WORDS FROM PASTOR VERONICA

My father, Willie Goines, Jr., set an example that has undergirded me throughout my life. With an eighth grade education, at the age of 15, my father enlisted. Throughout his 22 year career in the Navy, followed by 21 years with the



California State Police, daddy tenaciously pursued his education. He earned a G.E.D., two Associate of Arts degrees, and a Bachelor of Science degree by the age of 47—all while supporting a wife and five daughters. At the age of 60, my dad became a pilot, and into his early 80's served in the Civil Air Patrol, searching for downed planes and missing persons.

In my childhood, when extended family and friends gathered for meals, my mother would say "Bring me the ironing board." She would then lay the ironing board across two dining chairs to *make room* at the table. I later discovered that my mother was a *womanist* theologian whose life and preaching embodied a hermeneutic/interpretive lens of inclusion, which has shaped my consciousness, and that of countless others.

Indelibly imprinted by my parents, the Reverend Evia M. Goines (1930-1996) and Willie Goines, Jr., now age 91, I've embraced life-long learning and an inclusive interpretive lens which inclines me to the objectives of the beloved community.

To manifest the beloved community means to conspire, to breathe with God. The Rev. Dr. Renita Weems reflects in her book *Listening for God:*

"Courting an inner life means running the risk of being changed."

Such change opens us to a greater vision and an understanding that transform us—individually, collectively, and beyond. Not only is God continuing to do a new thing, God is drawing others in to bask with us in the glow of God's countenance, and to serve alongside us. Let us seek the Holy Spirit's leading as we consider how we may be more intentionally celebrate the gifts of our intergenerational community.

On another note, thank you for your thoughts and prayers as I returned to the Bay Area to meet my new granddaughter. Upon arriving at my daughter and son in law's home in Vallejo, I rang the doorbell. When Amber opened the door, there was my sweet Axe(I) doing his own choreographed dance, and chanting, "G-mommy, G-mommy," again and again. His welcome and enthusiasm warmed my heart. And Aylee is beautiful and tiny and sweet, and loves to be held. Three weeks early, she's catching up with her growth and development. She's back up to 7 pounds, and is now one month old. Daughter Nicole and hubby Holiday visited as well, and have since celebrated one year of marriage.

WORDS FROM PASTOR JOHN

Dear Friends,

I am writing this on the eve of the pilgrimage to Alabama. 23 persons will visit several important sites of the Civil Rights Movement. We will visit the 16th Street Baptist Church in

Birmingham where a white supremacist bombed the church killing: Addie Mae Collins (14), Cynthia Wesley (14), Carole Robertson (14), and Carol Denise McNair (11). We will walk across the Edmund Pettus Bridge where Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., John Lewis (before he became a member of Congress) and many others made their way from Selma to Montgomery to press for the right to vote. We will remember and honor the victims of lynch mobs at the Legacy Museum and the National Memorial for Peace and Justice. Oh, no doubt we will have lighter moments of fellowship. However, I am expecting a high degree of discomfort as I confront my complicity of our American history shaped by racism, segregation and Jim Crow.

We have to do this to become the "Beloved Community". It is far more than simply a "kum ba yah" sense of simply getting along. Being formed by God into the "Beloved Community" is facing uncomfortable things, seeing the discomfort as a sign post for grace. To claim our discomfort and really go deep with it is the way to transformation. The result of transformation is joy! Real deep joy! Too often we want what is comfortable. I confess this is one of my deepest struggles: I like comfort. I don't want to be bothered. I like my routine. Please do not agitate me. Deanne will tell you that a comfortable chair, a good game on the TV, something good to drink and nobody bugging me is my "default" position. This is TRUE!

And there is nothing wrong in finding that "place of quiet rest near to the heart of God!" But God is calling me and calling us into a time of transformational and holy change. We need to trust each, go deep with each other, forgive each other, laugh, eat, and play! We will make some mistakes but "creativity is not neat!" This is such an exciting time to be alive, can't you feel it? Let's get uncomfortable together by telling our deepest truths. Let's celebrate our differences and then become united as the beloved community of God!



"Imagine if we taught baseball the way we teach science. Until they were twelve, children would read about baseball technique and history, and occasionally hear inspirational stories of the great baseball players. This year for Pathways (Grades 1-5) we are experimenting with producing a Podcast. The big idea is to offer a Bible lesson, connect it to a modern theme, and then ask guiding questions of the children. We produce the "story" and the children do the theology.

