WORDS FROM PASTOR VERONICA

Biblical scholar, Walt Brueggemann writes,

"Whether we are liberal or conservative
Christians, we must confess that the central
problem of our lives is that we are torn apart
by the conflict between our attraction to the
good news of God's abundance and the power of our belief in
scarcity...We spend our lives trying to sort out that ambiguity. ("The
liturgy of abundance, the myth of scarcity," religion-online."
Org/showarticle.asp?title=533.).

In biblical times, in Jewish culture, people hid what was most valuable to them in obscure places, concealed and tucked away in seemingly worthless jars of clay, while inside gold, pearls, diamonds, and precious jewels could be found. This common practice serves to illumine the gospel story of the feeding of the 5,000, recorded in John 6:1-13.

Historically, this story has been told from the perspective that Jesus supernaturally multiplied the fish and loaves. And while I love a good miracle story, the author doesn't actually say that. John does say that there was a great need— 5,000 hungry men, plus women and children, (not included in the count), and that they were all fed, beginning with 2 little fish and 5 barely loaves, a young boy's lunch.

John also tells us that when Jesus had compassion on and conveyed his intention to feed the crowd, the disciples thought he'd lost his mind. Indeed, this is a miracle story, but it's one that transcends the supernatural. This gospel story marks a shift in orientation, a conversion from fear to trust.

Because one little boy offered to Jesus his modest lunch, lovingly packed for him by his mother, a miracle commenced. Jesus offered the fish and loaves to God in prayer, and passed them to the people—they mysteriously multiply, instead of running out. Then, moved by the love and compassion of Jesus, and encouraged by the generosity of a little boy, the fear of scarcity gave way to loving generosity as bread hidden garments was given in love and trust. Thus, Jesus' prayer unlocked the vaults of fearful hearts, and their offerings joined an emerging miracle. Later, when Jesus told the disciples to gather up the leftovers, they took up 12 baskets full of fragments—God's abundance.

Jesus could well have pulled out of thin air food sufficient to feed a multitude, but the far reaching miracle in this story is that in the safety and security of God's abundant love, all gathered were changed by generosity, and took part in a miracle of God's love and abundance. In changing hearts, Jesus fed a multitude, and they in turn fed each other.

"Generosity in Hardship" invites us to trust in the good news of God's abundance amid the pervasive messages of scarcity, and also nudges us all to claim our place in God's unfolding miracle through Forest Hill Church. In faith and trust in our God of abundance, let us strive for 100% participation in giving.

WORDS FROM PASTOR JOHN

During this election cycle I have been thinking a lot about Christians, what makes us tick, what do we believe; what is really foundational to our faith. We hear about liberal and conservative Christians, right wing, left wing, Evangelical and Progressive. It can be a real turn off!

This fall a small group has been reading <u>The Heart of Christianity:</u> <u>Rediscovering a Life of Faith</u> by Professor Marcus J. Borg. I think everyone in the group is being challenged and enlightened by this book and by each other's wisdom.

Some of the questions Borg asks are these: What does "faith" mean? How do you read the Bible? What do Christians believe about God? Why and how is Jesus central to our religion?

In the chapter "God: The Heart of Reality" Borg writes about the "character of God." He summarizes that there are two main ways of "imagining God's character". Either God is a God of requirements and rewards; or, God is a God of love and justice. Both of these attempts to describe God (who is actually indescribable) can be found in the Bible. Typically, Christians emphasize one or the other of the characteristics.

Borg writes, and I think he is correct, that our belief in unconditional grace makes a God of requirements and rewards ultimately suspect. He believes; "the notion that salvation is primarily about 'going to heaven' is a distortion." And then Borg writes these two brief paragraphs which I think are rich and helpful.

"The Christian life is not about believing or doing what we need to believe or do so that we can be saved. Rather, it's about seeing what is already true – that God loves us already – and then beginning to live in this relationship. It is about becoming conscious of and intentional about a deepening relationship with God."

Borg ends his chapter on God with these wonderful words: "What's at stake in the question of God's character is our image of the Christian life. Is Christianity about requirements? Here's what you must do to be saved. Or is Christianity about relationship and transformation? Here's the path: follow it. Both involve imperatives, but one is a threat, the other an invitation."

I invite you to follow in the footsteps of Jesus who shows us the heart of God which is love!

Even in these difficult days we are not alone. Be of good cheer. God bless you!



TWO-PRONGED EARTH CARE MESSAGE



By the time you read this, many if not most or all of you have probably already voted. But maybe you haven't got around to it yet. You shouldn't need to be reminded of what's at stake regarding the decisions we make as to who is going to be our governing fellow citizens. Decisions made—or not made—by them regarding how we tackle dealing with climate change has crucial impacts on our

national---and international earth. Combatting pollution, gaining greater clean air and water, lessening our dependence on fossil fuels and increasing our usage of green energy, stopping unnecessary deforestation, maintaining biodiversity, and achieving far more equity for our own and other peoples of the world are absolutely necessary to leave our succeeding generations with the better world which God intends for us. VOTE YOUR CONSCIENCE ACCORDINGLY!

On a more personal level, as we enter into the coming winter season once again, here are a few simple reminders of what we can do within our homes to achieve better Earth Care:

- Provide food the birds, and habitat for backyard wildlife.
- Insulate windows to conserve heat and maintain better energy efficiency.
- Close off unused rooms and electrical outlets to conserve heat
- Wear warmer clothing and layer, to lower the thermostat.
- Shut off external water pipes to prevent freezing and thawing which might result in flooding. ---Since re-usable plastic bags are banned in Cuyahoga County, collect the "disposable" bags and recycle them to your local grocer or other recycle depository.
- Continue to recycle aluminum beverage cans. Creating newuse aluminum by recycling takes only 5% of the energy required to smelt new aluminum.
- Avoid purchase of food in plastic containers as much as possible. While some plastics are recyclable, most are not economical.
