

Words from Pastor John



This is a reprint of my "Charge" to the Rev. Dr. Veronica R. Goines at the celebration of her Installation on Sunday, May 5, 2019. John

"Neither is new wine put into old wineskins; if it is, the skins burst, and the wine is spilled, and the skins are destroyed; but new wine is put into fresh wineskins, and so both are preserved."

(Matthew 9:17)

Jesus had gathered his disciples and was talking to them about the fasting of the Pharisees. Jesus had nothing against the Pharisees really; they shared the love of God, the desire to make God's kingdom real in the life of the people. Jesus' interpretation of the law was more expansive then the Pharisees but at least they were talking about the same tradition, the same scripture, the same God.

Jesus wasn't trashing the old, disrespecting the status quo, or throwing verbal "shade" at the tradition. He was simply stating the obvious: you don't put new wine into old skins If you are going in a new direction, don't go backwards! Claiming to do a "new thing" but being more concerned about keeping everything the same just doesn't work.

And no mistake... Jesus was bringing a new perspective to the religious arena: God's kingdom was not in the by and by, oh no – it was close and near, EVERYBODY was in, if you 'repented' *metanoew* – not "I'm sorry" but "get a new mind for a new age," which is what *metanoew* really means.

The prophet Isaiah had a new mind for a new age: "Do not remember the former things, or consider the things of old. I am about to do a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it?"

And today IS A NEW DAY. Reverend Dr. Veronica R. Goines, Co-Pastor Veronica, my new sister... God is doing a new thing at Forest Hill. New wine is being poured.

And so, on this day I charge you.... (But in charging you I charge myself – for we are in this together...)

Let's get this party started! It is going to be tempting sometimes to keep oiling the old skins – doing it the way we have always done... same liturgies, same songs, same committees....

Forest Hill Church is quite the old and wonderful wine skin... it has a long history of social engagement and faithful action. But God is doing a new thing.

God is bringing new wine for us to age in a new wineskin. No resting on laurels. God did not call you, Veronica, to come all the way from the Bay Area to the North Coast if you were only to be a new beautiful bauble, a jewel acquisition to place upon the old diadem of FHC. God didn't call you or call us to check off a box of "hiring" a black woman Co-pastor.

I don't believe either one of us responded to the call of God for that. God called you to bring the fresh new wine from the west coast, just south of Napa Valley, to the north coast vineyards and together we are going to get some fresh wine skins made and let God do what God does: "pour out his spirit on all flesh!" God called you and me to respond to God's new thing here at Forest Hill.

St. Francis got the call to re-build the church... you and I are called to repair the church, to repair the breach gaping in our world: A woman and a man, sharing leadership – as Co-Pastors. (To some doesn't feel right.) But God is doing a new thing.

Two very experienced pastoral leaders giving up power and control; (doesn't somebody HAVE to be in charge?) But God is doing a new thing. Two gifted people who take seriously the call of God. So seriously that we are willing to risk it all for the kingdom. So seriously that you move from your home and family; risking it all to follow the call. I risk 25 years of a successful ministry to follow the call. Can you not perceive it? It is springing forth. God is doing a new thing!

We don't know if this is going to work. There may be times when we wonder: "what have we done?"

Nevertheless, you and I have to fight the urge to keep things calm, and not shake things up, we can't play it safe, or seek to stay comfortable. We have cast ourselves into the rushing current of God's driving spirit and so we better learn how to paddle! You and I have to have each other's backs so completely that nothing will come between us. You and I can disagree in private and hold each other accountable. But once we walk out the door....watch out!

So, the charge is to be SO deep in prayer - to be tapped into the tap root of spiritual power – it is going to be THE most important thing. The charge is to hold things loosely and trust that "nothing is good or bad until God gets through with it!" I charge you and myself to be as honest as possible, to wrestle with God's call, and struggle with whatever spiritual warfare we have to struggle with. AND we may come up limping like Jacob after he wrestled

with the angel. We may get new names: Like Brangelina – Ver-on-ijohn or Johnica!

We have to trust God that we are not called to failure but to the Kingdom! I charge you, and myself to love these people – Forest Hill took a risk too. We all want to taste this new wine: structured, subtle, bold, aromatic, and full bodied. I charge us to have fun and don't take anything too seriously.

