades will not overcome it. Matthew 16:16

Reflection by the Rev. Dr. Lillian Daniel August 31, 2011 Senior Minister, First Congregational Church of Glen Ellyn, IL

On airplanes, I dread the conversation with the person who finds out I am a minister and wants to use the flight time to explain to me that he is "spiritual but not religious." Such a person will always share this as if it is some kind of daring insight, unique to him, bold in its rebellion against the religious status quo.

Next thing you know, he's telling me that he finds God in the sunsets. These people always find God in the sunsets. And in walks on the beach. Sometimes I think these people never leave the beach or the mountains, what with all the communing with God they do on hilltops, hiking trails and... did I mention the beach at sunset yet? Like people who go to church don't see God in the sunset! Like we are these monastic little hermits who never leave the church building. How lucky we are to have these geniuses inform us that God is in nature. As if we don't hear that in the psalms, the creation stories and throughout our deep tradition.

Being privately spiritual but not religious just doesn't interest me. There is nothing challenging about having deep thoughts all by oneself. What is interesting is doing this work in community, where other people might call you on stuff, or heaven forbid, disagree with you. Where life with God gets rich and provocative is when you dig deeply into a tradition that you did not invent all for yourself.

Thank you for sharing, spiritual but not religious sunset person. You are now comfortably in the norm for self-centered American culture, right smack in the bland majority of people who find ancient religions dull but find themselves uniquely fascinating. Can I switch seats now and sit next to someone who has been shaped by a mighty cloud of witnesses instead? Can I spend my time talking to someone brave enough to encounter God in a real human community? Because when this flight gets choppy, that's who I want by my side, holding my hand, saying a prayer and simply putting up with me, just like we try to do in church.

Coming in October 2012: Pilgrimage to Washington D.C.

Even though spring has just sprung and summer is yet to be, it's not too early to start thinking about autumn and a trip being planned for October 13-14 to Washington D.C.

The genesis of this trip arose from the discussion following the Courageous Conversations on Race held at Forest Hill last summer. Many wanted to journey to the key sites of the civil rights movement and to discover and celebrate the history and places of importance to all Americans: Memphis, Birmingham, Atlanta, Selma, Jackson, Washington D.C.
