We have a new Director of Family, Children and Youth Ministry, the Rev. David Wigger. Some of you have met him and seen him in action. He is an amazingly talented person with a deep faith and passion for his ministry. We are blessed to have him on the staff.

With the children in the worship service, the Worship Ministry and Family, Children and Youth ministry have collaborated to plan new ways to incorporate our children and youth into Sunday worship.

Keep your eyes open for other new things that will be popping up now and again. You will find surprises happening throughout the year – you won't want to miss even one Sunday.

Even though Anne Wilson and I (the old-timers!!) will still be around, we have a lot of new things to try. Anne is full of surprises!

Sometime in the course of this program year the Co-Pastor Nominating Committee will have great news for us that will set us on a new path of discovery and faith.

Bring friends and spread the news. I am really looking forward to what God has in store for us. Keep your eyes and hearts open!

From the Director of Family, Youth and Children's Programs

I have spent the summer trying to familiarize myself with the program and trying to organize for the year. I am very excited about the number of volunteers who have expressed interest, but we always need more. If you have been considering whether or not to help out, please reach out and we can have a conversation.

See, I Am Doing a New Thing is our church theme this year, and is very appropriate for what the fall programming will look like. We will be experimenting with new formats and trying to get ready for a larger conversation about the program's future.

Children's Worship Class (~3-5 year-olds) and the **Nursery care** (infants/toddlers) will continue relatively the same way as before. Both will meet during the worship service.

The biggest change will be the timing of our **Pathways** program for Elementary (1st-5th grade) kids. Last spring parents voted on a time-change to *before* worship. So, for the fall, Pathways will meet from 10:10-10:55 am on Sunday mornings. Children will then worship with the congregation in the sanctuary. Later, we will have a families/volunteers meeting to decide on the future continuation of that time. Be on the lookout for information about that meeting, which will probably take place in December.

As part of that change, we have been discussing ways to involve the children and youth in the worship service more. This includes an activity time for kids during the sermon, which we started this summer. It also means asking our children and youth to lead worship in new ways.

The **Youth** program for Middle and Senior High (6th-12th grade) this year will focus on offering opportunities for *study*, *fellowship*, *worship*, and *service*. A youth Sunday School class will meet in the *Ruah* room on Sunday mornings from 10:10-10:55. We will start together, and then break into discussion groups along Middle/High school lines. Chances for fellowship and service will be offered after church on Sundays. We will continue with the House Church worship services started by Shannon.

We are also offering family events throughout the year. This fall/winter we have three events already lined up:

September 22: Green Eggs and Ham Mini-Opera

October 6: Blessing of the Animals

December 1: Christmas Cookie Carnival

Music Notes

Have you heard that singing in a choir lowers stress levels and leaves one with feelings of euphoria and contentment? With all that's going on in our world, perhaps it's time to consider joining a choir!

The 2018-2019 choir season is about to begin. Those who participated last year will receive an email, but here's the general information for persons who may be interested in finding out about the musical opportunities at Forest Hill Church:

Chancel Choir (adults; high school and college students warmly welcomed): 1st rehearsal will be Thursday, Sept. 6, beginning with a pot-luck supper and general frivolity at 6:40 in Fellowship Hall. Bring whatever dish you enjoy preparing (or purchasing) and we'll have a fine time getting caught up and electing new choir officers. The rehearsal takes place from 7:30 to 9:00 pm. Our first choir Sunday is September 9 (rehearsal at 10:30 am – worship at 11:00 am).

Sine Nomine Choir (grades 6-12 plus college students):

1st rehearsal will be Sunday, Sept. 16 in the Chapel after worship. Generally we'll meet every other Sunday (with occasional exceptions) for 30-40 minutes. We'll elect officers at the first rehearsal (looks good on college apps ⊕) and there will be a candy bribe ⊕.

Descant Choir (grades 1-5): 1st rehearsal will be Sunday, Sept. 9 at 9:30 am in the sanctuary. The choir practices every Sunday until 10:10, and then the children will have a snack and go to their Christian Education classes.

Forest Hill Steel Drum Band (all ages): This group plays for worship several times per year. Up to six people at a time can play and the rotation of players is flexible. Rehearsals are arranged at the convenience of the players and take place around three weeks before the performance.

