From the Pastor

Sunday, March 2 is Oscar season! I came upon this list of Top 10 films from Edward McNulty, former film reviewer for *Presbyterians Today*. The films he recommends all deal with matters of the spirit.

- **1.** 12 Years a Slave Based on an 1853 eyewitness account by a kidnapped "free Negro." Along with *The Butler* and *Mandela*, the film should be valued by all who are willing to own up to our dark past and move on toward Dr. King's "beloved community."
- **2. Nebraska** A reversal of Jesus' Parable of the Prodigal Son, this tale of a son's love for his alcoholic father moves between drama and comedy in an unforgettable way, demonstrating that even in the most miserable of families, love can make a difference.
- **3.** *Mandela: Long Walk to Freedom* This bio film is also a character transformation as we follow the journey of a truly great world leader from his embracement of terrorist tactics to forgiveness and reconciliation.
- **4. 42 -** The story of Jackie Robinson, the man who broke the color barrier in major league baseball.
- **5.** *Philomena* A mother whose out-of-wedlock son was snatched from her by the Irish Catholic Church still retains the faith to forgive the nun who wronged her is contrasted with the jaded journalist who helps her discover the fate of her son 50 years later.

- **6.** Lee Daniels' The Butler Not since The Help has Paul Laurence Dunbar's poem "We Wear the Mask" been so well dramatized as in this true story of the black White House butler who witnessed the historic events transpiring at the Executive Mansion and out in the streets where civil rights advocates battled for equality.
- **7. Short Term 12 -** An inspiring story of a wounded healer working at a center for troubled teenagers, this film shows the power of redeeming love and the need for community. Especially heartening is the scene in which a staff member gives testimony to the foster parents who took him in and loved him so wisely and tenderly.
- **8.** *The Hunt* This Danish film, showing the terrible consequences of a child's innocent lie on the life of a man, appropriately concludes at a church Christmas Eve service, reinforcing the redemptive meaning of the Nativity.
- **9.** *Her* One of the most intriguing sci-fi films that lead us to reflecting about our involvement with our computers and programs.
- **10 (tie).** To the Wonder This film is slow moving and often puzzling, but seldom has the yearning for faith and companionship been as well captured as in this pair of interwoven stories about a priest's crisis of faith and the breakdown of a once love-filled marriage.
- **10 (tie)** *Wadjda* The faith and culture are Islamic in this first Saudi Arabian film, but its endorsement of the yearning for gender equality and freedom are delightfully incorporated in a young girl's unpopular struggle to obtain a bicycle like that of the boy down the street.

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Protest(ant) Pilgrimage 2015

Dear Friends,

In past pilgrimages, we have walked in the footsteps of Jesus and the first disciples in Israel and Palestine (2009), traced the lives of the earliest Christians in the shadow of Roman Empire in Turkey and Greece (2011), and explored the growth and development of Roman Catholic Church in Italy (2013).

In March of 2015, we will continue our pilgrimage through the story of our faith, journeying to Germany and Switzerland, the birthplaces of the Reformation. We will go not only to rediscover the beginnings of our own Protestant tradition, but also to explore the heart and soul of that tradition as it continues today: to give witness to God's justice, love, and mercy in the world. In other words, we hope to bring to life the "protest" in Protestantism and the "reform" in Reformation, past and present.

Join us as we learn more about early reformers like Martin Luther and John Calvin; as we enrich our understanding of the church's witness in the Confessing Church movement during WWII; and as we explore Protestant resistors like the Huegonots, who helped hide Jews from the Nazis, and Dietrich Bonhoeffer, the German pastor who was executed as a member of a plot to assassinate Hitler. We will also consider our tradition's shadow side, from Luther's anti-Jewish stand in the sixteenth century, to the mainline Protestant church's cooperation with the Nazi regime in the twentieth century.

Everyone is welcome. All we ask is that you be open to the unexpected, which is what pilgrimage is all about. New friendships. Deep spiritual experiences. Aha! moments. Perhaps even an eyewitness encounter with history, as when the new Pope Francis was announced while we were in Rome! What unexpected things might this pilgrimage bring for you?

