
In Christ's love,

over statistics or gloomy predictions, but it also helps us rearticulate what we are about as a community.

With that in mind, I've been thinking about the reasons why I (still) come to church:

- 5. To sing with a group of people. I can sing by myself, but it never recreates the feeling of congregational singing and the experience of being together.
- 4. To be with people who aren't my age.
- 3. To learn about scripture. It's important to be in a place where I trust the leadership and the teaching, as it is so easy to be a google scholar and assume I have the best information.
- 2. Because I have a responsibility to be at church. This is one that has evolved, especially as now my paycheck comes from the church. But part of my commitment to the church is because I was given authority and responsibility early in my faith journey. This has cultivated a sense of belonging and purpose in the church.

And the Number One reason is...

1. To encounter the transforming love of God. This one's tricky, because I have to admit I don't always feel this while *at* church. But I almost always recognize this when I am with a group of people who are *being* the church together.

These are just a few reasons; I'm sure I could come up with more if you asked me. What I find encouraging is that Forest Hill Church does not strike me as a community of people who show up at church just because.

So that makes me ask, why do you come to church? I'd love to hear your reasons.

#### Haiti Report

The team of Forest Hill Church members who went to Haiti in November returned with good news about what they experienced! We went to the little village of Gabo where the community is managing the well for which we raised money for the purchase price. We saw Haiti Outreach in action with village leaders designing regulations for a community water system management. We attended church, visited an orphanage, went to the outdoor market, walked into Pignon and hung out on street corners. We saw progress in rebuilding the capitol, Port-au-Prince.

The experience included working alongside partners in community development and playing with kids who found us fascinating for some reason. Being able to discuss community well projects with villagers and

Haiti Outreach staff was especially important. It clarified that the work we were doing together was not merely about access to clean water, it was about transforming empowerment leading to improved sanitation, better nutrition and health, and hope for a better future.

#### The Power of Empowerment

I was skeptical when I signed up to go to Haiti on a "cultural immersion" trip --- to immerse oneself in the culture of Haiti and to observe the work and vision of Haiti Outreach, an NGO that develops community around wells. What would I see that would give me new insights into Haiti? How immersed can we be as foreigners who don't speak the language? I had been to Haiti on two other trips and I was familiar with the appalling poverty and the lack of roads, electricity, and infrastructure. But I also knew firsthand the incredible beauty of Haiti, the rugged mountains, the dignity and pride of its people, and the resilience of their spirit. If this was not a tourist trip, nor a work trip, what really is an "immersion" trip?

The main reason I was going to Haiti was to see a well. At an unforgettable fundraiser event in September 2014 at an upscale west-side Cleveland restaurant and with artist-donated quilts, paintings and glass vase, Forest Hill Church raised \$15,000 to sponsor a well. I was determined to visit "our" well, learn about the community and be able to report back to our donors and members.

I was pleased at how "immersed" we were in the local culture -- we went to the markets, spent hours and hours driving the roads and paths standing on the back of a Chevy pickup truck, worshiped at the Pentecostal church, toured the town, drank beer at the local watering hole, slurped up delicious pumpkin soup at the town diner, played with the children at the orphanage, kicked the soccer ball with the local kids and toured the town school. But believe it or not, the highlight of our trip was "well committee meetings"!! We witnessed three different communities at various stages of the well process -- in the beginning stage of acquiring a well, conducting their census and collaboratively determining the rules and management practices. Another community, finished with the preliminary work and the digging of the well, was hosting the all-important Inauguration Ceremony – a community-wide event where the keys of the well are passed along to all the players and the key ends up with the well guard - symbolizing the community now has authority and responsibility to manage the well. And the third community meeting we observed was Gabo - the community of "our" funded well - who had their Inauguration ceremony back in Dec. 2014 but were strategizing how to pay for and make repairs to the well.

At each meeting we observed members of the community - men and women, young and old - come together to take responsibility and act to improve the quality of their lives. They were empowered to make decisions to manage the well and ensure its longevity to sustain their health and community well-being. We heard (through the translator) members say - "We do not want handouts. We know we have to do this ourselves." And when we asked how the process of obtaining and managing the well has translated into other parts of their lives, they responded:

"We know how to talk to one another to resolve our disputes."

"Having the well has increased the number of households with latrines."

"We are taking the skills and principles of responsibility, authority and transparency and going to our local officials to request a school."

