Dear Friends, Happy Thanksgiving!

Deanne and I are thankful to be home from Haiti. What a marvelous trip! We are so grateful for the faithfulness of Jeff Smith, Steve Sedam, Barb Cloud, Dean



and Judy Sieck, Carol and Mark Weddell and Kermit Lind – they are hardy travelers.

After flying into Port au Prince from Miami, we spent the night and then flew (VERY exciting in 5-seater planes!) over the mountains to Gabo, a town in the Central Plateau. There we teamed up with our Mission partners and hosts, Haiti Outreach, to celebrate the well that your generosity helped dig!

Remember those wonderful parties at SOHO, the delightful and delicious restaurant on W. 25th St. owned by Nolan Konkoski and Molly Smith (daughter of Jeff and Ann Smith!)? Well, the price of the tickets and the money raised during the auction amounted to \$15,000, which was the price to dig a fresh-water well in Gabo.

We take clean water for granted. In Haiti, this is not the case. In many places there is no clean water for miles, and people spend much of their day going to streams for water for drinking and washing. Fresh water changes everything!

Haiti Outreach is not a service organization. It partners with Haitians, equipping them to manage the well and organize the community. The FHC travel team went to join in the celebration and to dedicate the well. There is a plaque on the well with the words of Isaiah 55:1 "Everyone who thirsts, come to the waters!" Forest Hill Church is named as the well sponsor. It was very moving for me to see our name in the middle of nowhere in Haiti.

We are bound to folks that we don't really know by the chords of love, concern, generosity and hope. We experienced again the mystery and joy of recognizing fellow children of God. We really are all one! We are reenergized for the kingdom work in our own neighborhoods.



"In every pew there's a broken heart." That's what my dad, a Presbyterian minister for many years, used to say as he made his rounds to call on congregants and lovingly support them in any number of situations. I believe he was right, and not in a morbid way. Because we are human we

are subject to suffering and loss. It's a fact of life we can't deny.

I speak with people all day long in both my private counseling practice and here at Forest Hill about grief. If you are hurting because a relationship or life passage has changed or ended, mourning the death of a loved one, struggling with your own or a family member's health issues, or aching over the great sorrows of the world, you are not alone. According to Luke's Gospel, when the baby Jesus was presented in the temple a wise old man named Simeon blessed Mary, then prophesied that her heart would be pierced by a sword. That certainly came to pass as she stood at the foot of the cross. No one is immune from pain in this lifetime.

I frequently use the word "raggedy" to describe grief. It's raggedy--not clearcut or linear. At times it feels like we take one step forward and two steps back. Often there are multiple layers of feelings through which we need to move. All in all, it's a process that takes time.

Why on earth am I writing this in Advent? Isn't this a season of joyful preparation for Christ's birth? It is indeed, and for me one of the great joys of Emanuel – God with us – is his comforting presence and much needed strength. I have every intention of celebrating Christ's birth with gusto because he is the source of everything good, including help in time of need. No matter what we may be facing, we can depend on God to hold us and never let us go.

I pray that this Advent will be a rich opportunity for you to dive deeply into the mystery of God joining us in human flesh – with all its joys and sorrows!

Abundance Food Pantry - Progress Continues!

Every month now, volunteers from Forest Hill Church distribute over 13,000 pounds of food to more than 320 households in our area. This is equivalent to about 11,000 meals per month. By working with the Greater Cleveland Food Bank, we have been able to reduce our cost to 4 cents per pound, and

select many healthy choices with over 40% of what we offer now being fresh produce. We provide a food safety net for our neighbors in Hough, Glenville, Collinwood, East Cleveland, Cleveland Hts, University Hts, Buckeye/Shaker Square, and South Euclid, and are now listed on the United Way 211 Help Line. We strive to make our pantry a welcoming experience by providing



beverages and reading material while waiting, by raffling off large items like hams and turkeys, by allowing pantry guests to choose their own food items, and by encouraging guests who want to help us serve.



On the last Tuesday of each month, we also provide a hot meal and share both food and fellowship with our guests. The youth groups started this tradition, and they still provide the decorations for these events. We receive funding from United Way, Harvest for Hunger, FHC groups and individuals. We request the rest of our support from the FHC Justice and Mission Ministry.

Nine Ways to Empower the Pantry:

- 1. **Keep Us Supplied.** Add plastic, paper or reusable bags to the pantry cart in the hall. Share used magazines or books for our guests to read while waiting or to take home.
- 2. **Pick Up at the Food Bank.** A few volunteers bring their vehicles to the Food Bank each week to pick up our order and bring it to the church.
- 3. **Help Us Distribute Food.** Volunteers set up the food for distribution on Tuesday afternoons. They help our pantry guests "shop." Then they clean up and put things away afterwards.
- 4. **Make a Donation.** Make out a check to Forest Hill Church with "Pantry" in the memo line. Every dollar buys approximately 25 pounds of food.

