"It was a year ago"

Leonor Garcia moved into FHC on September 5. Our press conference was held on September 12



It was a year ago (9/12/18) when I stood on the steps of a Forest Hill Church and said:

We are here today to announce that Forest Hill Church has welcomed Leonor to live here, at the church, in Sanctuary until such time when she is able to return to her home in Akron, her

work, her community and most of all her family.

Leonor's immigration status was in process ... however, she was still going to be deported.

Leonor came to America from Mexico as a young teenager to escape poverty and violence and has lived and worked and raised a family in this country and most recently in the Akron area for over 20 years. Leonor has four children, all of whom are American citizens.

Separating a mother from her children is not what we, as people of faith do; It is not what we, as Americans, should do either.

Rather, giving women shelter is what we do.

Showing hospitality to those in need is what defines us.

Standing with all of God's children everywhere is who we are.

Being the beloved community is what we will be.

In the Bible it is very clear: From Leviticus 19:34

The alien who resides with you shall be to you as a citizen among you; you shall love the alien as yourself, for you were aliens in the land of Egypt: I am the Lord your God.

And in Matthew 25:40, Jesus says:

"Truly I tell you, just as you did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family you did it to me."

Today we stand on this holy ground asking for God's blessing upon Leonor, our community, our nation.

Today is a call to the faith community and all people of good will to be the leaders in bringing just, rational and fair immigration reform in this nation SO that immigrants are welcome, and we don't need to build a wall - and DREAMERS can stay and we will be a nation that lives its creed: celebrating the gifts of African, Latino, Asian and Arab, and European: we will celebrate Jew and Muslim, Christian, Hindu, Sheik, Buddhist, Unitarian, our Native tribes and indigenous people and those of differing faith traditions or no faith tradition at all.

Because we believe that we share a common humanity and all God's children have a place in the choir and a home in the country that we love.

Today, a year later, Leonor is still in captivity.

Today there is still no compassionate immigration reform.

Today the administration still labels all undocumented people "criminal."

Today children are separated from their parents.

Today adults and children languish in detention centers.

Today Immigration and Custom Enforcement (ICE) agents entice and trap workers.

God's judgment is upon us.

We have been humbled and disappointed.

And yet, God's love and joy continue in the midst.

Today we celebrate a year of being blessed by Leonor, a woman of faith, hope, courage and love. We have laughed until we cried and cried until we have laughed. We have eaten amazing food!

Today we know and love Margaret and Eric and Luis Mario and Aden. We have become aware of a thriving Latinex community in NE Ohio. Today we see God's compassion, power and love in the tens of volunteers and hundreds of supporters, and thousands of people of faith and good will who are standing up to injustice and pointing to a better way.

We have become smarter and more active, wise as serpents and innocent as doves.

We can talk to reporters and plan vigils and protests.

We have made new friends across the country.

We have rediscovered the power of being connected denominationally.

Our Spanish has improved!

We still believe, as Dr. King said, that "the arc of the moral universe is long, but it bends toward justice." But we now know that the arc doesn't bend unless WE bend it!

We have deepened our faith and honed our knowledge and been burnished in the fires of adversity and at times we are shiny!

We will never be the same. Thanks be to God who will give us the victory!



Take Me Out to the Ball Game

Deacon's Desk

I wonder how many of our children can sing this song – or how many of our adults can. Take a moment and stop reading, and see if you can get all the way to "One – Two – Three strikes you're OUT, at the old ball game." I love singing this song;



it takes me back to my childhood and the joy of baseball. On Friday, August 26, 1960, lower box 1212 seat 2 only cost \$2.00. It doesn't take much effort to imagine the taste of a "ballpark frank with stadium mustard" either. Yummmm... *Childhood memories are forever*. Today a hot dog cost between \$5 and \$6 (and tickets are a lot more!) but then....everything must change.

As an avid Cleveland Indians fan, I grew up loving "Chief Wahoo." I wish I had a dollar for every cap, tee-shirt, pennant, and miscellaneous object I owned with his broad happy smile. I never realized that Chief Wahoo would be to the Native Americans what Black Sambo is to African Americans. When this awareness became a reality, my naive acceptance for the logo began to erode. Erosion is a slow process; change of heart and mind often comes slowly as well.

In early September when the Indians played the Toronto Blue Jays, Chief Wahoo was absent from all team uniforms and caps. MLB had said the decision to scrap the logo came from the league's commitment to "building a culture of diversity and inclusion throughout the game."

