What Ever Happened to the Donkey from Palm Sunday?

By the time that you read this message we will have already transitioned from Lent into the Easter Season. I share with you this story of unknown origin that speaks to all of God's Children:

The donkey awakened, his mind still savoring the afterglow of the most exciting day of his life. Never before had he felt such a rush of pleasure and pride. He walked into town and found a group of people by the well. I'll show myself to them," he thought. But they didn't notice him. They went on drawing their water and paid him no mind.

"Throw your garments down," he said crossly. "Don't you know who I am?"

They just looked at him in amazement. Someone slapped him across the tail and ordered him to move.

"Miserable heathens!" he muttered to himself. "I'll just go to the market where the good people are. They will remember me."

But the same thing happened. No one paid any attention to the donkey as he strutted down the main street in front of the marketplace. "The palm branches! Where are the palm branches!" he shouted. "Yesterday, you threw palm branches!" Hurt and confused, the donkey returned home to his mother.

"Foolish child," she said gently. "Don't you realize that without him, you are just an ordinary donkey?"

The little donkey in the story reminds us that we too have been called as "Christ bearers." We are *Christophers* and *Christopheras*, the masculine and feminine forms of *Christo*, meaning "Christ", and *pherein*, meaning "to bear" or "to carry." As the donkey quickly discovered, the joy and fulfillment she sought resided in her relationship to the Christ. As long as she carried the Christ, she shared in Christ's glory. And apart from Christ, her life lacked fullness and meaning.

The lessons we learn from the donkey of Palm Sunday have the potential to carry us through Holy Week, Good Friday, Easter Sunday and beyond. We, like the donkey, have been reserved for willing and faithful service to Jesus Christ. Like the donkey, we carry Jesus openly, in light and truth. Like the donkey, we go where Jesus directs. Like the donkey, we bear the Christ in the spirit of peace. And, like the donkey, we learn that the glory and praise belong to the Christ, and not us—we bask in the glow.

And now, may the power of Christ's resurrection be made manifest in you.

"Following the risen Christ, and seeking to make the Church a true community of hospitality, the mission of More Light Presbyterians is to work for the full participation of lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, queer, intersex, and asexual (LGBTQIA+) people in the life, ministry and witness of the Presbyterian Church (USA) and in society." - Mission Statement of More Light Presbyterians

On March 24, the Youth Ed class unanimously voted to ask Session to affirm the mission statement of More Light Presbyterians and officially become a More Light Member Church.

After several weeks of studying and discussing the issue, when asked whether or not FHC should become More Light, they responded with a question of their own: "Why wouldn't we?"

What has followed has been only positive. Most of the responses I have received from the congregation since announcing that we were moving forward with this process have been: "Aren't we More Light already?"

FHC is publicly "open and affirming", we are on several websites devoted to helping LGBT+ individuals find a welcoming church home. But we are not officially More Light, and thus not on their list of More Light congregations (which some PCUSA members and friends check when looking for a new church home).

The youth and the youth team do not envision this as the fulfillment of being an open and affirming congregation, but rather another step toward full inclusion. They have expressed the desire for this process to lead to more tangible steps for us to live into being a "progressive, open and affirming community that is: welcoming, learning, worshipping, witnessing, and discerning."

The youth will lead a "More Light Teach-In" on Sunday, May 19 from 9:30-10:30 am. We invite anyone who interested, concerned, confused,

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celebrating, or simply available to join us in a discussion about how God is leading our congregation in the mission of More Light.

In that Teach-In the youth hope to inform, discuss, brainstorm, and form an intergenerational task force.

Following the teach-in, we are asking Session to officially vote to become a More Light Church at their May 22 meeting.

I am very proud of the ownership the youth are taking in this process, and in their church.

Your GCC Cleveland Heights Housing Team Seeks Your Support

Please Join Us Saturday, June 8 1:00 To 4:00 Noble Road Presbyterian Church "Walk The Noble Neighborhood"

We plan to "Walk the Noble Neighborhood" on Sat. June 8 for the purpose of identifying properties that are significantly deteriorated and to try to determine if they are vacant or occupied. The housing team will then research the ownership and status of each, and ask the city to do a "complaint inspection" on the worst properties, especially those that are vacant, tax delinquent or investor owned. The purpose of the walk is to quickly move forward problem properties to renovation or sale to a family who will live there. Such a result will counter the trend to investor owned rentals, thus strengthening this neighborhood of affordable homes; homes hard hit by racist predatory loans that culminated in the 2007 housing crisis. Renovation of the worst properties is key to restoring property values that remain below market despite recovery in other areas of Cleveland Heights. We cannot accomplish this alone! There is a lot of territory to cover and additional volunteers are essential if our walk

is to accomplish its purpose. Therefore, we are reaching out to you as a member of FHC and to other congregations represented by our team (Shiloh Baptist, Fairmount Presbyterian, St. Paul's Episcopal and Trinity Cathedral, plus non GCC members, Covenant and Noble Road Presbyterian). We hope to have a minimum of 20 from FHC. We will provide a brief training as to the specifics in identifying problem properties, both vacant and occupied before we head out to walk. Walkers will be paired in teams and should be able to complete the walk in an hour and a half.

