#NOTALLIN press conference was held January 11 outside the Q Arena. GCC asked that consideration by the City of Cleveland and Cuyahoga County to provide \$106 million of taxpayer money to upgrade the arena be made open to public debate. One of our demands is that a matching amount be designated for the city neighborhoods, jobs and schools. Crain's and Cleveland.com also denounce this funding as corporate welfare. **We believe this is bad public policy, a bad public process, and deeply immoral—a term we do not use lightly.** About 50 members were present at the press conference; 9 of us, including Rev. John Lentz, were representing FHC.

We are excited to announce that John Lentz has agreed to participate on the Strategy Team. Diana Woodbridge is already a member. Cleveland Heights Housing Issue Team made great inroads in 2016, focusing on the Noble neighborhood. The energy of this team has brought hope and change to the area by initiating city clean up of vacant properties and action on foreclosed houses. The city staff responsible for addressing these issues have been identified and encouraged to act. With our urging, 3 new housing related positions were added to the budget by City Council.

Stayed tuned as we work with GCC in 2017 to make a difference in the lives of all who live and work in Cleveland and Cuyahoga County.

FHC Makes History With the 2017 Serve One Another Campaign
