In the wonderful story in 1 Kings 19, we read about the soon to be prophet *Clover's Patch*Elisha going about his expected and necessary work of plowing his field--doing what he was supposed to be doing—while out of nowhere, the prophet, Elijah, heard from God that Elisha was the man to take Elijah's place as God's new mouthpiece. Elijah sought out Elisha to give him the news. He threw his mantel over Elisha's shoulders right there in the middle of the field, and told him he'd been *CALLED UP*. Called up by God for important work.

That's often the way being called up for a duty, task, job, or role happens. So often, we discover our call to ministry through the invitation from someone else. We get INVITED to a new job, deployed in the name of the living God to a new role.

Not to such a dramatic extent as Elisha's call perhaps, but that's what we at FHC seek to do. We trust and believe that God is a living God, giving God's children gifts and passions and skills that are necessary for the work in the community of faith and in the world. It often takes someone else to initiate the conversation and to extend the invitation. Our Nominating Committee does its work every month, every year. Children's Ministry Programs 2013-2014

Crib and Nursery

Tracy Long, our permanent childcare provider, and Jill Roberts, our substitute, will continue to care for our littlest member of our congregation. We also ask volunteers to help staff this room. We hope all families will find this place to be a caring and nurturing place to leave their children while they have an opportunity to worship. Child care begins at 9:15 to 12:30 upstairs in the Monticello wing.

Children in Worship Pre Schoolers and Kindergarteners (ages 3-5)

This worship experience allows the children to be in an environment where age appropriate Bible stories are shared. The children are guided through a worship service and are encouraged to respond to the stories through songs, art, questions and retelling of the stories.

Pathways to the Promise Land (grades 1-5)

Our church school for these children is a workshop rotation model. This model focuses on the variety of ways in which the children learn. The children participate in monthly workshops that revolve around the yearly theme. During a three-week rotation the children rotate among workshops to experience the same Bible focus in different learning styles. The lessons are designed as a kid-friendly, teacher-friendly, facility-transforming way to teach Bible stories and truths.

The theme for the upcoming program year is *The Word of God*. The Word of God, as passed on to us through the Bible and the lives of the faithful, is a multifaceted jewel providing us many different ways to enter into the story of faith. The children will be exploring Bible stories as sources of guidance and support. From Genesis to Revelation, God's word continues to be relevant in our lives.

Our first rotation is **How the Bible Came to Be**. It is through the Bible that we come to know the word of God as experienced by people of faith. The children will participate in an art, movement and scavenger hunt workshops as they explore this theme.

The children will be divided this year in the following groups: Grade 1/2, Grades 3/4, and Grade 5.

Music Notes

Martin Luther once proclaimed:

Singers are never sorrowful, but are merry, and they smile through their troubles in song. Music makes people kinder, gentler, more staid and reasonable. I am persuaded that after theology, music is the only art capable of affording peace and joy of heart. The devil flees before the sound of music almost as much as before the Word of God.

Certainly, Martin Luther is suggesting that you join a choir!

The 2013-2014 choir season is about to begin and I'm looking forward to seeing all our FHC musical families getting back to work (and play!). Those who participated in choir last year will receive an email or snail mail, but here's the general information for persons who may be interested in finding out about the musical opportunities at Forest Hill Church:

THE CHOIRS

Chancel Choir (adults; high school and college students warmly welcomed): 1st rehearsal will be Thursday, Sept. 5 beginning with a pot-luck supper and general frivolity at 6:40 in Fellowship Hall. Bring whatever dish you enjoy preparing (or purchasing) and we'll have a fine time getting caught up and electing new choir officers. The rehearsal takes place from 7:30 to 9:00 pm. Our first choir Sunday is September 8th (rehearsal at 10:30 AM-service at 11:00 am).

Sine Nomine Choir (grades 6-12; college students warmly welcomed): 1st rehearsal will be Sunday, Sept. 8 in the Chapel after worship. Generally we'll meet every other Sunday (with occasional exceptions) for 30-40 minutes. We'll elect officers at the first rehearsal (looks good on college apps ©).

Descant Choir (grades 1-5): 1st rehearsal will be Sunday, Sept. 8 at 9:30 am in the sanctuary. The choir practices every Sunday, and after choir (10:15) there is an activities period in youth hall. At 10:45, the children meet their parents in Fellowship Hall and go from there to the sanctuary.

Voices in Bronze (high school students and adults): 1st rehearsal for our handbell ringers will be Thursday, Sept. 12 from 6:20 - 7:15 pm in the upstairs bell room. An understanding of rhythmic notation is required. There is currently one opening in this group.

