I have read **Sojourners** Magazine for years (FHC has a subscription in the library) and have always thought highly of Jim Wallis, the founder and CEO of **Sojourners**. He believes that "the common good and the quality of our life together will finally be determined by the personal decisions we all make." In a recent on-line posting he shares "10 Decisions You Can Make to Change the World."

- 1. If you are a father or a mother, make your children the most important priority in your life and build your other commitments around them. If you are not a parent, look for children who could benefit from your investment in their lives.
- 2. If you are married, be faithful to your spouse. Demonstrate your commitment with both your fidelity and your love. If you are single, measure your relationships by their integrity, not their usefulness.
- 3. If you are a person of faith, focus not just on what you believe but on how you act on those beliefs. If you love God, ask God how to love your neighbor.
- 4. Take the place you live seriously. Make the context of your life and work the parish that you take responsibility for.
- 5. Seek to develop a vocation and not just a career. Discern your gifts as a child of God, not just your talents, and listen for your calling rather than just looking for opportunities. Remember that your personal good always relates to the common good.
- 6. Make choices by distinguishing between wants and needs. Choose what is enough, rather than what is possible to get. Replace appetites with values, teach your children the same, and model those values for all who are in your life.

- 7. Look at the business, company, or organization where you work from an ethical perspective. Ask what its vocation is, too. Challenge whatever is dishonest or exploitative and help your place of work do well by doing good.
- 8. Ask yourself what in the world today most breaks your heart and offends your sense of justice. Decide to help change that and join with others who are committed to transforming that injustice.
- 9. Get to know who your political representatives are at both the local and national level. Study their policy decisions and examine their moral compass and public leadership. Make your public convictions and commitments known to them and choose to hold them accountable.
- 10. Since the difference between events and movements is sacrifice, which is also the true meaning of religion and what makes for social change, ask yourself what is important enough to give your life to and for.

Finding the integral relationship between your own personal good and the common good is your best contribution to our future. And it is the best hope we have for a better life together.

### The Good Death

"When clouds are full, they empty rain on the earth." - Ecclesiastes 11:3

Roger died on a recent Monday night, and though it sounds strange to say, he died a good death, for yes, if death comes to us all, why can't it sometimes be "good"? Not to say that there has not been grief and the ache of deep missing, the empty rooms and things packed away that will never be shared again. No, not mine to "judge" what such a death means, but only to witness the goodness I have seen: For the past three months since he sat propped in his hospital bed and was told of his cancer for which there was no cure, Roger has been emptying his life in forgiveness, thank you, love and good-bye. Remarkable really, to witness his path, as he summoned family and friends for the conversations he needed, the release of words, deeds, many long since forgotten. Privilege really, to walk in and out of the home of care his family had made - his recliner by the window, the feeder outside and songbirds praising. To witness amidst all the fluttering and duty, a stilling, quieting as well - the sharing of memories, and holding of hands. For some, there will be no time like this. So many other deaths full of other words than "good" - but a wrenching out of life, with no time for kind words and a parting kiss. No, we do not often get to choose - but what if today we did? Chose here, among the living, with so many deaths before us - that in all the filling of today might be an emptying as well of forgiveness, thank you, love and goodbye.

**Prayer:** Amidst all the filling, today, an emptying. Amen.

## **Children Ministries**

On June 9 we celebrated all of our wonderful teachers, leaders, mentors, and shepherds who have given their gifts of time and teaching to our children as they learn of our faith. These programs are successful because of their dedication, energy and commitment to our children and youth. Thank you.

#### Childcare

During the summer months there will be child care for infants through five year olds. Infants and toddlers will be in our nursery and pre-school rooms if needed. Child care will be available every Sunday from 9:30-11:30.

#### Summer Pathways

Throughout the summer the children will be participating in workshops that explore six parables.

Jesus knew that people learned best through stories. Jesus was a storyteller: With many such parables he spoke the word to them, as they were able to hear it; he did not speak to them except in parables... (Mark 4: 33-34)

Throughout the summer months children entering first through sixth grade are invited to explore in creative and engaging activities the parables of *Wise and Foolish Builders* (Matthew 7:21-29, Luke 6:46-49), *The Unmerciful Servant* (Matthew 18:21-35), *The Friend in the Night* (Luke 11:5-13), *The Great Banquet* (Luke 14:16-24), *the Workers in the Field* (Matthew 20:1-16), and *The Vineyard and the Farmers* (Mark 12: 1-12, Matthew 21:33-46, Luke 20: 9-19). Just as Jesus spoke in parables, we continue to speak in parables to share his stories and teachings.

On non-Pathways Sundays children in grades 1-6 are encouraged to sit with their families during worship. There are baskets of quiet activities in the sanctuary for children to use; a library cart with many kinds of books will also be available outside the sanctuary. Thank you to Alisha Trammell, Laurie Logan, Pat & Jim Seeders and Deanne Lentz for leading these workshops this summer.

#### Family Fellowship Friday

The summer focus for our children is exploring the parables. We would like to broaden this exploration to include all members of our church family. On Friday, July 26<sup>th</sup> we have planned **an intergenerational event** to discover, discern, explore and participate in activities around the parable of *Lazarus and the Rich Man*, Luke 16:19-31.

Please join us at 5:30 for a potluck dinner; bring a side dish or dessert to share and your main dish. Charcoal grills will be set up for hamburgers and other grillables. Forest Hill will provide the beverages and dishware. The program part of the evening will begin around 6:30.

Being in fellowship with a faith community is a significant part of growing your own faith. I hope you will join us for this event.

#### Get Connected!



## Youth Director Update



## Family Promise Host Week



Last year, on a warm summer evening, streams of water flew across Forest Hill Church's courtyard. The sound of children squealing echoed off the walls as they ran and

danced with big fluorescent squirt guns in their hands.

