Deanne and I have been using the devotional from Upper Room Books entitled *A Guide to Prayer for all God's People*, edited by Rueben Job and Norman Shawchuck. Each morning we take our coffee into the living room and read the prayers and bible passages.

There was one particular entry, in fact it was the first entry of the first day of Lent, that has continued to agitate me deeply. Richard Foster, the author of *Freedom of Simplicity*, writes:


The Desert Fathers renounced speech in order to learn compassion... Silence frees us from the need to control others. One reason we can hardly bear to remain silent is that it makes us feel so helpless. We are accustomed to relying upon words to manage and control others. A frantic stream of words flows from us in an attempt to straighten others out. We want so desperately for them to agree with us, to see things our way. We evaluate people, judge people, condemn people. We devour people with our words. Silence is one of the deepest Disciplines of the Spirit simply because it puts the stopper on that.

I am trying to be more careful with my speech and more aware of the words I use. I want to listen better. For a preacher, this is hard. We make our living out of words. But it makes sense that I should listen before I speak, and attempt to hear that "still small voice" before I become enamored by the sound of my own voice.

Our world is filled with so many words, but it is the gentle words of love from God that we yearn to hear. So talk less and listen more.

Anger toward God: A Response to Suffering
Julie J. Exline, Ph. D.
Associate Professor of Psychology
Case Western Reserve University

Continuing with our Lenten series on "Suffering and the Crisis of Faith," Dr. Exline's talk will give a brief overview of the topic of anger toward God. Although such anger is common, the topic is often veiled in secrecy and fear, leaving people isolated if they experience such feelings. The presentation will identify situations in which anger toward God tends to arise, as well as certain thought patterns, family background factors, and personality styles that make such anger more likely. Controversial issues will be raised, such as the question of whether anger toward God is morally acceptable and the finding that some nonbelievers report anger around the idea of God. Strategies will also be presented to help people cope with anger toward God.

From the Clover patch...

Dear friends,

One of my favorite authors is a Presbyterian minister and author (who many of you know too), Frederick Buechner. Buechner has these words and some very challenging questions for Lent. I encourage you to take seriously these questions for these forty days.

In many cultures there is an ancient custom of giving a tenth of each year's income to some holy use. For Christians, to observe the forty days of Lent is to do the same thing with roughly a tenth of each year's days. After being baptized by John in the river Jordan, Jesus went off alone into the wilderness where he spent forty days asking himself the question what it meant to be Jesus. During Lent, Christians are supposed to ask one way or another what it means to be themselves.

If you had to bet everything you have on whether there is a God or whether there isn't, which side would get your money and why?

When you look at your face in the mirror, what do you see in it that you most like and what do you see in it that you most deplore?

If you had only one last message to leave to the handful of people who are most important to you, what would it be in twenty-five words or less?

Of all the things you have done in our life, which is the one you would most like to undo? Which is the one that makes you happiest to remember?

Is there any person in the world, or any cause, that, if circumstances called for it, you would be willing to die for?

If this were the last day of your life, what would you do with it?

To hear yourself try to answer questions like these is to begin to hear something not only of who you are but of both what you are becoming and what you are failing to become. It can be a pretty depressing business all in all, but if sack-cloth and ashes are at the start of it, something like Easter may be at the end.

May we use these 40 days to ask ourselves what might be The Question that life calls us to answer: what does it mean to be myself?

May you trust God's presence with you in your Lenten journey of exploration.
