# Who Has Changed Your Life?

Dear Friends,

Last week I received word that one of the most important men of my life His name was Herb Meza; he lived to be 94 years old; he was a mentor and a friend. He was a pastor. He was married to Fran, one of the smartest, coolest, most beautiful women in the world. Some of you met him 22 years ago when he came to Cleveland to baptize our daughter Meg and stayed with Kermit and Barb Lind.

I was the Associate Pastor of Winchester First Presbyterian when Herb came as the Interim to replace the retiring minister. I had never met anyone He was bald and bow-legged; he was brilliant, funny, and charismatic; he was one of the best preachers I ever heard. His prayers were famous. I will never forget one morning in his pastoral prayer he asked the Lord to bless couples with "good sex." In the same prayer he thanked God for butterscotch pie. Clearly, for Herb, God was involved in EVERYTHING!

He was born in Ybor City, near Tampa, Florida. He was the son of a Spanish father and Cuban mother. He was a hooligan when he was young, running with a tough crowd. He once told me that he remembered signs posted on the beach: "No dogs or Latinos"! He killed a Japanese soldier in hand-to-hand combat and was twice awarded a Purple Heart for his service as a marine in the Pacific during WW II.

Like St. Paul who changed from persecutor to chief proclaimer of Jesus Christ, Herb changed from warrior to peace activist and social agitator. After the war he attended Davidson College and Union Theological Seminary. In 1960 he organized the Houston Ministerial Society to host presidential candidate John F. Kennedy to allay fears about a Catholic becoming president. This meeting probably delivered Texas to Kennedy.

In 1983 Herb won the Presbyterian Peace Seekers Award, met Pope John Paul II, and was Vice-Moderator of our denomination.

Herb loved Don Quixote. He chased many a windmill. He made me want to chase them too! He was both a romantic and a realist. He was playful, naughty, profound, charming... I run out of words.

If you ever hear me say in a sermon: "Nothing is good or bad until God gets through with it" or "God writes straight with crooked lines," those are Herbisms! He never stopped loving Jesus with all his heart and mind and soul. Herb never stopped loving life and living it to the full. stopped loving people of every shade, shape, and size. I loved him very much!

Thanks be to God for the life of the Rev. Dr. Herbert Meza.

#### Children's Education

Lent is a time of waiting - 40 days of waiting, to be precise. During this time the days grow longer and winter gives way to spring. Lent, deriving its name from the Latin word for "lengthen" is a time to slow down. It is an invitation to look honestly at one's self, to reflect and create space for God. During this period, as we prepare for Easter, the church will be dressed in purple (just as it was during Advent). Ask your children what changes they notice in their surroundings. Consider how your family would like to prepare for Easter. Perhaps you will set aside time for quiet prayer/reflection, or make a 40 link prayer chain to recognize each passing day. Maybe you will set aside time to clean up your home and create space for what really matters. Whatever you choose, take time to discuss it as a family.

#### Children's Worship Preschool and kindergarten

The children in this group, ages 3-5, follow the play-based model of Young Children in Worship. After listening to a story told in a sensorimotor style, the children are given space in which to respond (using art, story re-telling, clay, etc.). In March, Children's Worship will focus on the Faces of Easter in preparation for our Easter celebration.

#### Pathways to the Promise Land Grades 1-5

In March, Pathways children will meet with Kay Dunlap to learn more about the Trustees. Focusing on several of our core values (welcoming, learning, discerning & witnessing), the kids will gather for conversation and activities. Most importantly, they will deepen their understanding of what ministry is and cultivate better relationships with one another.

# **Embracing Stewardship**

The Stewardship Ministry has started the year by reading the book Embracing Stewardship by Charles R. Lane and Grace Duddy Pomroy. The authors share their perspectives on stewardship from their respective generations – Grace, a Millennial, and Charles of the Boomer Generation. In the first two chapters they focus on the concept of stewardship and how it has come to be regarded by the average congregation member.

