

Scripture Lessons

Deuteronomy 18: 15-20

The Lord your God will raise up for you a prophet like me from among your own people; you shall heed such a prophet. This is what you requested of the Lord your God at Horeb on the day of the assembly when you said: "If I hear the voice of the Lord my God any more, or ever again see this great fire, I will die." Then the Lord replied to me: "They are right in what they have said. I will raise up for them a prophet like you from among their own people; I will put my words in the mouth of the prophet, who shall speak to them everything that I command. Anyone who does not heed the words that the prophet shall speak in my name, I myself will hold accountable. But any prophet who speaks in the name of other gods, or who presumes to speak in my name a word that I have not commanded the prophet to speak—that prophet shall die."



Please note: We have a list of over 60 black-owned restaurants and caterers on our church web site. *Go to the church home page and you will see it there.* We who created this list have eaten at many of these places. However, we have NOT screened all the places on this list.

Many kinds of food services are listed, from formal restaurants to takeout only, and from limited-menu specialty caterers to those with a broad repertoire. We know that one size does not fit all!



We encourage you to look at their web sites and read reviews on the internet to help you choose a place you will like.
