Truly, you, the members and friends of Forest Hill Church, continue to inspire, challenge, and amaze. New ministry and mission is emerging: Green Team, Race Core Team, Pantry Breakfast, Labre Mission, Black History Month. Folks have been to Haiti and are about to go again. Following the lead of the young people, a small group now hosts a monthly Monday morning breakfast for 25 people. Family Promise continues to serve homeless families by hosting them at the church for a week at a time.

Thank you Morag Keefe (and Tom, Brynn and Megan) for your gift of food preparation and service. Thank you, Peg Weissbrod. Yes, you are kind of on staff (at very modest pay) but the time you give to the website, to researching data bases, to church growth issues and spiritual gift assessments, to publicity and to filling in when Lynda is on vacation is appreciated.

Dear friends,

This story has always been one of my favorites because of the honesty of the sick man. So human. So vulnerable. He had been ill for 38 years waiting beside the beautiful pools of Bethsaida. Jesus saw him, walked to him, and asked him the strangest question. Or, so it seemed. “Do you want to be made well?” He had been lying there near the healing pools for 38 years! He had been waiting for someone to carry him into the waters to receive his healing, he said. Clearly, he had wanted to be healed. And, yet, he promptly responded with an excuse as to why he couldn’t be healed. I have no one to carry me in. I am here just waiting for someone to help me. I am not able to bring about my own healing. This is a silent man waiting for someone to carry him to his healing pool?

Remember, in stark comparison, other examples of healing in the gospels: the woman who bled for 12 years who followed Jesus and risked grasping the hem of his garment and was instantly healed. Remember Jairus who sought healing for his 12 year old dying daughter? Remember the beggar by the side of the road crying so loudly that the disciples tried to shut him up? Yet, he cried even louder to get Jesus’ attention? Remember the man who sought Jesus to heal his son who suffered from epilepsy? Remember the friends who brought their friend to Jesus on a mat, lowered him down through the roof before Jesus’ feet and Jesus healed him?

There are many, many examples of proactive seekers, grasping hold of the healing power of God. So trusting and vulnerable that they could not be ignored or turned down. Trusting that the One in whom they believed would respond in grace and mercy. What, though, moved Jesus to seek out the quiet man near the pools? Jesus turned and his eyes took hold of him. Tell me what you seek.

Are we like this man? Do we wait in passivity for someone else to bring about our healing? To rescue us from our troubles? To save us from our hardships? What excuses do you use to release yourself from any responsibility for being proactive in seeking healing for what plagues you? Do you want to be made well, set free? That's an answer you alone can answer. Take a risk. Be honest. Trust that God hears. Ask.

Let me know when you get your answer.


## News from the Web

### **Faith Leader #7, 2012-2013** ***One of the Best Experiences of My Life***

When I was invited last summer to participate in the Faith Leader small group program, I was excited about the process, but apprehensive about the time commitment (28 weeks; Sunday evenings from 5-7 pm) and where I was on my spiritual journey. Given my skepticism and uncertainty about my faith, I was concerned I might be the only one who "didn't get it." These concerns and doubts quickly dissipated during the initial retreat last fall, where I discovered I was in a safe space to be "me" and to believe whatever I believe. Over the course of the class, an amazing small group of people shared many joys, past hurts, doubts, fears, and epiphanies as we examined our spiritual practices and our relationships with God. My Sunday evenings were cherished time for me to slow down, delve deeper, and interact with an amazing group of people.

During the class I realized how a few traumatic events in my life have shaped my views about religion and God in a negative way. Conversely, I was reminded how my mom and grandparents had very positive influences on my spiritual life.

I've struggled for a long time to understand what and who God is. My scientific, concrete mind wants tangible proof, while my heart and body yearn for something to comfort and guide me. My fellow participants were quick to point out that God is present in everyday events and people. For me, I now see God when a stranger holds the door for me, when a friend offers to pray for me, when my daughter rides her bike for the first time without training wheels, and when my wife and I have 15 minutes together at dinner after a long day at work.

