Dear Friends,

Occasionally someone will ask me: "John, how do you select the biblical passages for your sermon each week?" Well, this year, that question is easy to answer. Clover and I are preaching from Genesis. We will follow the narrative from creation to covenant; from Adam and Eve, Abraham and Sarah, to Jacob and Joseph; through the Negev desert and into Egypt. It is a stunning story. We hope that you will read and study along.

However, preaching on one book of the Bible over time is a relatively new practice for me. I have, throughout my career, chosen one the passages selected by the Revised Common Lectionary.

(the following information is from Wikipedia)

The Revised Common Lectionary is a selection of biblical passages for use in Protestant Christian worship making provisions for the liturgical year (for example: Advent, Lent, Easter, Ordinary Time) with its patterns of festivals and seasons.

The Lectionary runs in three year cycles (Years A,B,C) and beings on the first Sunday in Advent. On December 1 of this year we will begin Year A. The readings of the lectionary are chosen by a consulting team made up of representatives of 20 Protestant denominations. Yes, the Presbyterian Church (USA) has representation.

The major principal of the lectionary is to hear the voice of the author of biblical books week after week rather than the readings being selected by theme. So, in a major way, the practice of preaching through Genesis is true to this lectionary spirit!

The Revised Common Lectionary was released in 1994. The Roman Catholic Church has a lectionary as well. Due to a variety of reasons, the RC lectionary does not coincide with the Revised Common Lectionary. The practice of a lectionary goes back to the practice in the monastery of reading selected psalms and passages throughout the year to ensure the complete reading of the Hebrew Scripture and New Testament.

Not every preacher uses the lectionary. Some feel that proscribed readings stifle their creativity. Others suggest that the lectionary does not speak to contemporary issues that arise from week to week. Both of these criticisms are true from time to time.

However, I have found following the lectionary a profound spiritual practice or discipline. Each Monday, I read the passages selected for the next Sunday. Each week something new arises in the text. I do not bring my agenda to the text. The text agitates me deeply to open my mind and imagination to read and be led. It is often uncanny how one or more of the passages selected by the lectionary speaks directly to issues of contemporary concern.

Whatever your method, it is a good spiritual practice to read the Bible daily in order to know your faith story and to learn who God is and what God is calling you to be and do in your life.

In the weeks ahead, we are looking forward to hearing reflections from others. We hope that by taking a moment to listen to members share their experiences and beliefs concerning the meaning of stewardship and tithing, we all will be prompted to reflect upon the dynamic relationship between our own faith journeys and resources, the Church's needs and priorities, and the needs of the world around us (both locally and beyond).