Eagle Scout Project



The Ministry of Stewardship

Fall 2018 Adult Education Offerings

Kerygma: The fall study of the Gospel of Matthew begins on September 9. There will be three classes (leaders Pat Jenkins and Laury Larson in the Library; Ron Register and Ahren Stock in Bodwell Hall; and Tom Zych and Kathryn Eloff in the Chapel on September 9 and in South Hall thereafter). Pat Seeders will be registering and selling handbooks (\$24.00) in South Hall after worship.

Christianity 101: Dr. Lentz will lead a Christianity 101 class at 9:30 am, in the Jin Rm, beginning September 9. This class is for anyone who wants to "start at the very beginning" in their understanding of Christianity. You may come to one class, every class, or somewhere in between.

A Study of the Book of Revelation, from Ann and Peter Williams: We are interested learning about the Book of Revelation. Would you like to join us? We plan to co-lead a small group study of Revelation this fall, using the Kerygma study guide. We plan to meet every other week for 7 sessions, beginning Monday, September 10. We will set specific meeting times according to the best time for ALL those who plan to attend.

Small Plates: Small Plates is the shorter version of the year-long Faith Leader program. Through a number of small classes, participants get a taste of Faith Leader, especially its central questions of "Where is God in this?" "What are my gifts?" and "How might God be calling me?" Keep your eyes and ears open for announcements of several exciting classes that will be offered this fall under the direction of Adult Education and Spiritual Formation. Classes will include an art experience, Christianity 101, learnings from the Prism program on the Four Levels of Racism, and a meditation retreat in Advent.

PRISM

PRISM is self-described as "a racial equity learning laboratory." For all of us who just completed the last PRISM cohort at the end of April, that one statement holds a lot to unpack! "Racial equity" means that we didn't just talk about creating equal opportunities, or even focusing on how to make spaces more diverse; we talked about how racism exists on four levels: structural, institutional, interpersonal, and internalized, and how each exists and persists in our cultural circles. "Learning laboratory" meant that we had to show up with open hearts and curious minds, being willing to challenge our own assumptions and biases, and respect others' experiences and truth.

As you can probably tell, PRISM isn't easy! It was a 40-hr immersion experience over the course of three months. It was not a neat and tidy experience, but no growth opportunity is. We got to know each other and ourselves on a much deeper level. We experienced our own hurts and each other's hurts. We had moments of tension, of renewal, of growth, of enlightenment, of anger, and of release. Many of us came away with one overriding question: What do we do now?

Forest Hill Church is a progressive, open and affirming community. Our church is going through big, important transformations! We have been providing sanctuary for a family since September 2017. We are in the midst of a Co-Pastor search with an express desire to call an African-American woman. However, as a predominantly white church, we struggle to grow as a racially diverse congregation and to confront the levels of racism embedded in our church's culture.

PRISM is developing goals, strategies and an action plan in line with the mission statement of Forest Hill Church. PRISM is an opportunity to facilitate open and ongoing dialogue on multiple levels, i.e. individual, dyads, triads and groups. The settings can run the gamut from a relaxed date for coffee to an in-home potluck dinner.

Addressing institutional racism at Forest Hill Church recognizes our collective pain created by a collective injustice. This pain of racism affects and harms every single one of us: our relationships, our ability to talk to one another, our ability to work and create together, our ability to live and love together. Race

is a false construct but it is real in its pain. Because it lives inside us, touching every aspect of our lives every day, it can be difficult to recognize. Consider asking yourself: What part am I playing in this? How do I see others in the image of God? More specifically, when I walk into Fellowship Hall or the Sanctuary how has the color of someone's skin impacted the choice of friendships I have or depth of conversation I engage in? What conversations am I afraid of, uncomfortable about, or shy away from when I engage with someone of another race? When a young African American is shot dead, do I feel afraid to talk about it?

Racial Equity: A Step on the Journey

I have had the chance to hear Mark Joseph talk about racial equity and inclusion several times. I'm a #fangirl, I'll admit it. Each time I hear Mark, my path becomes more clear. Not easier, but more clear. In June, my good friends Vicki and Carmella and my daughter Ellie and one of her friends joined us at FHC to hear Mark's talk. That's why I love Forest Hill so much: diverse... inclusive... welcoming. That is US!

Looking around the room that warm June afternoon, I felt some comfort in the path I don't always feel — having friends there, having family there, having our Forest Hill community there, listening, leaning in, asking hard questions, being a living church. It was a powerful time, and I walked away with a new commitment around two pieces toward which Mark pushed us.

First, being vigilant about my **micro-intentional actions** -- my eye-contact, my smiles, my "hellos." Thank you, Mark, for this reminder that every day, I can make this choice and be a more active participant in striving for racial equity.

