Dear Friends,

The festival of Epiphany (Jan. 6) marks a new direction in the Christian year. The twelve days of Christmas are over. Epiphany is, according to the tradition, the day that the Magi come from the east to the manger of Jesus. Epiphany comes from a Greek word which is usually translated "manifestation." "Epiphany" is also a term in literary criticism for a sudden realization – a flash of recognition in which someone or something is seen in a new light.

When the Magi from the east, with all their learning, come to the cradle they see something unexpected. They get a flash of recognition and a new insight. They were thinking king, they get a baby. They were expecting "power" like Herod, and they get "vulnerable" like a nursing child. BUT, instead of feeling gypped and disappointed and running back to Herod to report that there is nothing to worry about, the visitors recognize that something else is going on. They leave their gifts. We are told, by Matthew, that they do not return to Herod but "left for their own country by another road." (Matthew 2:12)

Poets have had a field day with the "by another road" metaphor. Is it the "road less travelled" of Frost? Or, in the words of T.S. Eliot "We returned to our places, these Kingdoms// but no longer at ease here, in the old dispensation,// with an alien people clutching their gods."

As Epiphany comes and goes and as the new calendar year moves towards February and beyond, be open to surprises and insights. Pay attention and have the courage to follow your heart. If you need to walk along a new path or head in a new direction, may you have the faith and courage to do Perhaps hold your expectations loosely. As Alice Walker writes; "Expect nothing and live frugally on surprise!" Who do you need to look at in a new light? A friend, a spouse, yourself? Don't stereotype or judge too quickly. Who knows what God has in store for you this winter!

Whatever road you are on, have a light step and keep your eyes open!

Dear Forest Hill Friends,

I wish you all a blessed New Year – full of happiness, love and a renewed generosity of spirit as we recover from the hustle and bustle of the holidays.

On January 5, we look forward to singing *We Three Kings* as our three FHC kings journey down the aisle, decked out in their beautiful flowing robes and bright headgear (given in memory of Bill Tapié) as they offer their glittering treasures to the Christ Child.

I would like to heartily welcome new choir members: Cassie Webster in the Descant Choir; and Kathy Carr, Carol Wedell, and Michael Nicoletti in the Chancel Choir. What wonderful vocal contributions these new singers are making!

During January, the Chancel, Descant and Sine Nomine choirs will begin work on Song of Hope, a work for three choirs, soloists and chamber orchestra. I was commissioned by Forest Hill Church to compose a major choral work, and this was the result. Song of Hope received its premiere on March 28, 2004. It's been ten years since that performance and I daresay it's time for a repeat!

The textual structure of the piece is based on the eight Beatitudes that mark the opening of the Sermon on the Mount in the gospel of St. Matthew. Many believe that the Beatitudes are the most beautiful and wise statements ever made. In Song of Hope each Beatitude is coupled with a relevant text drawn from many sources, including Carl Sandburg's poem Masses (from his Chicago Poems); the biblical book of Isaiah; the writings of Louisiana poet Pamela Pegg who described her emotions after the unspeakable events on 9/11; remarks made by Melba Pattillo Beals (one of the original black students to integrate Central High School in Little Rock, Arkansas in 1957); Mother Theresa's written inscription on the wall of her Children's Home in Calcutta, India; a poem by eleven-year-old Pavel Friedmann, written during his detention at the concentration camp Terezin during the Holocaust; a passage from a 1953 speech by Dwight D. Eisenhower; and a selection from a speech by Nelson Mandela, former president of South Africa (written by poet Marianne Williamson).

FHC's Holiday Angels

As a congregation we have once again provided Christmas presents for many different families in our area by supporting three organizations. When the ornaments were made this year for the Holiday Angels program, we had a list of 88 gifts. However, through the generosity of our congregations, this number was increased to 102 GIFTS!! During the past few weeks, many questions were asked about the gifts. I hope the following will help everyone understand how our gifts are being used to brighten the lives of many children and families in our community. If you supplied a gift this year, your tag either had a BF (Boulevard Family), HEFC (Heights Emergency Food Center), or FP (Family Promise) on it. Read on to learn more about where those gifts were delivered.

Many years ago, Forest Hill developed a relationship with Boulevard School, providing school supplies, Christmas gifts, tutors, and much more. Each year we contact Karen Allen, a social worker at the school, letting her know we are willing to provide gifts for families in need at her school. She then sends us a list of ages and wish list items for various families. We provide a toy and a clothing item for each child in those families. This year there were 8 families with 29 children and so a total of 58 gifts! These gifts are wrapped and delivered to Karen, who distributes them to the families.

The Heights Interfaith Council collects holiday gifts for the children of clients served by the Heights Emergency Food Center. Children age 12 and younger benefit from the program. During the month of October, parents submit name, age, and gift suggestions for their children. Gift request cards are then created and distributed to several faith council communities in the Heights area. This year, as in recent years, we have provided 15 gifts each year to this organization and deliver them to Bethlehem Lutheran Church for distribution.

Family Promise provides a store for the families within their program (both current and from the past year). The store is stocked with unwrapped items displayed for selection by the families, free of charge. All the items in the store are donated by people like us. Family Promise posts a list of Holiday Wishes on their website with suggestions of items including toys, clothes, and winter apparel for all ages from kids to parents. Anyone interested may

donate items up until the date the store "opens." Forest Hill has been providing a minimum of 15 gifts each year to the store. In each of the last three years, additional unwrapped items have been donated for use in the store by our congregation. This year we donated 25 gifts even though we only had 15 ornaments on our tree for Family Promise!

