I love the holy season of Lent. In fact, I have at times felt sad when the season ended. I really appreciate having a prescribed time period and structure that encourages me to deepen my relationship with God. Lent was originally intended as a time of instruction and devotion for Christian converts who were preparing to join the church, but soon caught on generally as a time to fast, pray, study, and perform good deeds in imitation of Jesus' life and work. The 40 days of Lent echo Jesus' 40 days in the wilderness where he dealt with temptation but also prepared himself for the ministry to which he was called.

While some ancient texts call for "mortifying the flesh" as a way of practicing discipline and humility in Lent, I have never been one to wear a hair shirt or flagellate myself, even in a symbolic way. We may well feel remorse, sadness or grief as we ponder Jesus' life and the reality of our lives and world, but our contemplations are meant in the end to bring us to the joy of Easter. I believe that Lent is a time to grow in awareness of God's love for all creation and the ways we can better reflect that love.

This Lent John and I will be preaching a sermon series based on Romans 12:1-2:

I appeal to you therefore, brothers and sisters, by the mercies of God, to present your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and acceptable to God, which is your spiritual worship. Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your minds, so that you may discern what is the will of God—what is good and acceptable and perfect. What does it mean to present our bodies as a living sacrifice (and not, as a colleague used to quip, as a "charred, burnt offering")? How do we renew our minds and not be conformed to this world? What fears, resentments, judgments, and unexamined beliefs and behaviors keep us from claiming our identity as God's beloved people? What tools do we need as we seek to be faithful followers of Jesus Christ? How will our Lenten journey bring us to the joy of Easter?

We're really excited to explore these kinds of questions with you. We hope to see you regularly in worship this Lent – it's a season that can truly make a difference in our discipleship and everyday lives.

Did you ever wonder about.....Ash Wednesday?

Ash Wednesday, the first day of Lent in Western Christianity, occurs 46 days before Easter; however, only 40 of the 46 days require the abandonment or inclusiveness of one's Lenten commitment(s). On Sundays during Lent, that commitment is relinquished. The 40 required days mirror the 40 days Jesus spent in the desert being tempted by Satan; however, the 6 Sundays in the Lenten period commemorate the Sunday of Christ's resurrection and in celebration, and the Lenten commitment, such as fasting, is considered inappropriate. This is not new information to many. What may be new information is the concept of "Ashes to Go".

"Ashes to Go" is a movement that began in 2007 where clergy from major Christian churches went outside of their churches to distribute ashes to the public, even to people waiting in their cars for the traffic light to change. By 2013 the movement had spread to the United Kingdom, Canada and South Africa. In one Irish town, a Catholic Priest set up a station for commuters to receive ashes in their cars. Within the United States, 34 states and the District of Columbia had at least one church participating. One United Methodist church in Chicago reported that at least 300 individuals participated in the "Ashes to Go" program in 2016.

Ash Wednesday is a movable date based on the cycles of

the moon, which determine the date of Easter. The earliest possible date it can occur is February 4th when Easter is on March 22nd. This happened in 1598, 1693, 1761, and 1818 and will next occur in 2096.

The latest date Ash Wednesday can occur is March 10th when Easter falls on April 25th which occurred in 1666, 1734, 1886, and 1943 and will next occur in 2038.

Ash Wednesday has never occurred on Leap Year Day (February 29th); however, it will occur on this date in 2096. The only other years that will have Ash Wednesday on February 29th are 2468, 2688, 2840 and 2992. (Ash Wednesday falls on February 29th only if Easter is on April 15th (in a leap year that starts on a Sunday.)

During this century, Ash Wednesday will only occur on Valentine's Day this year 2018, 2024, and finally, 2029.

Earth Care Advocacy

As we begin the new year, let's briefly reflect on what has transpired in the year just past, particularly with respect to the administration's attack on Earth Care – a rejection of global

warming and climate change, undoing expanded protection for national monument areas, approval of the oil transport pipeline through the Midwest, the potential opening of the Artic National Wildlife Refuge (AWNR) to drilling and mining, attack on the EPA. The list goes on.

These political and economic-based decisions threaten and debase many aspects of our corner of Planet Earth – including the rights of native legacy peoples, air and water quality, wildlife habitat and diversity, and nature in general which God has given us for responsible human governance and activity.

What are we to do? *Advocate for natural resource protection*, of course; there are two ways we can do this in addition to thoughtful prayer. One way is to contact our elected representatives and voice our concerns. However, those folks may not serve on the committees in Congress which deal with environmental matters.



Another way is to support the **Natural Resources Defense Council (NRDC).** This is by far the most visible American NGO with the most legal clout in Washington; it is an effective environmental lobby organization, actively addressing issues not only in Congress but also in the courts. They have a proven track record of achieving positive action against environmental degradation on several fronts, and are worthy

of our attention and support. You may or may not choose to support them financially, but when you are on their mailing list it is but a simple <u>click</u> of your computer to voice your support for letters and petitions throughout the year, adding to over 100,000 individuals and families. These numbers make a difference and assist NRDC in their work.