Second, **leaning into discomfort**. I love to be confident; no doubt, it can come across as bossiness (or worse!), so being uncomfortable is, well, extrauncomfortable for me. But I've been getting myself into some "good trouble, necessary trouble" as John Lewis calls it. Asking harder questions, and letting there be more white space in the air, as I sit in the awkwardness and discomfort: Are we removing barriers? Are our perceptions accurate? Are we doing enough to combat our instincts toward "othering" those who don't have power or privilege? It is not an easy time to strive for racial equity, but Mark's words and tools continue to help me find a path, join hands with others, and keep moving forward.

Greater Cleveland Congregations Criminal Justice Update A Full House in North Collinwood Continues the Momentum!

Recently, at Greater New Canaan Ministries, a packed turnout of GCC member institutions heard County Prosecutor Michael O'Malley and Administrative and Presiding Judge John Russo provide updates on our shared reform agenda.

The Reverend Karell McDaniel, Life Recovery Ministries, and Donna Weinberger, Kol HaLev, GCC Strategy Team, led a discussion determining Mr. O'Malley's and Judge Russo's progress on five reform initiatives. Here are Rev. Mc Daniel and Ms. Weinberger's comments:

Violence Intervention/Gun Docket

Prosecutor O'Malley announced the beginning of a pilot program for the gun diversion program, which works with young adults 18-21 who are vulnerable to falling into more serious criminal activity. Judge Russo added that the Federal government has joined the Court and Prosecutor's Office in a grant application for expansion of the program.

Civil Rights Conviction Integrity Unit

Prosecutor O'Malley announced further staffing for the Conviction Integrity Unit, which reviews convicted offenders' claims of innocence. To date, *four convictions have been overturned*, with another possible exoneration in process.

Drug Court

GCC pushed Judge Russo on his plans for expanding the drug court, which is at least 80% white, and not acceptable to GCC. Judge Russo said that drug courts cost approximately \$325,000 a year to set up and must be certified by the Ohio Supreme Court. Both Judge Russo and Prosecutor O'Malley agreed to write to the County Executive about Drug Court funding as well as go to County Council to push for expansion of the eligibility pool to ensure that the drug court includes a more proportional balance of African American defendants. GCC would join them in these actions.

Second Chance Docket

This program is intended to provide more intense probation supervision for defendants charged with lower-level felony offenses who have a prior unexpungable felony that prevents entry into diversion programs. Prosecutor O'Malley announced that two top officials within the County Prosecutor's office have been designated to work on the Second Chance Docket. Judge Russo also committed to expanding resources by October/November to get the program up and running.

First Appearance Docket

The First Appearance Docket gives prosecutors and defense attorneys time to negotiate charges and avoid grand jury, and admits offenders into diversionary programs as early as possible after arrest. Judge Russo committed to making the First Appearance Docket a reality by the end of the year.

As part of his closing remarks, Rabbi Rob Nosanchuk from the GCC Strategy Team said that while GCC is pleased with the progress being made and the relationship it has deepened with Prosecutor O'Malley and Judge Russo, GCC will continue its push to eliminate racial disparities in Cuyahoga County's criminal justice system.

Forest Hill Church is using a new church membership database called *Breeze*.

Breeze, which we began using about a year and a half ago, replaced our old ChurchMaster database. The pastors, program and administrative staff have been using it for about a year.

- Our financial administrator, Delilah Dervic, uses Breeze to record contributions and pledges and prepare giving statements.
- Our office administrator, Lynda Bernays, uses it to record contact information, relationships, and create mailing lists—for both email and USPS mail. Working with the Deacons, she keeps track of everyone's membership status. She also uses Breeze to record attendance at worship and other events.
- The Pastors use it as a directory, to check information about members, and record concerns.

We hope each Ministry will find a use for Breeze:

- The Stewardship Ministry has been using it for over a year to record pledges.
- Growth and Nominating can use it to follow up with visitors, track member participation and increase ministry involvement.
- Education and Spiritual Growth can record education classes, students, teachers and volunteers and who has received the annual child protection policy training.
- Deacons can manage the CARE groups, track which members have experience and an interest in care-giving, which members need care, and follow up on the care given.

Breeze is a cloud-based program, meaning it can be accessed from any device or computer that is connected to the Internet, with numerous levels of security to protect your data.

Over the next several months, we'll be sharing ways individual members can access Breeze and use it as an online Member Directory.


