There is no fear in love, but perfect love casts out fear

1 John 4:18

Dear Friends,

The author of this beautiful letter found in the New Testament speaks powerfully to our world in this time. There is a sense of anxiety that I hear from many and admit to feeling in my own life. Certainly the political climate of our day doesn't help. It is tense. At Forest Hill Church there is talk about change in structure and leadership that causes "dis-ease." Even among people who have known each other for years there are topics and opinions better left untouched in certain company because you just don't know what to say, how to react, or what the reaction will be.

Fear and anxiety do things to our psyche and to our community. Fear has evolved over the millennia to save us from danger. But fear can wear you down. Constant anxiety is bad for your health. Fear creates its own worldview of suspicion and nostalgia. And when our fears are grounded in irrationality or psychosis, they can be deadly.

The author of this biblical letter lifts up love as the antidote to fear. First we trust that "God is love!" (1 John 4: 8) and "God so loved the world that he sent his only Son!" (John 3: 16) When love for God and love for neighbor are your guideposts, then you have fulfilled all the commandments (Matthew 22: 37). And love for neighbor, as the scriptures teaches us, means much more than

caring for the person living next to you, or those who share your values. The "neighbor" includes everybody — especially those you don't really like! Love trumps hate! Love overcomes fear!

Love also creates its own worldview of curiosity, creativity, hospitality and hope. Love creates community. Love reflects the very heart of God "We love because God first loved us!" (1 John 4: 19)

So, in the midst of the tension, take one minute a day to bathe in God's love for you. Soak it up! Hold up others to the light of God's love, particularly those with whom you are in disagreement, or are frustrated or angry. Do at least one thing a day that releases love into the world (start by turning off news broadcasts?) From your energy comes the power to heal the world, create community and restore your own self.

Finally, beloved, whatever is true, whatever is honorable, whatever is just, whatever is pure, whatever is pleasing, whatever is commendable, if there is any excellence and if there is anything worthy of praise, think about these things. Keep on doing the things you have learned and received and heard and seen in me, and the God of peace will be with you. (Philippians 4: 8-9)

Forest Hill Church – A Guide on the Inward and Outward Christian Journeys

Grace Uhle believes that "the Christian life is supposed to involve both an inward journey and an outward journey." Grace, a member of Forest Hill for 12 years, exemplifies this by attending worship regularly, maintaining a personal prayer practice, participating in adult education classes, and helping out with the Abundance Pantry program.

In 1987, Grace also helped to establish New Life Community, a transitional housing program for homeless families (New Life merged with Interfaith Hospitality Network in 2011 to form Family Promise of Greater Cleveland). While at New Life, she observed that the children had very prescribed lives and were beholden to the schedules and needs of their families. "I'm very interested in the arts and creativity, so I tried to think of a way that we could have a program at New Life that would help the children have some pleasant times." Grace had an idea to create a place where the kids could have some choices about what they do, but couldn't quite get the idea off the ground.

Then in the fall of 2007 Grace took part in Faith Leader, a lay leadership program at Forest Hill Church. For her Personal Plan for Ministry, Grace cofounded "Hands-On-Art" at New Life Community. Twice a month for about an hour kids come together and make art - "expressive art with a lot of choices for the kids as to what they do with it...what colors they use, what kinds of brushes, how they manipulate the clay, all those things are up to them." She reflected, "The kids were usually very pleased...And I think it was enriching for them. They were usually eager to come back. I think for some of them it was just a chance to do something fun that didn't have a lot of requirements."

"Hands-On-Art" was established in the spring of 2008, and Grace continued to volunteer for the next six years. The program still exists as part of Family Promise of Greater Cleveland. When asked what her take-away from the experience was she commented, "...that it's very important to be in small groups in the church, and have some accountability and inspiration to new learning...Forest Hill Church offers such a wealth of different opportunities."

Black History Corner

Larry Doby – Baseball Pioneer – July 5, 1947

Today in American and international sports, it is not unusual to see many black players starring for our beloved baseball, football and basketball teams. But only 70 years ago this summer, Cleveland Indians' owner Bill Veeck signed Larry Doby from the Negro League Newark Eagles, and on July 5, 1947, Larry Doby became the second African-American in all of Major League Baseball (just 6 weeks after Jackie Robinson) and the first in the American League. Prior to Jackie Robinson's and Larry Doby's debuts, black players were prohibited from playing in the major leagues and were limited to playing in the all-black Negro League.

