# Ron Register Inaugural Scholarship Recipients Honored

The Black Caucus and the Ron Register Scholarship Committee wishes to extend heartfelt thanks to all who turned the concept of a Ron Register Scholarship Fund into a scholarship reality!

On May 26, we recognized the inaugural recipients of the Ron register Scholarship Award, Trevion Johnson and Treasure Eiland. Both were awarded \$2,500.

The committee's criteria for receiving a Ron Register Scholarship were: intelligence and academic achievement; an awareness of social/political

issues; a commitment to working toward building a fairer and more equitable society and world; and financial need.

The committee could not have been more pleased with the applications we received. All were fine and deserving students. However, Trevion and Treasure stood apart.

Treasure Eiland is the first in her family to attend college. In the fall she will attend Fisk University, a HBCU. Treasure graduated with a 3.8 GPA. Treasure was the 2019 student Vice President; three years captain of the volleyball team. Treasure also volunteers at her church and other organizations. She intends to major in biology/pre-med.

Trevion Johnson has overcome much in his young life. He was raised by his grandparents but since his junior year has been living on his own. This independence required him to work two and, at times, three part time jobs. Trevion's indomitable spirit propelled him forward and despite life's obstacles he excelled academically (3.1GPA) and athletically. Trevion was named to the second team all Greater Cleveland soccer team! This fall Trevion will attend Loyola University in Chicago, where he intends to major in business management.

Both Trevion and Treasure were enrolled in the early college program at John Carroll University. We are proud and grateful that we were able to extend a hand in uplifting these two precious lives.

The Scholarship Committee still has much to do. There are many academically deserving but financially challenged students like Trevion and Treasure who could use a helping hand on their way to becoming productive American citizens.
