honored to have a beautiful reception after church April 13 celebrating my tenth anniversary. I received numerous notes that I will always cherish. And I deeply thank you for the generous monetary gift to send me on my way for my sabbatical adventure that will begin May 5 and conclude July 28.

A sabbatical is rooted in the biblical mandate to rest and renew. Sabbatical rest gives an individual an opportunity to slow one's pace down so that stillness might allow new life to bubble up. My sabbatical objectives are to be inspired and renewed, not productive, in my time away; to rest and to listen to the Holy Spirit's movement in my life; to read more fiction; to engage with colleagues in similar and in different types of professions, and to experience more beauty in the natural world.

Tim and I are so excited that we will be spending two weeks in Italy, May 22 – June 6. Tim was invited to be a guest lecturer at The International Institute for Translation Studies in Rimini, Italy on the Adriatic Sea. For one of the two weeks Tim will be teaching, I will be on a spiritual silent retreat at a retreat center in Assisi, Italy. (See **www.assisiretreats.org**) The Simple Peace Retreat Center is a renovated farm house two miles outside of Assisi. My retreat week will be loosely structured but will have a retreat leader. Each morning meditation and meditative movement are offered. And each evening the day closes with meditation. Afternoons are free to rest, walk, read, be, contemplate, journal, or visit sacred Assisi. Can you imagine me, such an extrovert, on silent retreat in a country in which I do not speak the language?!

After Italy, we will add ten days to travel to Croatia. Our daughter, Sophie, will join us in Croatia! Our son, Seth, will be staying home to take care of all our animals. (Pray for him and them!)

My sabbatical will be given substance with my involvement in a leadership program through Parker Palmer's The Center for Renewal Academy of Leaders. The six-month leadership program began in mid-April with a weekend retreat in Connecticut, and will end in October with a closing retreat. During the six months, I will meet by teleconferencing with a cohort of leaders from various professional fields for personal and professional study. The opening retreat with the other 25 professionals was outstanding! I am thrilled to be engaged in this program and am eager to see the fruit of my work-study on the personal level, and how it will apply to my ministry in Lay Leadership Development at FHC.

The last hope I have for my sabbatical is to nudge myself into learning something outside of my comfort zone-say, taking a pottery class or learning to swim, perhaps? This remains to be determined.

I cannot express enough my love and gratitude for the kindness and generosity of this church family for supporting me in my time of rest and renewal. Thank you all for being an inspiring collection of faithful Christian brothers and sisters. I give glory to God for my good fortune in being called to serve as your associate pastor. Here's to many more years together!

The Four R's of Earth Care

You've heard of the three 'r's ever since grade school—reading, 'riting, and 'rithmatic.....and the three R's in modern times pertaining to Earth Care, which are Reduce, Re-Use, Recycle.

Did you know there is also a fourth R for Earth Care? As in 'Refuse?' It is very pertinent as we consider greening up for spring in our homes and gardens.

- <u>Refuse</u> to use non-organic lawn care and pesticides which not only foul up the water supply, but can be damaging to birds and bees, pollinators of fruits and flowers.
- <u>Refuse</u> to let rain water runoff get away when a rain barrel or catch basin can capture it and it can be re-used for needed application in the lawn and garden.
- <u>Refuse</u> to purchase any and all materials unless they come from sustainable sources. Refuse to buy products from corporations who do not follow good environmental practices. Avoid plastic.
- <u>Refuse</u> to de-nude your property of all natural 'wild growth', and be prudent in pruning – natural growth serves as a haven for some of our less-iconic wild creatures (rabbits, squirrels, chipmunks). Remember---"all God's critters have a place in the choir." Even insects! (ok, maybe not all the mosquitoes!)
- <u>Reduce</u> the amount of water used in lawn and garden to the minimum.
 Let nature supply the rest! Use water conservation troughing between rows in the garden.
- <u>Recycle</u> grass clippings, trimmings, and other organic waste into the compost.

The next Electronic Recycling Weekend at FHC is May 17-18, so begin to collect all your electronic and metal goodies for then. Further announcements and information will come forth soon.

The main service areas of our church are these:


- 1. **Deacons** (care of our congregation, fellowship and hospitality, maintaining membership rolls);

The Sign Is Down

At the end of last year, members of the Church of the Covenant approached Forest Hill Church to inquire if we would be willing to post a triangular sign in our church yard numbering the deaths caused by gun violence in Cuyahoga County since the tragedy at Sandy Hook Elementary School in Connecticut. The Church of the Covenant had the sign for most of 2013.

A member of this church took the request to the Ministry of Justice and Mission. After a long discussion all came to an agreement that having the sign in our yard was an important witness to make.

The Ministry of Justice and Mission brought a recommendation to the Session which approved the putting up of the sign for the months of January, February and March, 2014. In January the number stood at 155 deaths by gun in Cuyahoga County. At the end of March the number was 182. The sign is now on its way to Lyndhurst Community Presbyterian Church.

The staff was surprised by the relatively few comments received about the sign. I am sure there were some in the congregation and community who did not agree with the action of Session. However, the only negative comment received was from one person who said that the sign was not very pretty and blocked the view of the church.

One afternoon Clover was listening to the radio and heard Phillip Morris (of *The Plain Dealer*) speak favorably of the gun sign in his address to the City Club. Unfortunately he misnamed our church but Clover called and corrected him!

There was a student at Heights High who came into class and informed her teacher and fellow students about the number of gun deaths. When asked where she got her information she said; "the sign at Forest Hill Church." Her announcement started a class discussion.

