Clover, Anne and our new staff members Keon (youth) and Dacia (children) are planning a momentous fall program. It all begins on Sunday, September 7.



Children's Ministry Programs 2014-2015 Crib and Nursery

Tracey Long, our permanent childcare provider, will continue to care for the littlest members of our congregation. We also ask volunteers to help staff this room. We hope all families will find this place to be a caring and nurturing place to leave their children while they have an opportunity to worship. Child care is available from 9:15 to 12:30 upstairs in the Monticello wing.

Children in Worship

Pre-School and Kindergarten (ages 3-5)

This worship experience allows the children to be in an environment where age appropriate Bible stories are shared. The children are guided through a worship service and are encouraged to respond to the stories through songs, art, questions and retelling of the stories.

Pathways to the Promise Land Grades 1-5

Our church school for these children is a workshop rotation model. This model focuses on the variety of ways in which the children learn. The children participate in workshops that explore a monthly focus that revolves around the yearly theme. During a three week rotation the children move among workshops to experience the same Bible focus in different learning styles. The lessons are designed as a kid-friendly, teacher-friendly, facility-transforming way to teach Bible stories and truths.

The theme for the upcoming program year is *A Witness to God's Presence*. The Bible is full of characters that witness the very existence of God in their lives and pass that experience on to future generations. The children will be exploring Bible stories from Genesis through the early Church, acknowledging that God exists and is very much present in our lives.

Our first rotation is **Creation**. The creation story is a story of faith. It is a story of people coming to an understanding of the inter-relationship of all things. God created all things and God said this was good. The children will explore this theme by participating in various workshops involving drama, art and games.

The children will be divided this year in the following groups: Grade 1, Grades 2/3, and Grades 4/5.

The 2014-2015 choir season is about to begin and I'm looking forward to seeing all our FHC musical families getting back to work (and play!). Those who participated in choir last year will receive an email or snail mail, but here's the general information for persons who may be interested in finding out about the musical opportunities at Forest Hill Church:

THE CHOIRS

Chancel Choir (adults; high school and college students warmly welcomed): 1st rehearsal will be Thursday, Sept. 4th beginning with a potluck supper and general frivolity at 6:40 in Fellowship Hall. Bring whatever dish you enjoy preparing (or purchasing) and we'll have a fine time getting caught up and electing new choir officers. The rehearsal takes place from 7:30 to 9:00 pm. Our first choir Sunday is September 7 (rehearsal at 10:30 am - worship at 11:00 am).

Sine Nomine Choir (grades 6-12; college students warmly welcomed): 1st rehearsal will be Sunday, Sept. 7 in the Chapel after worship. Generally we'll meet every other Sunday (with occasional exceptions) for 30-40 minutes. We'll elect officers at the first rehearsal (looks good on college apps S).

Descant Choir (grades 1-5): 1st rehearsal will be Sunday, Sept. 7 at 9:30 am in the sanctuary. The choir practices every Sunday, and after choir (10:15) there is an activities period in youth hall. At 10:45, the children meet their parents in Fellowship Hall and go from there to the sanctuary.

Voices in Bronze (high school students and adults): 1st rehearsal for our handbell ringers will be Thursday, Sept. 11 at 6:20-7:15 PM in the upstairs bell room. An understanding of rhythmic notation is required. There are currently three openings in this group, so I hope to hear from interested persons! No previous experience in bell-ringing is necessary.

Forest Hill Steel Drum Band (all ages): This group plays for worship several times per year. Up to six people at a time can play and the players are always changing. Rehearsals are arranged at the convenience of the players and take place around three weeks before the performance.

I'm looking forward to our Kick-off Sunday (9/7), our Fall Fellowship Sunday (9/28), our World Communion Sunday with lots of global music (10/5), our first AWE (Alternate Worship Service) on 10/12 with the *Forest City String Band* (bluegrass-style hymn-singing), and an evening Compline service: *Ancient Worship for the Modern Soul* around the time Daylight Saving Time ends.

Please call or email me if you have any questions about the choirs or music program. I hope to see lots of new faces and fresh voices intermingled with the "regulars" in the choir families this September.