Honoring the Body: A Spiritual Practice Lent 2014

Through in-home small group dinners, meditation and exercise groups at church, and a personal walking challenge, we will encourage everyone to claim the spiritual practice of honoring the bodies we've been given.

In-Home Small Group Dinners Fridays, March 21 and April 11

(dates are somewhat flexible)

We will organize dinner groups of eight to ten persons who will meet in a host's home to:

- + share a healthy meal together,
- → discuss a brief reading around the theme, Honoring the Body,
- → foster fellowship within Forest Hill Church.

We will need a team to help with registering folks for the dinners, to be dinner hosts for these groups, and one to two (not the hosts) facilitators for each one. Kathy Hanna-Stauffer has offered to design and present recipes and directions for a simple, healthy meal. The main dish will be prepared by the host(s); members of the small group will provide side dishes and salads.

Meditation and Exercise groups

At various times during Lent, we will offer at FHC a "taste" of differing spiritual practices that help us pay attention to our bodies: i.e. yoga, meditation, massage, tai chi, and Reiki. This series is in formation so keep watching for more details.

"A Walk to Jerusalem"

With a help of a nifty FHC pedometer, members will sign up to participate in a walking challenge. Each person will keep track of the number of steps he or she takes during Lent. The goal will be to walk the way of Jesus - the 270,000 or so steps (3.2 miles a day) — from Nazareth to Capernaum to Jerusalem!

Four of the six Lenten Sundays fall in March this year, and the music will reflect the more contemplative atmosphere of this liturgical season.

But before Lent begins, there will be a pre-Lent celebratory **AWE service** on Sunday, March 2nd with the New Orleans Jazz Ensemble leading us in our hymn singing. The New Orleans Jazz Ensemble plays old-time hymns in the authentic style reminiscent of the Preservation Hall Jazz Band of New Orleans. Under the direction of Ted Witt, this long-established group is comprised of a clarinetist, a trombonist, a tubist, a banjo player and a

drummer. March 2 is the last Sunday before Lent and two days before Mardi Gras (Fat Tuesday), so it's a good Sunday to celebrate! Their postlude will be *When the Saints Go Marching In* and they will march out to Fellowship Hall with all of us marching behind.

On **Sunday, March 16th there will be another AWE service** which all the choirs and a chamber orchestra are preparing for. Here is some information about this music:

Commissioned by the congregation of Forest Hill Church 100th anniversary of the the commemorate founding of congregation, Song of Hope by Anne Wilson received its premiere on March 28th, 2004. The textual structure of the piece is based on the eight Beatitudes that mark the opening of the Sermon on the Mount in the gospel of St. Matthew. Many believe that the Beatitudes are the most beautiful and wisest statements ever made. In Song of Hope each Beatitude is coupled with a relevant text drawn from many sources, including (in order): Carl Sandburg's poem Masses (from his Chicago Poems); the biblical book of Isaiah; the writings of Louisiana poet Pamela Pegg who described her emotions after the unspeakable events on 9/11; remarks made by Melba Pattillo Beals (one of the original African-American students to integrate Central High School in Little Rock, Arkansas in 1957); Mother Theresa's written inscription on the wall of her Children's Home in Calcutta, India; a poem by elevenyear-old Pavel Friedmann, written during his detention at the concentration camp Terezin during the Holocaust; a passage from a 1953 speech by Dwight D. Eisenhower; and a selection from a speech by Nelson Mandela, former president of South Africa (attributed to poet Marianne Williamson).

I am grateful for all the donations which made the composition of this work possible and which now make possible another hearing. Special thanks go to Linn Obery who spearheaded this project ten years ago. Donations to the *Friends of Music Fund* are always welcome.

This was inadvertently left out of the 2013 Annual Report **Endowment Committee Report** (for 2013)

As of December 31, 2013, the total value of the Forest Hill Church Endowment Fund was \$1,297,074 which was \$120,338 more than the previous year. During 2013, the Fund received \$15,550 in gifts and estate transfers which includes a \$15,000 bequest from the Estate of Johanna Wilcott. In addition, one church member notified the Church they have specifically designated Forest Hill Church in their estate future plans.

