In the past three summers the cupboard food has been supplemented by fresh vegetables grown in our very own Abundance Acres. In the past few months, day-old bakery items have been added by saints who pick them up at local grocery stores. Barb Cloud and Paul Jennings have started to come on Monday mornings to distribute the food.

It was Kristen Otte's idea to show hospitality to these new friends and neighbors. This breakfast idea may become a monthly event at FHC.

In the parable of the Good Samaritan, Jesus teaches that showing generosity, compassion, hospitality and mercy to the stranger and the outcast is an example of living in the Kingdom of God. On Monday, June 11, 2012 there was a Kingdom of God sighting in Fellowship Hall.

As we continue to grow into our mission of preaching the gospel, equipping the saints, and living into the Micah requirements to "do justice, love kindness and walk humbly before our God," we will find that the places to serve are very close and new neighbors are right outside our doors.

Dear friends,

Thomas Merton, the well-known Trappist monk and prolific author, was speaking to a group of his novices and said:

There is only one thing for anybody to become in life. There's no point in becoming spiritual – the whole thing is a waste of time. What you came here for is to become yourself, to discover your complete identity to be you. But the catch is that of course our full identity as monks and Christians is Christ. It is Christ in each of us. . . I've got to become me in such a way that I am the Christ that can only be the Christ in me. . . each one of us is called and graced to be our true self - the self that God has made us to be.

Families often journey long distances in the summer to attend family reunions. I know a family that travels to the deep South each and every summer to gather with their loved ones to tell stories and share memories, to laugh and to cry. In doing so, each family member re-members her or himself; they reclaim their membership in their unique clan and its common story. The spiritual life is like a family reunion or a homecoming. The spiritual journey is the journey home to our deepest selves. To become all that God calls us to be, to use the gifts that God has woven within us, is the epic journey. When we sincerely desire to discover God's presence in our lives in an authentic, no pretenses, taking off the masks kind of way, we find that we will uncover our true selves and our identity in Christ. We often hear the phrase "coming home to oneself." This is exactly what we are doing as we seek to go deeper in our relationship with God. The marvelous surprise is that when we are journeying –again and again--toward a more authentic *me* that is the *Christ in me*, there, waiting at our heart's home, is an inviting God, beckoning, "Welcome home."

May this summer be a journey home for you.

Children and Youth Ministries

Child care

During the summer months there will be child care for infants through five year olds. Infants and toddlers will be in our nursery and pre-school rooms. Child care will be available every Sunday 9:30-11:30.

Summer Pathways – Biblical Arts Festival

Throughout the summer the children will be participating in workshops that explore the world as it was in the times that Jesus lived. Each Sunday will focus on a type of profession such as a metal worker, carpenter and seamstress; or how things such as cooking and entertainment were done in Bible times. The workshops center on a Bible passage or story, then engage the children in connecting the story to the craft that will help them understand the story and experience the culture of the time. Summer Pathways dates are June 10 & 24, July 8 & 22, August 5 & 19.

On non-Pathways Sundays children in grades 1-6 are encouraged to sit with their families during worship. There will be a basket of quiet activities in the sanctuary for children to use; a library cart with many kinds of books will also be available outside the sanctuary.

Our guest preachers for this summer are OUTSTANDING!

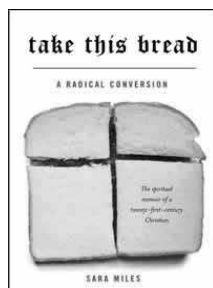

by Sara Miles

Pilgrimage to Rome
From the Shadows to Empire:
Exploring Early Christianity in Rome
March 8-16, 2013

Beneath the bustling surface of modern-day Rome are many layers that tell the story of the church, from its earliest beginnings in the first century during Paul's time to its establishment as the center of western Christianity and empire, to its present complex relationship to other faith traditions and cultures in our increasingly interconnected global community. Join members of Forest Hill Church, Presbyterian and Pastors Clover Reuter Beal and John Lentz, Ph.D. in New Testament scriptures, along with Dr. Timothy Beal, Ph.D. in Hebrew scriptures and advanced research in early Christianity, as we explore these layers in depth, from excavations of early Christian "house churches" twenty feet below today's Roman streets, to monastic movements of St. Francis and Poor Claire of Assisi, to the high art of cathedrals and the Vatican. Our program is part of a series of adult continuing education and faith formation pilgrimages that began four years ago with a rich pilgrimage to the Holy Land, followed by one to the archaeological sites of Turkey and Greece. We continue our journey with Paul, traveling to Rome and reading Romans in context. Local expert guides and our scholars-on-tour, Drs. Lentz and Beal, will open our eyes to great sites in Rome – such as the Forum, the Palatine Hill, ancient house-churches, the catacombs and great Renaissance sites of St. Peter's and the Vatican Museums. Pastor Beal will guide us in worship at historical venues so that we journey in faith together with Paul and other visionary men and women of faith in the first century.