What a privilege it is to share ministry with you, to learn from you, and I hope you can learn from me a little bit and think it is a privilege to share ministry with me too.

Veronica, if we even get semi close to what God is calling us to do...OH MY is God going to be praised and the Kingdom of God glorified, and Christ the crucified and risen honored and followed. And we might just catch a glimpse of all God's children coming together around the table of the kingdom feast drinking new wine for a new day, having new minds for a new age.

God bless you, and all of us! New wine, new wine skins... God is doing a new thing...do you not perceive it? AMEN

Happy Anniversary, Pastor John!

Twenty nineteen is a very special year in the ministerial life of Rev. Dr. John Lentz. This year marks the 30th anniversary of his ordination and 25th anniversary of being a pastor at Forest Hill Church.

John was ordained at the First Presbyterian Church in Winchester, Virginia in the spring of 1989 where he served as the Associate Pastor for five years. One Sunday afternoon, while sitting at the dining room table in their home in Winchester, Deanne found an ad for a pastor position at Forest Hill Church in "Outlook" magazine. FHC was a church described as socially active, called to racial reconciliation, as well as to the "inward journey" of spiritual growth. Both he and Deanne "KNEW" that they had found their next home.

To celebrate his milestone anniversaries, Barb Hansen and Jeff Smith recently interviewed John over lunch. They wanted to ask questions that might not always be asked for everyone to get to know him even more intimately.

Before answering the questions John reflected on his 25 years. "Who would have thought that 25 years after seeing that ad, Deanne and I would still be at FHC! Thanks be to God! I remember the first time Rev. Dr. Ned Edwards, the Senior Pastor from 1970 until I was called, came back to preach – probably in my second or third year. I was so scared that everybody would be so glad to see him that all would see that they had called the wrong guy! It was Linn Obery who told me to 'grow up' and live into my call. Ned preached a great sermon and has been a friend and supporter ever since! The FHC legacy grows on."

John then reminisced on how close he has felt to everyone in the congregation over the years. He talked about how much he values his relationship with Anne Wilson. He feels so honored to have worked with many amazing colleagues, including: Beth Harrington-Hodge, David Ensign, Clover Beal, Lois Annich, and the administrative staff. But while it is great to remember, celebrate, and learn from the past, John makes it clear that he is focused on the present and living for the future of our beloved church. With the call of Rev. Goines, John has renewed energy and commitment to follow

where God is leading us into the future! He has never been more excited about his call to ministry.

What are your top highlights at FHC over the past 25 years?

Pilgrimage trips, becoming a Sanctuary church, softball championships, Haiti trips, Youth Group trip to Native American reservation in South Dakota that Deanne and I chaperoned, calling a Co-Pastor.

What are some of the things you are most proud of?

My marriage to Deanne, and my children: Jack, Meg, and Sarah. That the FHC community is always willing to take a risk and staying open to God's "new thing!"

When did you decide you wanted to be a minister?

Church was always important to me even as a youth. I belonged to an activist church. The people I most admired were people of faith. I love people. Love big ideas. Driving back to Kenyon College after a Christmas break someone in the car asked me: "John, what are you going to do after graduation?" I immediately responded: "I want to go to Seminary." I had NOT been thinking of that. So I will claim that God was taking me by the nape of the neck and pushing me in the direction God wanted me to go. I am glad because I have no idea what I would do if I were not a minister! I guess that is what they mean by a "calling!"

What are your favorite foods and drinks?

Pizza, hamburgers, swordfish, salmon, steak, baked potatoes, Reuben sandwiches, lemonade and a cold beer.

What happy memories will you cherish forever?

Falling in love with Deanne, the births of our children, and the first time I was standing in the narthex of Forest Hill Church looking through the windows into the Sanctuary. I so wanted to be called to this church.

Who inspired you the most while growing up?

When I was growing up, Dr. Jack McClendon, Associate Pastor, New York Avenue Presbyterian Church. He was the first person to really take my

spiritual quest seriously and then the Rev. Dr. Herb Meza whose preaching and praying let me know that those were art forms!

If you could have lunch with one person, alive or dead, who would it be and why?

Paul of Tarsus. I think he was a genius. I'd like to find out what he was really like.

What were some of the best trips of your life?