The spending rule distribution amount in 2013 was \$44,331 plus unused allocation funds from 2012 of \$505 for a total distribution of \$44,836. The spending rule allocation in 2014 is projected to be \$47,161.

The Endowment Committee follows an annual cycle of soliciting requests for distributions from the annual spending rule amount from the Church Ministries. Based on these requests, the Committee recommended to Session the following allocations:

Family Promise Host Week April 6-13

On any given night in Cleveland there are about 4,000 people without a home, 40% of whom are part of a family. There is a shortage in Cleveland of emergency shelters for intact homeless families. Family Promise is a network of faith congregations that provide shelter, meals and support to homeless families.

FHC will be hosting families again from April 6-13. We may have 4 families and up to 14 people during the week. We are moving into our 7th year of hosting and we have learned a lot over those years. We have things down to a pretty good system and just need volunteers to help out throughout the week.

Do you like to prepare nutritious food to share with new people?

Do you like to play with children or help them with homework?

Do you have a special talent that you might like to share with the adults?

Do you like to spend the night in new places?

Do you like driving a truck?

Do you like to set up rooms so they are just right?

If you answered yes, to any or all of these questions we have just the thing for you! During our host week we will need 30-50 volunteers to carry out tasks such as moving the beds to the rooms, room set-up, welcoming our guests, providing dinners during the week and planning activities in the evening for the families (could be crafts, games, puzzles, homework help). We also need volunteers to sleep at the church. Imagine a job where you can sleep!

We feel strongly that this is what we are being called to do at FHC. Most of these jobs require about a 2 hour commitment but many just take a short time to complete. Families are encouraged to volunteer together. Our guest children love to play with the FHC children.

The time has come when God needs our help—for us to take responsibility for nurturing and protecting the earth. In addition to making lifestyle choices to conserve, recycle, and be energy efficient, we should strongly consider how we as a people of faith

There are several respected, responsible, and effective NGOs (see definition below) that are prominent and active in Washington circles. Most well-known is the Sierra Club. But another organization of note is the Natural Resource Defense Council (NRDC). The NRDC's mission statement is **To safeguard the earth, its people, its plants and animals, and the natural systems upon which all life depends.** The Council is active in opposing arctic oil exploration, the Keystone pipeline, coal industry emissions, mining and exploration on public lands, fracking, and wildlife decision mismanagement, as well as many other issues.

It is easy to become involved by becoming a member of this organization or other similar groups. As a member your voice will be heard and amplified. NRDC circulates petitions containing thousands of signatures to Congress and other government officials. Email announcements and requests go out, and all you need to do is include your contact information, review and augment their letter, and click to have your voice added to thousands of others. And they HAVE achieved results in staying negative actions and promoting positive actions which protect our earth.

Any action you wish to take is a matter of personal choice. But do consider studying and supporting any of the following US- based organizations which are highly respected and worthy of your support.

They provide analysis and expertise, serve as early warning mechanisms and help monitor and implement international agreements. Their relationship with offices and agencies of the United Nations system differs depending on their goals, their venue and the mandate of a particular institution.

The American Institute of Church Growth surveyed some 8,000 church attenders to see how they started coming to church. Here's what they found.

- 1-2% were people with special needs met by a particular church
- 2-3% were walk-ins
- 5-6% were influenced by a particular preacher
- 2-3% came because they liked the church programs
- 1-2% came because they responded to a visitation effort
- 4-5% were reached by Sunday School
- .5% came through evangelistic crusades
- A WHOPPING 75-90% CAME THROUGH THE INFLUENCE OF FRIENDS OR RELATIVES

The other teams are performing research into the best strategies to proceed with their issues. This is vital to insure that we have the best information to establish an action and the best strategy to achieve it. We need your help.

