We enter the season of Advent filled with the expectation of Christmas. The word "Advent" comes from Old English, which came from Latin *adventus* 'arrival,' from *advenire*, from *ad-* 'to' + *venire* 'come.'



We await the coming of Jesus. Some await the coming of family home for the holidays. Others await the onset of sadness, loneliness and depression.

As we all know, the coming of Jesus is not the coming of a king in all the finery, or the inauguration of a President. It is not an arrival of someone with earthly power. Jesus comes as one among us, as one of us - as a baby in need of food and attention.

As old and as well-known as this story is I find it fresh every year! When Jesus was born the world was in turmoil. Rome ruled. People who were in Palestine lived a subsistent existence; no one could count on a long or peaceful life.

For Christians to believe in a God that comes as a helpless baby was (and still is, if you think about it) a radical thought. In the first century and in our day too, power was identified with wealth and status. We believe that God was born poor and on the margins.

Christ identifies with the poor and the marginalized. Christ identifies with you. So prepare your lives to receive the infant king. Trust that God loves you. If this is a tender time for you, you are not alone. If this is an overwhelming time for you, you are not alone. If this is a joyful time for you, rejoice and be glad, be generous and take time in the rush to hush and listen. Perhaps this is the year for you to hear the angels singing and the star shining. "For unto us a child is born, for unto us a son is given!"

As I write this article, the melody and words of the hymn "While We Are Waiting, Come" are playing over and over again in my head. It's a beautiful piece, one which we sing as the wreath is lit in worship each week of Advent. The music is meditative, and very simply expresses our deepest longings for Christ's presence in a way that transcends language.

This year's Advent theme is "Expectation." There are a variety of ways to think about expectation, such as waiting for good things to come, patiently waiting in hope for that which is not yet seen, and even in a somewhat negative vein setting ourselves up for unrealistic outcomes, as in the saying that an expectation is an anticipated resentment. What does the word "expectation" evoke in you as you think about preparing your heart for the birth of Christ? What expectations do you have as we move into the season of Advent, especially given our culture's secular expectations of big, "perfect" decorations and celebrations?

John and I invite you to share in some centering practices on Saturday morning, December 9 from 9:00 -11:30 in Bodwell Hall. Our aim is to hold the space for peace and presence so we have tools to wait with open minds and hearts for the birth of Christ. Based on the feedback we received from October's "Pause That Refreshes" mini-retreat, we know that these kinds of practices are needed and helpful, especially in the busyness of our daily lives. Please come join us for a time of simple music, lectio divina, bodily movement and breath work that will bless and ground our Advent journey.

We need RSVPs to help with planning, so please let the church office know you will be coming. Child care will be provided! We hope to see you on the December 9.

# Calling a Co-Pastor: First Steps

The Co-Pastor Nominating Committee (CPNC) has been working diligently since July to lay the groundwork for calling a co-pastor to Forest Hill Church. The process is one of discernment and is both exciting and daunting. We meet almost every week to ask and answer questions such as: who is Forest Hill Church as a faith community, what is our vision for ministry, how are we called to address the emerging needs of our community and how a new co-pastor will help us achieve our mission. We have spent a fair number of hours discussing the characteristics and leadership competencies that we would like to see in prospective candidates.

The Committee has not started from scratch. We are relying on the recent work of the Discernment Task Force, which recommended the co-pastor leadership model, to develop a clear vision of what to seek in candidates. That recommendation was based on direct input from the congregation, staff and leadership of the church.

Much of this first phase of work has focused on distilling that vision into a concise narrative form that will be approved by both our Session and the Committee on Ministry, Presbytery of the Western Reserve. This information will then be posted on the website of the PC(USA) Church Leadership Connection (CLC). This website has global access and visibility. The CLC will match the Forest Hill Church information with that of pastors who are seeking positions and then provide referrals to the CPNC.

In addition, advertisements will be provided to select media and seminaries. Other important networks will be explored to find additional ways to reach appropriate candidates. The Committee will screen and interview candidates as referrals and inquiries are received.

We invite you to join us in prayer for the person that God is calling to be in relationship with Forest Hill Church as our co-pastor. We also invite you to pray for our faith community that we will be prepared to joyfully receive that person. And, pray for the Committee's faithful discernment of God's will for Forest Hill Church.

But if one honors faithfully the more meditative and preparation-minded spirit of the four Advent weeks, one may find that the actual Christmas holidays (all *twelve* days!) are all the more meaningful. As the pastors choose the hymns and carols during Advent, watch the progression as we gradually move, with anticipation, toward the celebration of the birth of Christ. *O Come, O Come Emmanuel*!

I give thanks to our resident trumpeters, Scott Lafferty and Ahren Stock, who will add a festive touch to our Advent and Christmas services.

Musical highlights during December include two performances of Menotti's

Christmas opera, *Amahl and the Night Visitors*, on Saturday, Dec. 9 at 7 pm and Sunday, Dec. 10 at 4 pm. The main roles will be sung by Henry Dyck (Amahl); Lara Troyer (Amahl's mother); Mist'a Craig, Carl Jenks, Frank Ward (the three kings); and Jack Lentz (the page). The story is about Amahl, a disabled boy who can walk only with a crutch, who has a problem with telling tall



tales. He and his mother are visited by the Three Kings, and a miracle occurs. Please invite friends to join you. The rehearsals for this special event are going splendidly. All will be deeply moved by this poignant story and sublime music.

Our traditional *Lessons and Carols* service will be held on Dec. 17 at 11 am. *A Festival of Lessons and Carols* was first sung in 1918 at King's College in Cambridge, England, and this annual service is now broadcast to millions of listeners worldwide. The service begins with the singing of the carol *Once in Royal David's City*. A young boy singer (treble) is chosen to sing the solo first stanza just before the start of the service, and it is considered a great honor to be chosen.

On December 24, **Christmas Eve**, the children will present the annual Christmas pageant as part of the festive morning service at 11:00 am. The Sine Nomine and Chancel choirs will sing at the lovely 11:00 pm Candlelight Service. A fifteen-minute musical prelude will precede the 11:00 pm service, so come early!



# Gearing up for Winter

## Description of Classes:

**Chair Yoga**: A gentle yoga practice using the breath and a chair to move through poses while sitting, standing or a combination of both.

**Hatha Yoga**: Is a form of mind and body exercise using the breath and poses as a way of increasing stamina and vitality with the purpose of living a more relaxed day-to-day life. The class both flows slowly *and* holds poses allowing the body to deepen into the postures. Modifications are always offered and encouraged.

**Beginners' Yoga**: This class is appropriate for those just beginning a yoga practice or for those who have been away from yoga for a while. And introduction to the names of poses is given, easy breathing techniques and healthy body alignment cues. As well as how to use yoga tools and pose modifications to introduce flexibility.

**Gentle Yoga**: Emphasis is on moving softly and slowly in both seated and standing poses. The class offers a nurturing approach to pose modifications and compassionate awareness to pre-existing injuries.