Estimated Costs

\$3900.00 per person based on double occupancy (pending final proposal from Illume and size of group). There will be a land-only option for those who may want to go early, remain longer, or use frequent flyer mileage. The land-only option will not include airfare.

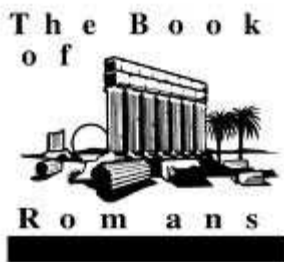

Haiti

An Advent / Epiphany Mission?

The Haiti Team is planning an Advent/Epiphany Mission to Haiti. The exact timing is being discussed with partners in Haiti, but we are aiming for early December 2012 or mid-January 2013.

Participants on this week-long trip will have one of two service options. A “**medical team**” will work at one of two sites – a primary care clinic set up at St. Therese Hospital, or a mobile vaccination program for young children with the Midwives for Haiti. We need trained medical personnel along with others who want to assist but are not formally trained. A “**construction team**” will work with the families of an eco-village constructing buildings, gardens and other basic features in their village – 10 cinder-block homes, a community center, and compost latrines.

We are planning for the team to stay at the l’Hermitage, the hotel in Pandiassou operated by the parents of Ralph Jean-Mary. Each weekday morning the teams will set out to their designated work site and return to the hotel for dinner, discussion and rest.

The trip also may also include visits to the beautiful Bassin Zime waterfall, Port Au Prince and Jacmel.

The cost of the trip is expected to be \$2,000. This includes airline ticket, most meals, hotel and transportation. You will also need a passport and immunizations (Hep. A & B, Typhoid, Tetanus).

On July 15 and August 5 we will host informational meetings for those seriously interested in going on the trip. Meetings will be held after church and include time for questions and more specific details.

December – January is not your usual time for travel but the trip is scheduled around the pre-determined eco-village timeline (which is, thanks be to God, funded by the Presbyterian Church USA!) Interested? Contact Deanne Lentz (**lentz.deanne@gmail.com** or 216-346-6082)

PC(USA) Demographics

Several weeks ago I received demographic data from the Presbyterian Panel of our denomination. I found the data very interesting and sent it to your Elders. You too may find this data informative so I pass it along to you too. Take a look! Any surprising data?

40% of active members were raised in a Presbyterian congregation.

57% of members and 84% of Elders report that they have attended worship service every week or nearly every week over the past year.

51% of members have previously been ordained as elders, deacons or both.

75% of Elders and 50% of members report inviting someone to their congregation in the prior year.

78% of Elders and 69% of members report that they made a financial pledge to their congregation in 2011.

Median “regular giving” in 2010: church member-\$1,560; Elder-\$3,000; Pastor- \$4,940

Reports show that the more one worships, the more one pledges!

56% of Members and 62% of Elders engage in daily prayers.

39% of members and 49% of Elders say they read the Bible at least weekly.

47% of members, 50% of Elders report that they have had “a turning point in [their] life when [they] committed [their] life to Christ.”

42% of members and 45% of ruling elders strongly agree or agree that “only followers of Jesus Christ can be saved.”

37% of members and 30% of elders strongly agree or agree that all the world’s religions are “equally good ways of helping a person find ultimate truth.”

39% of members and 40% of elders consider themselves theologically very conservative or conservative; 39% and 38% moderate; 22% and 22% very liberal or liberal.

Only 30% of members surveyed believe that PCUSA should permit pastors to perform same-sex marriages.

Median annual family income in 2010 was \$76,302 for members, \$88,610 for elders and \$79,947 for pastors.

34% of members have incomes of over \$100,000

Median age for members is 63; 60% of members are female; 94% are white.

43% of membership list their political preference as Republican and 28% as Democrat. 61% of Pastors are Democrats.

Most Presbyterians live in the South (39%) Midwest (30%) Northeast (18%) and West (14%)