- 5. **Bring in Cans and Other Goods.** We can always use things such as tuna, canned meats, hearty soups, baked beans, macaroni & cheese, toilet tissue, toothpaste, tooth brushes, soap, etc. Hygiene items are good because they cannot be purchased with food stamps.
- 6. Join Us at a Monthly Meal. Bring in a casserole or other dish, or help set up and prepare hot food on the last Tuesday of the month.
- 7. **Be a Table Host.** Break bread with our pantry guests at our monthly meal and get to know them. Provide some of our FHC hospitality to make everyone feel at home.
- 8. **Gather Christmas Gifts.** Gather toys, games, books, stuffed animals, wrapping paper, etc. to enable our pantry guests to give gifts to children in their lives this Christmas.
- 9. **Lead a Nutrition Discussion.** Pantry guests have discussion groups three times each month to talk about healthy eating and cost efficient shopping ideas in the cookbook "Good and Cheap Eat Well on \$4 per day."

What to Say in Fellowship Hall (or anywhere) this Christmas... to Someone Who's Hurting

A core value of Forest Hill is being hospitable and inclusive, but sometimes it's hard making conversation in Fellowship Hall. Here are some tips on what to say—and not to say—to someone facing a less than merry Christmas.

As Lois Annich said earlier in this TOWER, it may be Christmas, but for some people, all is not "merry and bright." We expect the holidays to be fun and festive, but when you're distracted by pain or grief, Christmas can be a horrible, desperate time.

With all the hustle and bustle of the season, it's easy to forget how many people are struggling: people who are facing cancer, mental illness, or chronic pain; people who've lost their job, their child, or their spouse; people spending Christmas alone for the first time this year. These situations are bad enough the rest of the year, but they're intensified at Christmas.

As unlikely as it seems, though, Fellowship Hall can be a place to witness to people in pain that Christ is not just the "reason for the season," but a sign of hope in the face of despair. By letting the wounded among us know they're not alone we can demonstrate that their words will be heard and their feelings honored.

Here are some tips for drawing alongside someone to share God's presence and love, not just in Fellowship Hall but anywhere this Christmas:

- If you haven't experienced a similar situation, resist the temptation to say something profound. Telling someone everything will be all right when you've never known the depth of their hardship will just ring hollow.
- On the other hand, if you have faced a similar difficulty, your words and listening ear can offer comfort even if you don't know the person all that well. You don't have to be close to someone to offer comfort.

- Sitting silently with someone, offering time and space for grief to express itself, can be more valuable than anything you can say. And a silent comforting hug or touch on the shoulder can heal more than anything you might say. Resist the urge to dispense advice and wisdom.
- Not every hurting person wants company. Before offering to visit them at home ask, "Be honest: Would you like a visitor this week?"
- If you want to do more, be specific in your offer to help. Saying "If there is anything I can do, let me know" just burdens them with the responsibility to find a way for you to help. Instead, try something like:

"When can I come and take your children to the library?"
"Is tomorrow a good day to come over and clean your house?"
"May I bring you dinner this week?"

• Avoid telling someone "I can't imagine what you're going through." Although some may receive this as a heartfelt expression of sympathy, others may find it just adds to their sense of isolation and loneliness.

Finally, remember that while we may not be able to fix another's pain with our words in Fellowship Hall, reassuring someone that they have the loving support of friends is always the right thing to say.

Greater Cleveland Congregations

GCC has been busy recently! Here's a summary of their recent activity.

Organizer Training

Kathy Hanna Stauffer and Quentin Smith attended the GCC training held November 8-10. Kathy commented "The training was very eye-opening, and I would recommend it for anyone who wants to do something that makes a difference in this world." You may want to consider training next time. In the meantime, ask Kathy, Quentin and the members of the Core Team about making a difference in the world, GCC style.

New Staff

James Pearlstein, GCC's first full time Lead Organizer, is on-board as of November 1st. He will be spending the first few months listening to GCC leaders, learning about the community, connecting with community leaders and funders.

Internal Campaign

- Core Team training with other congregations has taken place this fall.
 The FHC Core Team is building relationships with St Paul's Episcopal
 Church, another Cleveland Heights congregation, and will be having
 their first meeting in November. We will get to know each other and
 and consider projects or actions we might do together.
 - Your Core Team is seeking one or two new folks to join this work.
- A Communications Committee has been formed. Its first step will be to initiate a newsletter to share GCC and congregation news with each other.

Gun Violence (GV)

- GCC is hosting a meeting to bring together youth leaders, hoping for one from each congregation, for a conversation about gun violence – to listen to how they have been shaped by gun violence, affected by it, and want to act on it.
- GCC has begun a power analysis of the 4th District (the largest residential district in Cleveland, encompassing the southeast Buckeye-Kinsman area, and the one with the most gun violence in the recent months.) Leaders from GCC congregations in the area are doing one-

on-one house meetings, reaching out to key institutions to consider possible actions.

The GV Team will be stepping up research efforts, so if gun violence is an issue that keeps you up at night and you would like to be more involved, let us know, and we will pass your name along.

Criminal Justice

- The team had a first meeting with the Monitor who will be overseeing implementation of the Consent Decree. The goal is to meet monthly and to be a strategic partner in the implementation process.
- Dr. Yvonne Conners, a GCC member from Trinity Church, was appointed a member of the Community Council for the Consent Decree. (*The Consent Decree is a legally binding agreement, established this summer, between the Dept. of Justice and the City of Cleveland to address the police excessive use of force).*