Sabbatical trip with family (England, Scotland, Amsterdam, Paris); family trip to national parks; the church pilgrimage to Rome.

Where in the world do you still want to go?

I want to hike to the top of Machu Picchu and walk the "Camino de Santiago."

Tell us something that most people don't know about you.

I feel like "what you see is what you get." I love people but I am an introvert. I drive Deanne crazy sometimes about how anti-social I can be.

What was your best bad decision? (Or perhaps worst good decision!)

Setting a percentage amount required of our congregational vote for calling a Co-Pastor. The Session debated whether to choose 66% or 75%. I am the one who said: "75%." I think the vote was 73%! Oh my!

If you were having a dinner party and you could invite one performer, one politician, one famous couple, and one family member, who would you invite?

Beyoncé, Robert F. Kennedy, Barack and Michelle Obama, and Deanne, (maybe LeBron and Bruce Springsteen!).

What does your perfect day look like?

Up early, coffee, reading three newspapers; take Leo for walk; come to church, three hours of writing, get everything else I want to accomplish done; go for a swim; no night meetings; sit on the deck sipping a cold beverage as the sun sets!

What makes you angry?

Harmful, closed-minded, judgmental ignorance. Folks who have no sense of humor!

What are your favorite things about being a minister?

People, weddings, funerals, Sunday mornings, kids, hospital visits, being invited into the important moments in people's lives and preaching!

Books: Jayber Crow by Wendell Berry. Other favorite authors include: Doris

Godwin, Cormack McCarthy, Daniel Silva, and James Baldwin.

Movies: Godfather I, and, I admit, the Harry Potter series!

Describe yourself in 5 words.

Routine, friendly, optimistic, healthy, well balanced.

What's on your bucket list?

Travel to Machu Picchu, paint, write a book, be the lead guitar at a concert.

What's your idea of heaven?

Being with people I love, good food and drink, feeling contentment after a long summer's day, the CAV's championship came pretty close!

What is the best piece of advice you ever received? Who from?

I was at a low point while writing my PhD. dissertation. I was almost ready to quit. My brother Peter, who was dying of cancer at the time, said; "John, even if it sucks, keep writing." I did!

What are your professional and personal goals for the next five years?

These are tied to the success of FHC. I am so excited to be a Co-Pastor with Rev. Goines. God is doing a "new thing!" and I can't wait to see how our shared leadership and the ministry of the church goes! Ultimately, when I retire I want to look back and know that I was faithful!

What part of the day are you most energetic? Least energetic?

I am most energetic in the morning and least energetic at nighttime meetings.

What is your favorite candy? Favorite dessert? Favorite song?

Practice, Proactivity, Prayer

Global warming is real. The average worldwide annual temperature rise above historical average is nearing 1.5 degrees Celsius. Scientists predict this rise could go to 2-3-even 4 degrees Celsius by 2100---with dire consequences for the planet and all living things. Global warming is caused by the CO2 greenhouse blanketing effect, now above 400 ppm in the atmosphere.

There is a strong scientific correlation of the greenhouse effect and climate change. Droughts, floods, iceberg and glacier meltdowns, wildfires are on the rise. Climate refugees and conflicts are also increasing. Threatened extinctions of millions of plant and animal species are possible. What are we to do? Fortunately, many of us are indeed doing 'new things' for the environment: refusing, re-using, recycling; planting flowers for pollinators—which are absolutely necessary for our fruits and vegetable generation; minimizing water usage; eliminating plastic bag and bottle usage as much as possible; driving economically, combining trips; etc. Such **PRACTICES** are great, but our own personal actions are not enough.

We must work toward developing a critical mass in order to engage our governments worldwide. Only *political will* and *policy* will enable our society to right the wrongs our man-made degradation of the environment has caused in all aspects, and take actions to arrest the increase of CO2

emissions which is the root cause of global warming and all its ills. Thus we must become **PRO-ACTIVE** in partnering with our elected representatives and also with reputable non-governmental organizations which are championing environmental action.

Finally, do not forget **PRAYERS!** God didn't put us in this mess with his/her Creation, but God can surely help us out of it in many, many mysterious ways, affecting not only nature but the minds of men and women such that positive changes on both small and large scales can evolve.

It's to help insure all of our church leaders are on the same page and make sure the left hand knows what the right hand is doing.