Although July 5, 1947, in Chicago White Sox' Comiskey Park was a momentous event for Larry Doby and baseball, it was fraught with many challenges and indignities reflecting the entrenched racism in Major League Baseball and throughout America during the peak of the Jim Crow era. That night, upon being introduced to his new teammates in the locker room, "I walked down that line, stuck out my hand, and very few hands came back in return. Most of the ones that did were cold-fish handshakes, along with a look that said, 'You don't belong here," Doby remembered years later. In fact 4 players did not even shake his hand and 2 actually turned their backs to him. When the players went on the field to warm up, Doby stood there for several minutes before second baseman Joe Gordon finally asked Doby to play catch with him. Gordon would befriend Doby and became one of his closest friends.

Author Joseph Thomas Moore, in his book *Pride Against Prejudice: The Biography of Larry Doby*, recounts, "After the game, Doby quickly showered...in the Cleveland clubhouse. His escort...then took him not to the

Del Prado Hotel downtown, where the Indians players stayed, but to the black DuSable Hotel in Chicago's predominantly black South Side, near Comiskey Park. The segregated arrangement established a pattern, on Doby's first day, that he would be compelled to follow ... in many cities, throughout his playing career."

Doby made only a pinch-hitting appearance that first night and struck out, but in the years to follow Larry Doby would have an illustrious career with the Cleveland Indians, Chicago White Sox and Detroit Tigers. He was named to the American League All-Star team 7 times and was a critical part of 2 Cleveland World Series teams. In 1998, Larry Doby was elected to the Baseball Hall of Fame and in 2015, the Indians erected a statute of Larry Doby at Progressive Field.

So this summer as you settle in to watch the Tribe, remember the groundbreaking legacy of Larry Doby in the fight against hatred and racism. In a July 29, 2012 retrospective on Doby's career, *The New York Times* wrote, "In glorifying those who are first, the second is often forgotten ... Larry Doby integrated all those American League ball parks where Jackie Robinson never appeared. And he did it with class and clout."

The Apostles Build Project

Greater Cleveland Habitat for Humanity believes in a world where everyone has a decent place to live. They work to end substandard housing by renovating simple, decent affordable houses for lower income families earning between 30-60% of the average median income. Since 1987 they have built/rehabbed almost 200 homes providing permanent housing for over 700 children. They accomplish their mission by working in partnership with well over 1200 volunteers annually and through the generosity of donors.

Forest Hill church will be participating in Habitat's annual Apostles Build project where 12 churches come together to build or fully rehab a Habitat for Humanity house. Each church raises $1/12^{th}$ of the funds and provides $1/12^{th}$ of the labor to build a house in partnership with a local family. The idea of going out into the community to serve others, in the way that Jesus' apostles served, has attracted individuals in many churches all over the world. With Habitat for Humanity, churches can share God's love by building houses or fully rehabbing them.

For the 3rd year, Forest Hill Church will be participating in this year's Apostles Build. Our church along with other churches in the Cleveland area will be fully funding the rehabilitation of a house in the Stockyards area on the west side. We have committed to providing volunteers on 3 days. **June 10**: Neighborhood spruce-up day, **July 22**: Build Day, and **August 10**: Build day.

Earth Care Notes

- As we approach into June and with it summer holidays, picnics vacations, graduations, and weddings, the Earth Care Team offers a few reminders and concerns.
- We will do a Forest Hill Park cleanup after church on Sunday, May 21. Bring clothes and shoes to change into, and gloves; you will receive a genuine garbage bag with which to tromp around the Heights section of Forest Hill Park for 45 minutes gathering trash. (if you are reading this after May 21, and couldn't help out, grab a plastic bag and spend 15 minutes picking up trash anywhere, anytime).
- Are/were you able to contact your local municipality regarding recycling of bulky metal items and electronics? We regret that it is not possible to arrange a pick-up at FH as we have done in the past.
- Make your garden wildlife-habitat friendly! Plant species that are favorites of butterflies, install hummingbird feeders, 'wilderness' plots for little creatures, and drinking water. One website to get you started is http://www.humanesociety.org/ From the home page, search for "wildlife habitat garden" – you will be offered a number of useful articles.
- Use Rainbarrels and prepare drainage areas to capture water appropriately for re-use. More information may be found at http://www.cuyahogaswcd.org/programs/rain-barrels
- Above all, on a national scale, the Trump administration, the Presidents' executive orders, and Congressional approval have overturned many environmental regulations that govern clean water, land usage, restraints on drilling and other development on public lands, wilderness and wildlife protection---especially in Alaska---and threaten to thwart US participation in the Paris Climate Agreement. Contact your Congressional Representatives and urge them to support protection for the environment and to propose or support new protective legislation.