SOOOO If you enjoy walking, want to easily get in your daily steps, and agree with the purpose of our walk please volunteer to help on Saturday, June 8 at 1:00 pm. We look forward to hearing from you!

Ministry of Justice and Mission

Funding opportunities from the Ministry of Justice and Mission

It's grant season! The birds are returning and daffodils sprouting. J&M community grants and endowment fund requisition time is here as well. See this important information below.

Endowment Fund:

Each year, Session earmarks at least 25% of the Endowment Fund to Justice and Mission related efforts. This amounts to over \$15,000 this year. J&M Ministry will determine which requests and the amount to present to Session who makes the final recommendation for funding to the Endowment Committee.

Endowment Funds may be allocated for initial or seed funding for activities and programs that meet the mission of FHC. It is not to be the primary source of funds for on-going programs or projects, but can be used to build capacity in existing efforts or for "unique opportunities". Previous recipients include: Camp Lilac, PRISM training, a printer for GCC.

Groups or individuals may contact J&M Elders to discuss the project. Applications are available. Please email <u>JM@fhcpresb.org</u> to receive more information.

Community Grants:

These are open to ministries and groups within the church, as well as organizations outside of the FHC. The purpose of Community Grants is to support equity, justice or charitable work in our congregation, the community, and internationally. The grant can provide operating funds for ongoing programs or seed funds for new initiatives. Priority will be given to groups that have a connection to our congregation, that do not have many other sources of funding, that meet local needs and provide community/self-development. Non-profit organizations can apply, but the Community Grant application has been revised to be more accessible for individuals or small groups. Previous recipients include: HOLA, Abundance Pantry, Cleveland Co-Op (economic development).

Applications are available now **through May 6**th. J&M has a total of \$29,474 to distribute over the year.

Small Requests: Throughout the year, groups or individuals can request support for specific peace, justice and mission related events or opportunities. Examples include: lunch for a GCC event after church; supporting a fundraiser for the Ron Register Scholarship Fund.

To-date, generous church and community members have contributed an additional \$20,000, an amount that will enable granting of up to two \$2500 scholarships each year over the next 5 years to deserving students of our CH-UH Public Schools, thus helping to make their dream of a college education a reality. All monies are held by the Church and all disbursements are made by the Church.

The selection Committee is currently hard at work reviewing applications to determine which of our applicant's best exemplify Ron's incredible commitment to justice, equity and excellence in education in our CH-UH Public Schools.

April 18: Maundy Thursday Dinner at 6:30 pm and Service at 7:30 pm



"Tenebrae" is Latin for "darkness" or "shadows." During the service we experience a symbolic portion of Christ's pain and suffering the day of his crucifixion. One of the most conspicuous features of the service is the gradual extinguishing of candles until only a single candle, considered a symbol of our Lord, remains. As it gets darker and darker we reflect on the great emotional and physical

pain that was very real for Jesus that evening. Toward the end of the service, the Christ candle is hidden, typifying the apparent victory of the forces of evil over good. The hidden candle is then restored to its place on Easter morning. By dim light we all depart this service in silence.

April 19: Community Good Friday Service from 12 – 3 pm at St. Paul's Episcopal Church, 2747 Fairmount (at Coventry), Cleveland Heights. Pastor Lentz will be the officiant for the first hour and Pastor Goines is expected to preach around 1:30 pm. Individual anthems by Antonio Lotti, Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart, George Oldroyd, Daniel Pinkham, Franz Liszt, and others.

April 20: Holy Saturday- 7:30 pm Easter Vigil

The Great Vigil of Easter can be traced to early Christianity. It proclaims the universal significance of God's saving acts in history through four related parts consisting of the services of Light, Readings, Baptism and the first Eucharist of Easter. At Forest Hill Church we observe a variation of this ancient service. We begin outside around a fire, lighting the Christ Candle that had been extinguished on Maundy Thursday. We process into the darkened sanctuary to read a series of lessons reminding us of the promise of God's salvation to all people. We remember our baptism. This year we will celebrate the baptism of two coming to Christ. In the early church baptisms often took place at the Easter Vigil. Our Easter Vigil begins outside the main entrance of the Sanctuary and lasts about an hour.

April 21: Resurrection of the Lord- 9:00 am service in the Chapel and 11:00 am service in the Sanctuary. The Eucharist (Thanksgiving) or The Lord's Supper will be celebrated at both services.