Forest Hill Steel Drum Band (all ages): This group plays for worship several times per year. Up to six people at a time can play and the players are always changing. Rehearsals are arranged at the convenience of the players and take place around three weeks before the performance.

I hope to see lots of new faces and fresh voices intermingled with the "regulars" in the choir family this September.

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And now, back to the words of Martin Luther: "I wish to see all arts, particularly music, in the service of Him who gave and created them." That quote will be the guiding light in our special arts offerings this program year. Throughout the year, several of our worship services will be enhanced by a particular art form: music, visual art, dance, drama or poetry (we call these AWE services, Alternate Worship Experiences). The first one will be on Sunday, September 29 when a group from Roots of American Music (Kevin Richards, director) will lead us in traditional hymn singing accompanied by such instruments as mandolin, fiddle, penny whistle, upright bass and guitar. During October we will celebrate World Communion Sunday, October 6, with global songs, prayers, poetry and decorative elements. Also in October, a dedication of our new hymnals will take place, followed by a special AWE service celebrating the musical and poetic treasures in this new book. "Something old, something new, something different" will be the theme of that morning (date to be arranged, dependant on when the hymnals arrive).

When you know the contact information and receive emails (if you wish), you can add your signature to petitions that, with thousands of other petitions, go to Congress men and women and cabinet members with the click of a mouse. It's as easy as that! There are several that are worth becoming involved with. We'll post these as well as their newsletters from time to time.

Of course any advocacy on your part is strictly personal and voluntary – but is enthusiastically supported by our larger church body, PCUSA. "Separation of church and state" only goes so far!

### Book Review Zealot: The Life and Times of Jesus of Nazareth, by Reza Aslan

Reza Aslan's new book **Zealot** has received a lot of recent attention. Aslan has appeared on the Daily Show and most notoriously on Fox News where the interviewer didn't discuss the book as much as wanted to drive home the point that Aslan is a Muslim, so why should he be writing a book about Jesus? It was embarrassing! (You can see it on YouTube)

All the notoriety aside, I decided to read the book. While it doesn't open fresh scholarship, it certainly is readable. The opening 70 pages paint a marvelous portrayal of life in Palestine in the first century. I think his Jesus is as close to a historical portrayal as one can get.

I liked it. I think it constructs, for those who know bits and pieces of the history behind the gospels, a good broad picture. Aslan does a good job of separating the Jesus of history from the Christ of faith.

Aslan, like all critical scholars, understands that the Gospels are faith documents, not strictly historical recounts of the life of Jesus. He reconstructs this biography of Jesus based on the earliest of the gospels Mark, and the shared source of Luke and Matthew which is Q (German for "source"). He shares his knowledge of Josephus (the Jewish chronicler of the first century) and he is familiar with all the Roman sources.

### Founder of Center for Integrative Medicine to speak at Fairmount Presbyterian Church September 18

Dr. Mimi Guarneri, a national pioneer in integrative medicine, will be the guest speaker at a William Birkett Williams public lecture at Fairmount Presbyterian Church in Cleveland Heights Wednesday, September 18, beginning at 7:00 pm.

She will speak on the topic "Treating the Whole Person: Body, Mind and Spirit." Dr. Guarneri, a cardiologist, is the founder and medical director of the Scripps Center for Integrative Medicine in San Diego and the president of the American Board of Integrative Holistic Medicine. Integrative medicine addresses the lifestyle, emotional and spiritual needs of patients as well as the physical.

In her book, *The Heart Speaks: A Cardiologist Reveals the Secret Language of Healing*, Dr. guarneri says new research shows the heart is a multi-layered, complex organ that "possesses intelligence, memory and decision-making abilities that are separate from the mind." At the Scripps Center she uses state-of-the-art cardiac imaging technology and lifestyle change programs to diagnose, prevent and treat cardiovascular disease. "To treat heart problems," she says, "we have to look at what is going on with someone in their life, their environment, their family, how they're eating, and how they're living their lives."

Dr. Guarneri received her medical degree from SUNY Medical Center in New York and did her internship and residency at Cornell Medical Center. In 2009 she was honored as Scientist of the Year by the San Diego chapter of ARCS (Achievement Rewards for College Scientists).

The lecture, part of Fairmount's ongoing William Birkett Williams Lecture Series, is free and open to the public. Reservations for preferred seating are strongly encouraged. They may be made by email (**jean@stephenson.tv**) or by phone **(440-255-7851)**. There will be a reception following the talk, and Dr. Guarneri will sign copies of her book.