OMG! We were elated to see remote Haitian communities with clean water, but more importantly we saw they had something far more valuable – power. Because they did what they had not known – they organized, acted for themselves, used their own resources and improved their lives – they will now use those skills to advance other areas of their lives. The power of empowerment knows no end. Haiti Outreach is not just in the well business - they are in the empowerment business.

Our \$15,000 was WELL spent! WELL done, Haiti Outreach. WELL done Forest Hill Church. WELL done Gabo.

#### So, I've Made a Pledge. Now What?

The Forest Hill Church Stewardship Campaign has come and gone. You did your part and faithfully pledged your support. But how best to fulfill your pledge, bearing in mind that the church's financial commitments are regular and ongoing? There are a variety of ways you might want to consider.

#### Besides writing a check, how else can I fulfill my pledge?

There are several alternatives to a check and they are all easy to do. You can:

- 1. Work through your bank to set-up an automated bill pay.
- 2. Make a gift of stock.
- 3. Pay your pledge online via PayPal through the FHC website (on the right-hand side of the home page, click Give Online, or see p. 19 of this TOWER for a QR code).

#### What is the most tax advantaged way to fulfill my pledge?

All gifts to Forest Hill Church to fulfill your pledge are tax deductible. However, with a gift of highly appreciated stock, you are able to receive not only a tax deduction for the value of the gifted stock but also avoid paying capital gains tax if the gifted stock has gained in value.

#### How do I make a gift of stock?

Inform your investment advisor or stock broker of your interest in making a gift of stock to FHC, then select a stock and the number of shares you want to donate. To transfer the stock to FHC, you need to know the DTC number (0226), and the church's account number with Fidelity (Z44-320633). It is crucial that you or the stock broker contact the church's Financial Administrator, Becky Austin, to alert the church that the gift will be coming, who it is from and what stock is being gifted. Becky can be reached at BeckyA@fhcpresb.org or (216) 321-2660.

#### When can I make a gift of stock?

Another great advantage of making a gift of stock is that you can do it whenever you want. Many people gift stock when the market is high, thereby getting the most value per share. Stock gifts can be used to fulfill your pledge all at once or in increments.

### I use automated bill pay to pay my electric bill. Can I do the same to pay my pledge?

Yes, you can pay your pledge on a regular basis by using your bank's online banking services! Just set up Forest Hill Church as a regular payee as you may currently do for your utility or other reoccurring bills. There's no cost to you as most banks offer it as a free service and Forest Hill receives 100% of your payment. Automated bill paying is especially helpful when you may be away or ill. Payments are made to FHC on the dates you specify. Check your bank's website and choose "online bill pay" to get started. You may contact Becky if you have any questions or want confirmation that your gifts are being received. At this time, online bill payment is the only automated process the church has in place to receive regular pledge payments.

Your pledge, an expression of your spiritual commitment, helps to spread God's love through the many programs and ministries of Forest Hill Church. Through your pledge, you are having an impact on the hungry and the homeless, those who are ill and those grieving, those seeking hope and uplift in a sometimes dark world.

However you choose to support Forest Hill Church, your gifts are deeply appreciated. Thank you!

### Greater Cleveland Congregations: An update from the recent GCC newsletter

**James Pearlstein** has jumped in to his position as lead organizer of GCC. His immediate priorities are to recruit new west side and African American congregations in order to grow GCC in numbers, power and effectiveness, and to focus on the organization's fundraising and budget.

Criminal Justice and Gun Violence teams have voted to merge, as their concerns have become more closely aligned. Their leadership will be meeting soon to discuss how best to move forward together. The leadership also met recently with the Independent Monitor of the Department of Justice Consent Decree, Matthew Barge, who committed to meeting with us regularly.

GCC is in the midst of a listening campaign in the 4<sup>th</sup> district (much of southeast Cleveland), and in Cleveland Heights. Forest Hill Church and St. Paul's are planning a listening session at St. Paul's Episcopal Church on January 31 at 7 pm to learn of concerns around gun violence.

The team is planning a response to the Tamir Rice verdict when it is announced (this may be just before Christmas, but we expect in the next 30-60 days). Stay tuned!

The Education Team is launching another round of our "Listen. Act. Win." campaign in schools to hear what issues are priorities for parents, teachers and administrators. We also continue to build relationships between schools and congregations, and meet monthly with Eric Gordon, CEO of the Cleveland Metropolitan School District. Efforts are underway to assess needs in Cleveland Heights and other districts as well.

Look for a large GCC-wide action at 7 pm on February 16 that will focus on the county prosecutor and judges in preparation for the primary election on March 15th.