The day after the sign came down someone said to me: "Where did the sign go? I miss seeing it."

While it was not an easy decision to make, I am grateful that the Session of Forest Hill takes risks to agitate church members and the community about issues of importance in our world.

What effect the sign has had we do not know. This action was about witnessing to a deep concern about violence in our community. It was an attempt to raise awareness that too many people are killed by gun violence.

My hope is that members of Forest Hill Church will continue to work towards peace, justice, community and hospitality in all its many forms.

City Fresh CSA: Providing Access to Fresh Produce to Underserved Areas and Low Income Families

We had an opportunity recently through Social Venture Partners to hear a presentation about City Fresh, a local CSA (Community Supported Agriculture) program that brings fresh produce to areas of our city that do not normally have access, and offers weekly shares of that fresh produce at a substantially reduced price to low income families; they also accept SNAP (formerly Food Stamps). City Fresh is unique from other CSAs in this service.

City Fresh's mission to serve underserved areas and low income families is made possible when those of us who can afford to do so purchase a share at full price. If you'd like to support food justice by participating, visit **www.cityfresh.org** and download an order form (or contact the FHC office). A single share is \$15/week; a family share, \$28/week. The 20-week season runs from June 10 to late October. Best of all, there is a convenient local pick-up spot at the Coventry Library in Cleveland Heights on Tuesdays from 5:00 to 7:00 pm. Empower Abundance Food Pantry

The Great Recession has had a very substantial impact on our neighbors in need. Thousands of jobs have been lost, there are high rates of foreclosures and evictions, there have been cuts in the food stamps program (twice), and most recently, long-term unemployment benefits have been terminated. For quite some time, Lynda Bernays, FHC office administrator, and a limited number of donated can goods in the pantry cart were our only line of defense against having to turn away those in need with, "Sorry, we can't help."

However, thanks to the efforts of many determined individuals over the past few years, we have expanded our capacity to serve. Abundance Food Pantry here at Forest Hill Church is now distributing a great deal of food to our neighbors in need.

- 2009 Laura Steiner launched the Abundance Acres Garden to provide more fresh produce to the pantry.
- 2010 Barb Cloud and Nancy Burcham arranged to pick up weekly donations of baked goods and vegetables from Heinen's and Zagara's.
- 2012 The Youth Group provided a breakfast to get to know the pantry guests. Beth Zych, Grace Uhle, and other adults decided to organize this as a monthly tradition. Lorraine Ranchod obtained a Micah grant to fund this for a year. Paul Jennings and the Soup Group started making homemade soup monthly to distribute through the pantry.
- 2012 Another Micah grant obtained by Lorraine, along with some private donations, allowed us to begin buying food from sources like Aldi's, Costco, and Marc's. Paul and Barb started to organize volunteers to handle the food distribution.
- 2013 Abundance Pantry became a member agency with the Greater Cleveland Food Bank, and we began buying much larger amounts of food. This has enabled us to reduce our average cost of food even further, down to about 10 cents per pound.
- 2014 The Pantry received a partial funding grant from United Way, and we are now listed on their 211 Help Line.

Our challenge is that the visits to our Abundance Food Pantry have grown over the past two years from about 28/month to 160/month. We currently distribute more than 4,000 pounds of food each month. We are hoping that many of you will be able to support our pantry ministry in some way. As the old saying goes, "Many hands make work light."

Here's How You Can Help

- 1. **Keep us supplied**. Add items such as plastic shopping bags, reusable bags, paper bags, plastic containers with lids for soup, and used magazines to the Pantry Cart.
- 2. **Bring in cans and other goods**. We can always use things such as tuna, canned meats, hearty soups, baked beans, spaghetti sauce, macaroni & cheese, toothpaste, tooth brushes, and toilet tissue. You can pull a shopping list off of the Pantry Cart. We can use virtually anything that you have, even odds and ends.
- 3. **Make monthly soup**. There is something very therapeutic about the conversations that we have while chopping ingredients for the homemade hearty soup that we distribute through the pantry.
- 4. Join us at a monthly meal. Help prepare one of our monthly meals and come to get to know some of our neighbors. Let Grace Uhle know that you want to help (gdu726@yahoo.com or 216-514-0304). We're sure that you will find the discussions very interesting.
- 5. **Pick up at the Food Bank**. We are using two vehicles each Monday morning to pick up approximately 1,000 pounds of food and other items and bring them to the church.
- 6. **Use computer for tracking and ordering**. We need a person to check in our Pantry guests on a computer. This provides us with reports that we send to the Food Bank. You can use your shopping skills to place orders for good value, healthy foods from the Food Bank.
- 7. **Help us distribute food**. Volunteers bring out and display food for weekly distribution. They guide the guests as they shop, put away the remaining food, and clean up afterwards.
- 8. **Make a donation**. Make out a check to Forest Hill Church with "Pantry" in the memo line. Every dollar buys approximately 10 pounds of food.

We strive to make the pantry a welcoming experience. When guests are "shopping," they are able to select their own items. We focus on providing many healthy choices with our portion of fresh produce now exceeding 30%. We encourage our guests to try new vegetables, and we often have discussions about how to cook them. A number of pantry guests are now serving as volunteers for distributing food. We start our monthly meals by sharing joys and concerns and by saying a prayer. We have lots of interesting conversations. Some of our youth provide things like decorations, flowers, and gift items for each meal. One of our guests recently said, "What makes you different from other pantries is that you always seem very glad that we are here."