This year, 4 gifts were also provided to a family through the Labre ministry. These ornaments were not on our tree but may be in years to come.

Thank you to everyone who helped brighten the Christmas of one of these families. May you have a very Merry and Blessed Christmas!

Greater Cleveland Congregations: Expansion of Ohio's Medicaid Program to Cover the Working Poor "I was sick and you took care of me"

(Matthew 25:36 NRSV)

Greater Cleveland Congregations (GCC) began campaigning nearly a year ago to support expansion of Ohio's Medicaid program to cover an additional 275,000 lower income individuals (persons between 100% and 138% of the Federal poverty level without access to health insurance) pursuant to the Federal Affordable Health Care Act of 2010.

Whether one's motivation for participation was based in a reading of *Matthew 25*, the Hebrew prophets, or some other sacred source, this initiative had broad appeal among GCC congregations. GCC created the NEO-MEC coalition with hospitals and other interests here in Cleveland. It then joined Healthy Ohioans Work with other statewide groups based in Columbus, where the Ohio Hospital Association and Service Employees International Union were the lead partners with the deepest pockets.

It was understood that there were several possible routes to accomplishing the goal of expanding access to Medicaid. The Governor's proposed inclusion of Federal funds for this purpose in his 2013-2015 biennium budget was encouraging, and several thousand people massed at the Statehouse last Spring to support the initiative. When the Ohio General Assembly's leadership refused to include Medicaid expansion in its budget, attention turned to advocating with Ohio House and Senate members via calls, emails and letters to enact it through other legislation. Only when this produced no movement did GCC and its statewide partners decide this fall to launch a citizen initiative petition campaign for Medicaid expansion using a mix of volunteer and paid canvassers. Polls showed broad public support for expansion. Then, unexpectedly, the Governor and legislative leaders asked the State Controlling Board to bypass the General Assembly and approve the use of Federal funds to expand Ohio's Medicaid program through mid-2015. Litigation challenging the constitutionality of this action is before the Ohio Supreme Court and may be decided by the time you read this. When the lead partners in the statewide coalition redirected their resources into preparing an amicus brief for the Supreme Court case, GCC had already completed its part of the ballot initiative campaign.

We at Forest Hill Church joined GCC and the Medicaid expansion campaign in its latter stages. In the month or so that we were involved, members of our congregation wrote about 20 letters to Ohio legislators, collected over 300 signatures on initiative petitions, and took time to consider the injustice of leaving our poorer neighbors without readily available health care coverage. Our efforts, coming from the newest of GCC's 40 member congregations, received favorable notice within the organization.

Our involvement, and that of Greater Cleveland Congregations, in a statewide public policy campaign was not without risks. Chief among them was being a small component of a diverse statewide coalition, with only limited control over its decisions. The twists and turns of the policy process, and the abrupt end of the initiative petition campaign with the final outcome still in doubt, were both confusing and disconcerting. Yet there seems little doubt that the prospect of having Medicaid expansion on the November 2014 statewide ballot is what finally forced politicians in Columbus to act. Whenever the Medicaid expansion drama concludes, we will know we made an impact on behalf of "the least of these."

Since the time of John Witherspoon, American Presbyterians and other Reformed Christians have felt called to "speak truth to power" in the public arena. It can be an exhilarating, humbling, even messy experience. By engaging in social justice advocacy through Greater Cleveland Congregations, Forest Hill Church gets to share the workload with other vibrant faith communities and improves its chances of being heard.

Abundance Pantry: Help Our Pantry Keep Growing

We want to thank all of you who have so generously supported our Abundance Food Pantry. Even more of our neighbors are now seeking food, especially since food stamp benefits have been cut while people struggle to find jobs and earn a living wage. Last year the number of visits to the pantry increased from 30 to 70 per month. In November of this year, our guests made 101 visits.

Becoming a member agency of the Cleveland Food Bank this past May has helped us keep up with this growth. We are now able to buy food and other goods from them at very low prices. Working with the Food Bank has helped us increase the total amount of food distributed to about 2400 pounds per month. And during this time our average cost has been reduced from 50 down to 15 cents per pound. All the while, we are increasing the percentage of fresh produce and making more healthy food choices available.

Here are some ways you can help us keep up with this growing demand:

- 1. Write a check to FHC with **Food Pantry** in the memo line. This will allow us to stretch your dollars much further with the very low prices from the Food Bank.
- 2. Write a check with **Bus Passes** in the memo line to help our guests get winter transportation for health visits, agency appointments, job interviews, etc.
- 3. Buy some items which are not available thru the Food Bank at a discount grocery like Aldi's. We generally need tuna, pork & beans, old fashioned oatmeal, raisins, and jam.
- 4. Buy grocery cards (for your own use) in Fellowship Hall after the worship service. Abundance Pantry receives a portion of the donation made by each grocery store.
- 5. Collect canned goods, hygiene items, or cleaning supplies at parties and events and bring them to the Pantry Cart. Hygiene items and cleaning supplies cannot be purchased with food stamps.
- 6. Bring us your empty grocery bags, egg cartons, and plastic containers with lids. We use the bags and egg cartons for distribution, and the containers for our homemade soup.