Criminal Justice/Gun control team

GCC identified Racial Disparities, Overcharging, Juvenile Representation and Diversion Programs as the priorities to address at the County Prosecutor's office. Although most municipalities have a juvenile diversion program, the city of Cleveland does not, so the juvenile must go through the prosecutor and, thus, receives a criminal record. We need folks to help do research on Best Practices of other cities' diversion programs and on the best means of obtaining an audit of the office.

Do Not Stand Idly By, the gun control group, is also in the research phase. In order to continue our momentum, we need more people to meet with their mayors and identify local actions.

Gun Violence Prevention February, 2014

On May 4, 2013, Forest Hill Church, Presbyterian and The Church of the Covenant in Cleveland collaborated in sponsoring a Workshop on Gun Violence and Gospel Values led by the Rev. James E. Atwood, principle author of the report approved by the 219th General Assembly (2010) entitled Gun Violence and Gospel Values: Mobilizing in Response to God's Call, and author of the book America and Its Guns: A Theological **Exposé**, (2012). As a follow-up on just one of the several suggestions made by Rev. Atwood, Covenant's Preventing Gun Violence Task Force, in order to take responsibility to build public awareness on the extent of gun violence in our community, decided to do two things: first, increase awareness of our congregation concerning gun deaths in Cuyahoga County, by highlighting certain gun deaths in our community on a weekly basis in our Covenant E-News; and second, post a large sign indicating the number of gun deaths in Cuyahoga County since Sandy Hook (December 14, 2012). The figure indicating the number of gun deaths is changed weekly and unfortunately reflects the magnitude of gun violence in our community. The sign was first posted in July 2013 on the front lawn of The Church of the Covenant on

Euclid Ave. in University Circle.



After the first anniversary (December 14, 2013) of the mass shooting at Sandy Hook Elementary School, the sign was moved to Forest Church. The accompanying photograph was taken February 4, 2014 and from left right shows Charles to

Bromley, the Rev. Laury Larson, and Bob Jefferis from The Church of the Covenant; and Elder Barbara Cloud and the Rev. Dr. John Lentz, Jr., of Forest Hill Church. The very disappointing number of 172 gun deaths in Cuyahoga County some 13 months since the shooting at Sandy Hook Elementary School reveals that our community is not safe from gun violence and our work is not yet completed.

We need to

- continue to build public awareness of gun violence
- partner with other faith institutions to create and sustain a national, activist faith-based social movement to save thousands of lives yearly
- display signs that prohibit carrying guns onto personal or church property
- continue to urge Congress to pass legislation which establishes universal background checks for all gun buyers, including guns which are purchased from gun shows and other private sellers
- increase access to mental health services and help school districts refer students to mental health services, and ban the manufacture, importation and sale of all assault-style weapons.

Finally, as Presbyterians in the Presbytery of the Western Reserve we need to act and support the Overture Concerning Gun Violence Prevention that is being presented to the 221st General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) in June, 2014.

An Open Letter from Barb Cloud **Regarding Gun Violence**

It has been a violent year for children across the United States. It has been 14 months since our country was horrified by the deaths of 26 children and teachers at Sandy Hook Elementary School in Newtown CT.

Whether or not you are a gun owner, you will probably agree that we want to protect our children from violence, whether at home or in school or anywhere else. Gun violence, unlike natural disasters, is preventable, and I am working with several groups to help lessen the frequency of gun violence in this country.

The goal of House Bill 31 is to prevent accidental injury and death caused by guns in the home by requiring that adult owners of guns accept full responsibility for actions involving those guns. Citizens from across Ohio

have come together to attest to the rightness and necessity of this bill. I was present at the first reading of the bill, and was particularly moved by the story of one mother whose teenage son was accidentally killed by a friend who had access to a loaded gun at home. Her son is dead, the shooter's life is forever changed, but the owner of the gun is not considered responsible.

While HB 31 has many nuances, the bottom line is that it will hold adults responsible for securing guns at all times. It is not about taking guns away but about requiring responsible ownership and care of guns. It is about not taking children's lives away.