Kerygma program's small group bible study Galatians: Faith and Works

Sunday mornings, 9:30 am, Sept. 7 – Nov. 16

Our seventh Kerygma all-church scripture study will begin Sunday, September 7 at 9:30 am. Paul's letter to the Galatians is one of the undisputed and earliest Pauline letters, typically dated in the mid-1st century. It is an exceptional representation of the argument for faith in Christ over the Law as the way to salvation. In January, we will be studying the four chapters of James as the counter-argument offering Works as the demonstration and witness of faith. Without works, is there any faith at all?

We will begin our study of Galatians on September 7 and 14 in South Hall with an overview and foundation to the New Testament and the Epistle. Beginning September 21, we will break into small groups facilitated by two lay leaders and delve deeper in the six chapters of the Epistle. Please register to participate in the wonderful opportunity to learn more about bible study, to meet new people in a small group setting, and to grow in your faith. All different levels of students are welcome...from novice to Bible nerds!

Progressive Christianity 101, led by Rev. Dr. John Lentz Sunday evenings, 5-7 pm, Oct. 19 – Nov. 23



The Ministry of Vocation and Leadership Development Program Updates for 2014-15

As a worshiping community striving to listen for God's guidance, we sometimes encounter unexpected surprises and changes in direction. Accordingly, as our new program year begins, we announce some significant changes as well as an explanation of how they came to be.

Faith Leader program is taking a year of rest

In a surprising turn of events, the Faith Leader discernment team and staff have decided that the Faith Leader program will take one year off.

In its first eight years at FHC, Faith Leader has been an "intensive 28-week small-group experience"...a program which has fostered spiritual growth and abundant blessings for more than 70 individuals from inside and outside the FHC community! As the discernment team and pastoral staff prayerfully considered the challenge of securing participants for this year's group, we have come to believe that the Holy Spirit is guiding Faith Leader into a "year of lying fallow", a time of "sabbatical rest." With the decision to postpone the 9th class of Faith Leader until 2015-16, all individuals who had accepted invitations this summer were re-contacted. All have graciously agreed to wait a year. In the history of Faith Leader at FHC, this "year of lying fallow" opens up exciting possibilities for other types of small group spiritual formation programming for those who cannot commit to a 28- week program. We didn't start the summer thinking this would be our Faith Leader "sabbatical year," but we certainly do understand that now. Stay tuned for more faith formation opportunities!

New Offering in Lent!

"Living in the Spirit: An 8-week course on Spiritual Practices" This past May the Ministry of Vocation and Leadership Development requested and received Endowment funding for a proposal based on the Ministry's desire to offer something to support the deepening spiritual life of the congregation. This course will offer something in the "middle ground" between Faith Leader and simply attending weekly worship.

There are many details yet to be worked out. This is a "save the date" announcement to confirm that this exciting new spiritual enrichment course will be taking place beginning on February 1, 2015. Stay tuned!

We should ask ourselves what we as individuals, as families, and as a faith community are planning to do during the coming months to renew and rejuvenate our commitment to do what we can to

protect and preserve Creation in the best way possible?

Let our conscience and biblical underpinnings be our guide. We aim to protect, preserve, and enhance the physical world around us – air and water, plants and trees, birds, bees, and all other living creatures. In the face of natural disasters and human-influenced environmental degradations, this isn't easy!

One idea has surfaced which would help educate and direct all of us as we strive to protect and improve our environment: an *Earth Care Fair*, perhaps in the early spring. This would involve an all-Saturday morning program featuring information and education on such matters as air quality, water quality and conservation, sustainable agriculture and eco-friendly food sources, wildlife conservation, best energy utilization and alternative energy sources/issues. Local experts would be brought in to host 'round tables' featuring each topic. Everyone could 'graze' the topic tables as their interests lead them. Lots of folks from the Heights community could be invited.

To pull this off, *many FHC folks* will be needed to help. Do you have an interest in getting involved with the FHC Earth Care team? Please let Lynda (in the church office) or myself know.


