■ ■ The Lessons

Today's Scripture:

Deuteronomy 26: 1-11

When you have come into the land that the Lord your God is giving you as an inheritance to possess, and you possess it, and settle in it, you shall take some of the first of all the fruit of the ground, which you harvest from the land that the Lord your God is giving you, and you shall put it in a basket and go to the place that the Lord your God will choose as a dwelling for his name. You shall go to the priest who is in office at that time, and say to him, "Today I declare to the Lord your God that I have come into the land that the Lord swore to our ancestors to give us." When the priest takes the basket from your hand and sets it down before the altar of the Lord your God, you shall make this response before the Lord your God: "A wandering Aramean was my ancestor; he went down into Egypt and lived there as an alien, few in number, and there he became a great nation, mighty and populous. When the Egyptians treated us harshly and afflicted us, by imposing hard labor on us, we cried to the Lord, the God of our ancestors; the Lord heard our voice and saw our affliction, our toil, and our oppression. The Lord brought us out of Egypt with a mighty hand and an outstretched arm, with a terrifying display of power, and with signs and wonders; and he brought us into this place and gave us this land, a land flowing with milk and honey. So now I bring the first of the fruit of the ground that you, O Lord, have given me." You shall set it down before the Lord your God and bow down before the Lord your God. Then you, together with the Levites and the aliens who reside among you, shall celebrate with all the bounty that the Lord your God has given to you and to your house.

Luke 22: 19-20

Then he took a loaf of bread, and when he had given thanks, he broke it and gave it to them, saying, "This is my body, which is given for you. Do this in remembrance of me." And he did the same with the cup after supper, saying, "This cup that is poured out for you is the new covenant in my blood.

Next Sunday: **Genesis 15: 1-12, 17-18; Psalm 27; Philippians 3:17 - 4:1; Luke 13: 31-35.** As part of your daily devotions, read the lessons. What image or word catches your attention? How do they settle or challenge you? Keep notes of your observations in a journal. Set aside part of each day for prayer and study.

Adult Education: Suffering and the Crisis of Faith February 17 and 24

Elder Tom Zych, "Is God Really Good? God's Justice amid Our Suffering" We will take a mature, honest, unsentimental look at whether God can be omnipotent, omniscient and just at the same time, and ultimately address the question "Why Do Bad Things Happen to Good People?" or, more to the point, "Why Do Bad Things Happen to Me (when all those schnooks have all the fun)?"

6:30 pm Soup and Bread Supper; 7:15 pm Lecture and discussion
Anger toward God: A Response to Suffering
Julie J. Exline, Ph. D.
Associate Professor of Psychology
Case Western Reserve University

Continuing with our Lenten series on "Suffering and the Crisis of Faith," Dr. Exline's talk will give a brief overview of the topic of anger toward God. Although such anger is common, the topic is often veiled in secrecy and fear, leaving people isolated if they experience such feelings. The presentation will identify situations in which anger toward God tends to arise, as well as certain thought patterns, family background factors, and personality styles that make such anger more likely. Controversial issues

will be raised, such as the question of whether anger toward God is morally acceptable and the finding that some nonbelievers report anger around the idea of God. Strategies will also be presented to help people cope with anger toward God.
