Password Protected

Passwords are nothing new (see Judges 12:6), but we certainly type them out more frequently these days. Whether it's to log on to your computer, access your bank account, sign into Facebook, check your email, or pay a bill, all of these things require a password. Not only do you need a password for each account you have, but each one requires a different password with a secure combination of numbers, letters, and cases.

How do you come up with these secure passwords? I have a suggestion for you that I have been following for a few years now. Take one of your favorite bible verses or one you have been meaning to memorize. Take the first letter of each word. When you place those letters together along with the verse chapter and number you will have a gibberish string of text that only makes sense to you.

For example, 1 Corinthians 16:14, "Let all that you do be done in love" becomes Latydbdil1614. Or Psalm 16:1, "Protect me, O God, for in you I take refuge" becomes PmOGfiyltr161. If you were feeling particularly clever, your bank password could be Proverbs 13:8, Wiarfaplbtpgnt.

Hint: I wouldn't recommend using any of these as they have now been shared.

Not only does this method help keep your online information secure, but it provides a brief devotional moment in the midst of our busy world. As passwords should be changed frequently, this also gives you an opportunity to grow your collection of memorized scripture.

In the words of the Psalmist, Pbwywaswyt!1227

Have fun! Be creative! Favorite hymn passages also work well. Keep track of your passwords in an old-fashioned address book.

Greater Cleveland Congregations Report: Gun Violence Reduction

Leaders of the *Do Not Stand Idly By (DNSIB)** gun violence reduction campaign are applauding President Obama's continuing efforts to make "smart guns" available for government and individual gun purchasers.

"Smart guns" employ user-recognition technology to prevent firing by unauthorized users. Making this technology widely available is projected to reduce gun-related deaths from suicides, homicides and accidental shootings.

In January, President Obama ordered reports on gun violence reduction from the Departments of Justice, Defense and Homeland Security. On April 29, the White House announced a plan of action based on those reports that adopts several key DNSIB recommendations:

- Develop federal specifications to guide manufacturers to meet the growing demand for smart guns, and guide the future buying decisions of law enforcement agencies. (Local, state and federal governments collectively represent 40% of America's gun market.)
- Provide resources for law enforcement agencies interested in purchasing smart guns. (DNSIB called for federal subsidies to offset the increased costs of smart guns, until the technology matures and costs come down.)
- Convene public officials from across the U.S. to share strategies for reducing gun violence.

Other DNSIB recommendations, such as leveraging the negotiation of the Army's \$580 million handgun contract, were not included in the plan. According to DNSIB co-chair Rabbi Joel Mosbacher, the government needs to do more, but "today's report [is] welcome news. These actions are real. They're well thought-through. [They're] a clear signal to gun manufacturers that the largest gun purchaser in the nation – the federal government – is in the market for smarter, safer guns."

DNSIB plans to bring this message to Sturm, Ruger & Co, a publicly traded company that is one of the largest gun manufacturers in the world and a major U.S. government contractor.

"Earlier this week, a three-year-old boy in Georgia shot and killed himself accidentally with his father's gun," said Cleveland DNSIB leader Donna Weinberger. "News reports say the gun was made by Sturm Ruger. Incidents like this would be prevented by smart-gun technology." Clergy and citizen representatives from North Carolina, New Jersey and Ohio will attend Sturm Ruger's annual shareholder meeting to ask executives to respond to growing interest in smart-gun technology.

DNSIB has been working to build support among law enforcement leaders across the country for smart guns, including holding the nation's first Smart Gun Show, where police departments could see and shoot smart gun models.

* The Metro Industrial Areas Foundation (Metro IAF)--a network of religious congregations, unions, schools and civic groups encouraging public-sector leaders to use their firearms purchasing power to create change in the gun industry--launched DNSIB in 2013. Greater Cleveland Congregations is a leader in the DNSIB campaign. This report is adapted from a GCC email announcement.

DNSIB held an open forum on June 23rd to share ideas of actions individuals can take. We will share that information as soon as it's available – stay tuned.

Medicaid: Our congregation sent over 60 letters to Governor Kasich and the Heath Planning Administrator. These were in protest of proposed legislation that would make it difficult for Medicaid recipients who gained coverage under Obama's Health Care Act, to continue receiving benefits. The status of the legislation is uncertain, but we know our collective voice was heard. Diana Woodbridge did a fabulous job coordinating this campaign at FHC.

Jobs Listening Campaign: Charity MacDonald, Jeff Smith, and new member Leslie Pendleton are leading the listening campaign to hear the stories of community and congregational members regarding difficulty finding employment and of business leaders on obstacles to hiring. This campaign will help establish a long-term strategy to create employment in the region. Fundraising: FHC led the annual fundraising campaign with a lovely wine/cheese and viola music event at Diana's beautiful home. This event was organized by Steve Sedam, who has extensive experience in fundraising for non-profits. Together FHC contributed over \$4000!