It is very common in many churches to think of "stewardship" as the annual fall campaign or how the church pays the bills. However, they remark, it is important to reclaim this term and remember that the word steward means a person who cares for something that belongs to someone else. As Christians we recognize that everything belongs to God and we are merely caring for it. And while it does include our financial resources it is so much more. Grace Pomroy writes,

Stewardship is the way we use the abundance that God has entrusted to our care to love God and our neighbor. Stewardship is about more than money, offering plates, and pledges. It is the way that we love God and neighbor with our whole lives - not just our wallets. Understood this way, stewardship is life giving and life encompassing. Stewardship is discipleship. Living as a follower of Jesus requires not just all of my heart, but also all of my assets, all of my talents, all of my time - in short my whole life.

This is no small task! How are you being a steward in your life?

# **Greater Cleveland Congregations**

#NOTALLIN campaign got off to an overwhelming start on Valentine's Day when the largest crowd ever (2/3 of whom were opposed to the deal), filled the Cuyahoga County Council meeting. We expressed our concern that the Q Arena renovation deal, as it has been announced, continues a familiar pattern: taxpayer-funded development at the expense of our neighborhoods. We know that successful sports venues will likely bring thriving business, benefiting everyone. But we also want jobs for our unemployed citizens, help for those suffering from mental illness and addiction, and the physical rebuilding of our neighborhoods. As this deal was first announced, the total cost for facility renovation, including loan interest and funds for future stadium work, is estimated at \$282 million, \$160 million of which would come from public sources that could be better spent elsewhere. If there is enough money for arena remodeling there should also be enough money for our communities' most pressing needs.

We are calling for a *Community Equity Fund* (CEF) that will match the city and county's investment into the Q Arena project and will be funded through a direct stake in the Q deal. A CEF will directly link the growth and prosperity of one of our region's strongest economic engines, downtown Cleveland, with the improvement of the neighborhoods and communities of the whole city and county.

Other cities have created tax-payer funded stadium and capital deals which also produced funding for direct community benefits. In Milwaukee, owners of the Bucks contributed \$30 million to address foreclosed and dilapidated housing in the inner-city. In Baltimore, Under Armour negotiated a \$135 million community benefits agreement with residents in the form of new affordable housing and jobs for residents from distressed neighborhoods. The Nationals, of Washington DC, negotiated a Tax Increment Financing District that funneled millions of dollars to neighborhood development across the city. We want our community to be as innovative as these cities. Our strong presence at the Council Meeting was successful in slowing down the legislative process to ensure public comment and that our representatives are accountable to us. We need your help to further demonstrate the power behind our proposal.

Come to the **Public Hearing on the Q Deal on Thursday, March 9 at 7 pm**, at Elizabeth Baptist Church, 6114 Francis Ave. All the County Council members have been invited. Express your strong opposition to the deal as it has been announced. If you live in the city of Cleveland, contact both your city councilmember and county councilmember. Please ask your neighbors, friends, and colleagues to do the same. Let's generate hundreds of calls!

#### Earth Care Call to Action

Everyone should now be aware of the directions that our government threatens to take affecting Earth Care: abolishing EPA, opening up federal lands for development, anti-wilderness and wildlife legislation (to name a few). Our faith now demands that we take action. PCUSA Presbyterians for Earth Care strongly recommends that we "Make Our Voice Known, Get Involved." To that end –

Pray, host a vigil, become informed, take action!

- Call or correspond with your elected officials! Daily, weekly, monthly!
- Make an appointment to visit the local Congressional offices.

These sites will give you detailed information on how to contact your Congressional representatives, their voting records, and pending legislation.

Of particular current note is recently introduced House Bill HB 861, which would abolish the EPA! Contact your representative (Marcia Fudge or David Joyce for most of you) and tell them how you feel about the importance and long-range effects of this bill.
