Deacon's Desk Christ-Like Attention Reaching everyone with Empathy

As I near the end of my 3 year term as Deacon of the **Jordan CARE Group** and reflect back over the years, my jaws ache because I cannot stop smiling from ear to ear. The experience has been the single most greatest spiritual experience thus far at FHC. I have been asked by my fellow Deacons to share a little of my experience. Keep in mind, your experience may not mirror mine.

The relationships that I developed as a Deacon working with the other Deacons and sharing ideas directed for creating relationships within each of the CARE Groups assigned to them was exhilarating and will be forever cherished.

If there is one thing I could wish for anyone reading this who might be considering this unique ministry it would be that you do not hesitate. 

Some Earth Care Good News

We've all felt the sting of anti-global warming sentiment, and the disdain for many government administrative decisions that go against protection of the environment. Fortunately, many NGO's have taken up the battle, especially in the courts, and have stifled much execution of these anti-env

courts, and have stifled much execution of these anti-environmental policies. (A non-governmental organization, **NGO**, is any non-profit, voluntary citizens' group organized on a local, national or international level). Here is some additional good news to report:

God's creatures in the animal world now have an even greater champion in the World Wildlife Fund (WWF). In March of this year, the Director of Trafficking at WWF took the initiative and with Google hosted an event with the world's largest e-commerce, social media, and technology companies to make a game-changing announcement: Twenty-one companies with operations in Africa, Asia, Europe, and North America have joined together to launch the Global Coalition to End Wildlife Trafficking Online. In addition to poaching, online offerings and sales of animals, birds, and parts endangered and otherwise---have become rampant. A staff of specialists and volunteers has been established to scour the Internet and find offers of illegal wildlife trafficked items such as endangered species, body parts, skins, claws, fur, meat, medicine, skulls, and beaks. Such listings will be removed from the internet sites, when identified, and local wildlife authorities will be alerted to the greatest extent possible to track down the sources. In many instances, trafficking in wildlife funds other criminal activities.

In the US, firms such as Google, E-bay, Etsy, Facebook, and Microsoft, plus Chinese e-commerce giants such as Alibaba, Baidu, and Tencent are among the organizations participating in this program. The goal is to reduce on-line trafficking by 80% by 2020.

May God bless this endeavor to become a reality in caring for God's creatures who can't speak for themselves.

Book Study in November

The Black History Education Team will offer a four-week book study of Kelly Brown Douglas' 2015 book **Stand Your Ground: Black Bodies and the Justice of God**.

From Amazon.com's webpage for the book:

In this timely and compelling book, Kelly Brown Douglas examines the myths and narratives underlying a "stand-your-ground" culture, taking seriously the social as well as the theological questions raised by events from Ferguson, Missouri to Staten Island, New York.

But the author also brings another significant interpretative lens to this text: that of a mother. She writes:

"There has been no story in the news that has troubled me more than that of Trayvon Martin's slaying. President Obama said that if he had a son his son would look like Trayvon. I do have a son and he does look like Trayvon."

Rev. Dr. Kelly Brown Douglas is Canon Theologian at the Washington National Cathedral and Director of the Religion Program at Goucher College, Baltimore, MD.

A native of Dayton, OH, Dr. Douglas was ordained in 1985 at Saint Margaret's Episcopal Church – the first black woman to be ordained an Episcopal priest in the Southern Ohio Diocese, and one of only five nationwide at the time. *Essence* magazine counts her "among this country's most distinguished religious thinkers, teachers, ministers, and counselors."