Chief Wahoo returned to the Indians' uniforms the following week at Tampa Bay and will remain for the rest of the 2018 season. The logo was only removed in response to Toronto's request and out of respect. However, the Indians and MLB announced plans last January to remove the logo from their uniforms completely beginning in 2019.

Major League Baseball's mission of "building a culture of diversity and inclusion throughout" compares to the mission statement of Forest Hill Church. The operative word here is "building."

Change does not usually come overnight. It is a process and it is painful sometimes, but necessary for growth.

Recently, the Deacons, under the direction of Pastor Lentz, had to make a decision that we knew would disappoint many. We had to scrap the "Rocket Car" scheduled for our annual Fall Fellowship celebration because we learned that the music that plays during the ride includes the song "Dixie," and would most likely be offensive to some folks, regardless of the color of their skin. This familiar tune, which most of us (including African Americans) grew up with, took on a different light when the lyrics were studied. (*Google: lyrics to Dixie*). This song today has become the anthem for institutions that long for the "Old times that are not forgotten...in the land of cotton." However, at FHC we attempt to denounce representations that are contrary to our mission of building a culture of diversity and inclusion. After all, "We are doing a new thing."

We knew this decision would disappoint some, especially our beautiful FHC children – those we have committed to cherish, love, and teach. The decision to cancel the "Rocket Car" became a no- brainer when the question "What shall we teach our children?" was considered alongside the idea of "building a culture of diversity and inclusion throughout." Once again, "We are doing a new thing" here at FHC.

My time at Forest Hill has been interesting, enriching, and gratifying. Every week (and there are over 1000 of them) I have been challenged, surprised, satisfied, thankful, and yes, even a bit frustrated by my work as your office administrator. By the time I leave at the end of December I will have worked here just over 21 years. My husband and I were married here, my children always felt comfortable here, and I have always been grateful for the opportunity to be part of the Forest Hill Church family.

Why I think racial inclusion at FHC is worth my effort...

Jesus ate with the fishermen, healed the outcast, lifted up the lowly widow, children and downtrodden. He said that those who are first will be last, and the last shall be first. He invited them to the feast but the powerful refused to come, so he kept them out and the poor and crippled came in.

My faith tells me to go outside of my comfort zone to include all God's people. Through the efforts of our Racial Inclusion Committee, I have come to new levels of understanding of the level of outcast and oppression by the powerful that my sisters and brothers of color face.

At the first dinner exploration, years ago, I found I could identify with the pain of exclusion felt by the African American members of the group. After reading More Than Equals: Racial Healing for the Sake of the Gospel (by Chris Rice and Spencer Perkins), I learned of the subtle ways good-hearted white leaders in a mixed race church unconsciously overpowered and silenced their black peers. Through visits to the African American history museums of Detroit and the Smithsonian, and presentations at church, I became overwhelmed with the vicious and intentional persecution and exploitation of African Americans. As a member of the first PRISM cohort, the depth of internalized racism that I, unknowingly, hold, shocked me out of thinking it was enough for me to be a good, compassionate white person who tried to be welcoming to everyone. We discovered the systemic racism in the country's laws and institutions that keep all members of our society from achieving the constitutionally sanctioned right to liberty, justice and the pursuit of happiness. Waking Up White: And Finding Myself in the Story of Race (by Debby Irving) was another book that opened my eyes to the hidden ways I, and people who look like me, have more opportunities and implicit rights and privileges than my friends of color.

So, why is FHC the place to do this? In our very midst, a dear son of the congregation, soliciting money for his suburban football team, was intimidated by a police officer who drew his gun. Why did this happen? Because a neighbor child saw a black youth and thought he was trying to break into houses with a gun – and the police officer believed the racist report.

Not soon after this, Trayvon Martin was shot and killed in Florida by a man who made the same assumption. This experience was so close to home that Forest Hill Church opened the dialogue to how we see and relate to our members of color. This exploration allows us to bring Christ's teachings to all our members, our community and to be an example to the world that true shared leadership and feasting at the banquet of communion and fellowship enriches our lives and brings us closer to the Kingdom of God on earth.

I don't want to miss out on the feast that God has laid out for all of us. I want to step into the banquet with all my brothers and sisters in God. I am willing to get out of my comfort zone, make mistakes that are lovingly addressed, and open myself to a fuller experience of life through the eyes of friends of color. I am certain Jesus asks this of us when He said "follow me." I hope you will join me in trying our best to live into this invitation/commandment.