The ultimate hope is to bring new young voices to the realm of theology, and for our kids to feel they are producing something themselves rather than simply learning about the theology of others. Jesus stated to adults attempting to ignore the voices of children: "Truly I tell you, whoever does not receive the Kingdom of God as a child will never enter it." (Mark 10:15)

NEWS FROM GCC

On September 29, 2019, the Greater Cleveland Congregations' (GCC) Core Teams of FHC and South Euclid United Church of Christ jointly sponsored a revealing presentation on mental health treatment in the Cleveland area. GCC leader and retired social worker, Marcia Levine, gave a detailed history of mental health care from ancient times to the present. GCC leader and Criminal Justice Team Coordinator, Donna Weinberger, reminded attendees that in county jails, nearly 40% of inmates suffer from mental illness.

Today, many individuals who lack family or community support become jobless and homeless, often accompanied by addiction and other chronic problems. Without any central place or coordinated agency to deal with persons who act out during a mental health crisis, they generally end up in

jail. It's estimated that 1/3 to 1/2 of jail inmates shouldn't be there, but if released they soon come back because there is nowhere to go that will help address the reasons for their arrest. Even if the person is able to report to an emergency room, many ER personnel are not adequately trained to handle mental health crises, and/or don't have a psychiatric ward or space available, therefore end up calling the police.

Jails are the worst place to deal with mentally ill or addicted persons: too much stimulation and poor-to-no training of jail staff. The Cuyahoga County Jail's beating of a mentally ill prisoner serves as a horrifying example of the problem, and a sharp spur to action.

Two years ago, as a result of negotiations following GCC's campaign challenging funding the Q renovations, GCC called for building two mental health crisis centers for Cuyahoga County. Especially with the opioid epidemic, the need now is even greater. Such a center would be open 24/7, provide a drop-off site for both police and family members of patients, and provide short-term stay with follow-up services. GCC and its member congregations are continuing to press this issue and build legal, political and financial support to make this urgent need a reality. The Gund Foundation has pledged funding support and Care Source (insurance provider) and local hospital systems are providing cooperation and support. We will keep FHC apprised of future progress and actions on this important issue.

Exploring the Racial Equity Buddy Concept Sunday November 10,

With the arrival of the pirate ship "White Lion" in Jamestown VA, in August of 1619, slavery based on skin color was introduced into America. Shortly thereafter, any number of racist theories were introduced to justify this inhumane practice. The intractable problem of racism has haunted this country ever since. With the fervent attempt to address this problem's manifestation in our time and place, Forest Hill Church is

embracing and implementing various programs and policies toward its becoming an image of the Beloved Community.

One of the many programs FHC has sponsored as we move toward eradicating racism within our midst and our surrounding community was a presentation in June 2018 by Dr. Mark Joseph entitled "From Awareness to Vigilance: Ideas about a Path to Achieving Racial Equity and Inclusion." Dr. Joseph, a friend, who worships with us fairly often, is also a leading scholar and nationally recognized expert in 'urban equity and inclusion.' In his 90 minute presentation he proposed a number of practices to help us move toward racial equity. One proposal, in particular, resonated with the Black Caucus - - namely forming personal partnerships of "racial equity buddies."

Indeed, Dr. Joseph's concept of racial equity buddies stirred us and other members of the congregation to act immediately and a few informal racial equity buddies pairs were formed. Members of the Caucus have been in constant contact with Dr. Joseph and have shared our experiences of our journey utilizing his racial equity buddies concept. Some "buddies" have been meeting for more than a year and report that the journey is rich, rewarding, demanding and fruitful in many unanticipated ways. The trust and vigilance demonstrated has deepened the personal friendship among the "buddies."

Working with Dr. Joseph, we have planned a workshop to explore and encourage the expansion of formations of racial equity buddies throughout the church. Please plan to join us after service on Sunday, November 10, in Bodwell Hall to explore and hopefully expand racial equity buddies throughout FHC. All who are interested, intrigued, already involved, or simply curious about the concept are welcome and encouraged to attend. We are all on a journey toward racial equity. This workshop will help you move forward, whether you are just beginning or have been on this journey for decades or are somewhere in between those two points.

Table facilitators, who will help lead a reflective conversation based on Mark Joseph's work, are required. If you are interested in assisting, there will be a short training (where we will share handouts and conversation prompts to assist facilitators) on November 3 after service; location to be announced.

Racial equity buddy defined:

- -A racial equity buddy is a trusted companion on your personal racial equity journey toward greater awareness and vigilance
- -With a racial equity buddy, the personal journey to greater racial equity awareness and vigilance will have more focus, more consistency and more fulfillment. Don't go it alone!