GCC Update

We are reaching out to ask for your help on Saturday, June 8 from 1 to 4. As you may have seen in the Tower the GCC housing team is sponsoring a neighborhood walk in the Noble area for the purpose of identifying properties that are seriously deteriorated and to try to determine if they are vacant or occupied. We are hoping to have 20 volunteers from FHC (but we're happy to take more!) to assist us along with teams from other GCC congregations. This walk is our final team push to bring properties to the attention of the city housing department so that they can be rehabbed and/or sold, hopefully to an owner occupant.

Volunteers will meet at 2780 Noble (Noble Road Presbyterian Church) at 1:00. At that time you will have a brief training regarding the specifics of how to identify properties, a review of the purpose of the walk and materials. You will then be paired with a walking partner and assigned streets. We will meet back at the church when you have finished. We will provide water and pray for a nice weather afternoon.

There is a lot of territory to cover and we have worked hard to study maps and plan user friendly routes! We anticipate the walk to take an hour or hour and a half at the most. If you enjoy walking and if you support sustainability in neighborhoods such as Noble, an area still struggling to recover from the housing crisis of 07, then please do contact us to join us on Sat. Breakfast at the Birmingham hotel and travel by bus to Selma to the Selma Interpretive Center – This center serves as a welcome center for the Selma to Montgomery National Historic Trail and is located at the foot of the Edmund Pettus Bridge. We'll travel the Trail to Montgomery and visit the National Memorial for Peace and Justice and the national lynching memorial. Return to Selma hotel to share insights on the day.

Saturday, October 19

Breakfast included at the Selman hotel and visit the Civil Rights Memorial and then to the Dexter Avenue King Memorial Baptist Church – in this National

Historic Landmark, see the modest pulpit where Rev. Martin Luther King, Jr.
first preached his message of hope and brotherhood. We'll visit Martin Luther
King Jr's Parsonage home. Return to Selma hotel to share insights on the
day.

Sunday, October 20
Breakfast included at the Selma hotel and travel back to Birmingham to the Church at the Sixteenth Street Baptist Church and drive by Birmingham Jail – where Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. was imprisoned as a participant in
nonviolent demonstrations against segregation. Leave for the airport.

Do You Have Furniture that Needs a New Home?

Many of you remember Forest Hill Church's years of hosting families during our relationship with Family Promise (formerly the Interfaith Hospitality Network), an agency that provides emergency and transitional housing, as well as counseling and support services, to homeless families. You may also remember that several years ago Family Promise was able to begin housing their clients in a single building that has since been renovated to accommodate up to 23 families at a time.

One of the support services Family Promise provides is to help furnish apartments once families are ready to move into permanent housing. They often need furniture, kitchen supplies, and linens. They can take furniture only when they are preparing an apartment for a family; they have limited storage for other things. If you are in the midst of or anticipating a move, here is what you need to know about making donations to Family Promise:

- **Thea Mozingo**, Volunteer Engagement & Supportive Resources Coordinator, is the contact person for all donations (216-751-3010 or tmozingo@familypromisecle.org)
- **Furniture**: They are especially interested in beds and dressers, small kitchen tables and chairs, and small couches. When you contact Thea, she will tell you if they have a move-in scheduled soon, and will collect information from you about the furniture you are offering. If Family Promise is unable to use it, she will recommend other places to contact. If Family Promise can use the furniture, they will pick it up from your house.
- **Kitchen supplies**: Family Promise will accept dishes (sturdy! These are families with children) and cooking supplies (utensils, pots and pans). Call Thea before you deliver anything.
- **Linens**: Twin and double sheets and blankets, as well as pillow cases, are welcome. Again, call before you deliver.
- **Clothing**: Seasonal children's clothing is always welcome, but again, call before you deliver.

Volunteer opportunities are also available at Family Promise – again, contact Thea Mozingo if you are interested. For more information about Family

Have you ever wondered how people know when to stand to sing hymns? There's a trick to it! To prepare us all to sing, Anne Wilson plays the refrain for us. When she's two measures from the end of the hymn, that's when everyone stands up! If you read music even just a little bit, you can follow along as she's playing and know exactly when to stand up. (If you don't read music at all, you can keep doing what you've been doing--wait for the people in front of you to stand!)