Sue Lafferty vividly remembers that night, when Forest Hill Church opened its doors to house local families through Family Promise of Greater Cleveland. She said that night with the squirt guns is one of her fondest memories in the four years she's been volunteering with the organization.

"Later that night," she said, "one of the moms said thank you with tears in her eyes because her children just had a chance to play and have fun, completely forgetting the hardships their family was enduring at the time. To me, that was an example of genuine Forest Hill Church hospitality."

Family Promise of Greater Cleveland (formerly Interfaith Hospitality Network) is a non-profit organization that provides shelter, meals and social services to homeless families with dependent children, including households headed by couples, single mothers, single fathers or other legal guardians. Family Promise serves up to 28 people at a time, usually eight to 10 families, and it is the only organization in Cleveland that allows families to stay together while they try to find permanent housing.

During the day, families are provided shelter at the Family Promise Resource Center in Tremont. There is a nursery for babies, quiet rooms, showers, laundry, a kitchen, and a resource center used for training programs, housing and employment searches. The organization provides transportation for guest children to and from their home schools, and it also provides families with bus passes for guests seeking jobs, housing or other appointments.

Every night, host churches provide overnight accommodations and meals. More than 80 faith-based organizations on the east and west side participate, and Forest Hill Church has served as a host since 2008. This summer, from July 7-14, Forest Hill will open its doors for Family Promise families once again. Several area support churches will help but volunteers are still needed! Forest Hill's Family Promise coordinators, Julie Lustic, Anne Smith and Sue Lafferty, plan two-hour volunteer shifts, always with another volunteer and coordinator.

The following jobs always need to be filled each time the church hosts:

- Set-up volunteers—Responsible for about one hour after church on the first day of hosting to transform education rooms into bedrooms for guests.
- **Bed movers**—Responsible for meeting the truck at 9:30 a.m. the first Sunday of host week and moving the beds upstairs.
- **Dinner providers and hosts**—Responsible for making part of a planned dinner for guests and eating with them. This job requires being at the church by 5 p.m. and staying until 6:45 p.m.
- Activity Hosts—Responsible for being at the church from 6:45-8:45 p.m. Hosts play with the children, talk with the adults and provide support for the families through the evening. This does not require elaborate planning, although it's great if the host brings a craft and/or a simple, fun activity to do with the families, and there is always a coordinator present throughout the evening.
- **Overnight Hosts**—Responsible for sleeping at the church with the families. Hosts sleep in the chapel, need to be at the church at 8:45 p.m. and may leave as soon as the families leave in the morning, usually by 7 a.m.
- **Bed movers**—Responsible for moving the beds downstairs and loading them onto the truck around 9:30 a.m. on the last Sunday of host week.
- **Clean-up volunteers**—Responsible for about one hour of clean up on the last Sunday of host week from approximately 8:30-9:30am.
- Laundry Volunteers—Responsible for one load of laundry/a few bags of linens on the final Sunday.
- **Truck driver**—Responsible for picking up the Penske truck in Bedford and driving it, loaded with the beds, to the next congregation on the last Sunday of host week.

Visit the Earth Care Blue Board in Fellowship Hall frequently to stay in touch and keep informed! However, this board is not our only communication tool. In order to ratchet up visibility further on our conscious effort to become engaged in



Earth Care, we'll be expanding the message on the FHC website, contributing monthly offerings in the Tower, and sending out special email blasts when warranted. And in the fall, look for a special movie night – replete with popcorn – where we'll engage in viewing an environmental-related documentary and ensuing discussion.



## What is "Mi Pueblo"? aka Culture Camp at Forest Hill Church

Mi Pueblo is a weeklong Latin American Culture Camp, providing fun and cultural awareness for children adopted from Latin America and their siblings. The Camp, sponsored by the parent support group, Concern for Children, is held every summer during the third week in June in Cleveland Heights, Ohio.

Mi Pueblo, which means "My People," "My Village," "My Nation" in Spanish, is one of only a handful of similar camps for children of Latin American heritage. While most campers are from throughout Northeast Ohio, some have come from Columbus, Cincinnati and Athens, Ohio and the states of California, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Michigan, Pennsylvania and Wisconsin.

The camp provides children, who range in age from 18 months to 14 years, with a positive and fun environment in which they may learn about the cultural heritage of their birth countries, and can gain pride in both their heritage and themselves. Classes in dance, music games, crafts, culture and Spanish language all focus upon the traditions of Latin American Countries.

In addition, campers are treated to special guests throughout the week. Past years have included presentations on the animals from Central and South America, Latin America art and citizens from a number of Latin American countries who talk about growing up in their native lands. Latin American bands and Dance Theater troupes have also entertain campers. Culminating the week's activities is a Fiesta celebration on Friday nights. Campers, dressed in traditional costumes, present dances and songs they learned during the week. Each year Camp activities focus upon a theme. Recent themes have included "Latin America Through the 20th Century" and "The Nature of Latin America."

The classes at the Camp are taught by members of the Cleveland Latino community, giving campers positive role models who share their heritage.

All other Camp operations are covered by more than 60 volunteers including parents of the campers anxious to learn about the culture of their children's birth countries. Over twenty teen and young adult volunteers, many of who were adopted from Latin America also give support. The campers develop a special bond with the teens, seeing young adults who are "just like me." A special evening for the teen volunteers is held during the week of camp.

The sponsor of Mi Pueblo is Concern for Children, a nonprofit parents' support group in Northeast Ohio that assists families to adopt from a number of countries in Latin America, and provides continuing support and education for families after the children arrive in the U.S.A.