Our class culminated with a spring weekend retreat at Lake Chautauqua. I am blessed to have been given the opportunity to participate in Faith Leader and I look forward to doing my part to make Forest Hills Church the amazing church and community that it is. My personal plan for ministry is to get involved with the Labre Outreach Initiative and offer my administrative and organizational gifts to the team of folks who are working hard to improve lives of our neighbors in East Cleveland.

## GUN VIOLENCE AND GOSPEL VALUES

On Saturday, May 4 over 80 people from all over the Cleveland metro area gathered in Fellowship Hall to spend a day with the Rev. Jim Atwood. Rev. Atwood delivered three talks, took questions and led discussions on the issue of Gun Violence and Gospel Values. Atwood brings a unique mix to the table, for he is a gun owner, hunter and a member of the NRA. He is a retired preacher. He knows the statistics and data about the human cost of gun violence. He brings a deep passion for theology and the gospel to his task. He co-authored our denomination's social witness policy about Gun Violence. Jim authored ***America and Its Guns: a Theological Exposé***. (2012). The May 4 event was co-sponsored by the Church of the Covenant and the Presbytery of the Western Reserve. Special thanks goes to the Rev. Laury Larson and Laura VanDale, a member of the staff of the Presbytery.

All in the audience acknowledged that gun violence in America is a result of many things. But there was hope that a day was coming when sensible gun legislation might lead us beyond the rhetoric and division.

Some members of Forest Hill Church who were in the crowd are interested in forming a book group to read Atwood's ***America and Its Guns***.

Others wanted to the names of all who died of gun violence in Cuyahoga Co. in our weekly prayers of the people.

One said she would begin to cut out newspaper headlines concerned with gun violence and add to it week after week until we all better comprehended the breadth of this issue.

There is hope of organizing a Forest Hill event in which members representing a variety of perspectives on this issue might share why they feel the way they do and reflect upon their biblical and theological perspective.

*You know we are getting new hymnals this fall – many of you have ordered them to honor or remember someone. But do you know whay we are getting them, and how the new hymnal came into being?*

The 216<sup>th</sup> General Assembly (2004) of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) authorized to the Presbyterian Publishing Corporation (PPC), the Presbyterian Association of Musicians, and the Office of Theology and Worship to research the feasibility of a new Presbyterian hymnal. The results of this feasibility study were to be reported to the 217<sup>th</sup> General Assembly (2006). With the help of Research Services of the PC(USA), a questionnaire was developed and distributed to members of the Presbyterian Panel. This Panel consists of three nationally representative samples of groups affiliated with the PC(USA): members, elders, and ordained ministers. Research Services tabulated the results and presented them to the 2006 General Assembly, which authorized the PPC to research, develop, and produce a new hymnal. The PPC has assumed all costs for the development and production of the hymnal, including the expenses of the Presbyterian Committee on Congregational Song (PCOCS). No money has been spent from the denomination's budget.

Members of the PCOCS were selected and met in the fall of 2008. The PCOCS consisted of fifteen voting members (two of whom were under the

age of twenty-five), the editor (with vote), and three ex officio members appointed by the three denominational entities: the Presbyterian Association of Musicians, the Presbyterian Publishing Corporation, and the Office of Theology and Worship. They began their work by writing guiding theological and language statements. Enriching and challenging conversations throughout the process examined tunes' singability, theology's deepest questions, and texts' clarity. After culling through over 10,000 submissions, 3 years of meetings, and countless hours of homework, the PCOCS's final meeting was in January 2012.

The biblical narrative contains many references to singing joyfully to our God. In every generation we are called to claim our song and bear witness to what God is doing in the world. A new hymnal will give us an opportunity to make available a great wealth of hymns and spiritual songs that have arisen since the 1990 hymnal, to acquaint worshipers with wonderful resources from Christian communities around the world, and to review again the great heritage of congregational songs that have been passed on to us from past generations of faithful worshipers.

May God continue to guide us on this path of discernment, and may our next hymnal help God's people sing joyfully for generations yet to come!
