

WORDS FROM PASTOR VERONICA

Reflections



The joy of returning to in-person worship in time for Lent, for the first time since 2019, was palpable. And while there's so much planning and coordination involved in bringing a vision to fruition, what greater joy than to see its unfolding exceed expectations.

With the festive celebration of Palm Sunday, chocked full of joyful music and singing, prayer, and a powerful message by Pastor John, our souls soared high with praise, but shifted as the weight of the cross was carried through the sanctuary and out into the public square – a witness to Christ's redeeming love.

On Maundy Thursday we gathered around a common meal, and shared the Lord's Supper. Then, we followed Jesus into the sanctuary, transformed into a garden of prayer. There we formed our tears as we wrestled over weighty issues as did our Lord; like him, in the garden we found peace and resolution. Our time concluded as we crowded at the foot of the cross to entrust our tears, and those of the world, to God.

Good Friday was an intimate gathering of prayer and reflection on Jesus' Seven last words on the cross. Blessed by the music ministry of Ying and guest violinist, Guillermo, here too we wrestled with the implications of Jesus' words for our lives and time, and brought our deep concerns into our circle of prayer.

On Easter Sunday an intergenerational crowd gathered early before worship, outside the sanctuary doors, saying, "We've come to worship God!" It was a feast for the eyes. Indeed, the doors were opened, and we boldly entered the church to the Chancel Choir loudly and joyfully ringing the bells. This energy remained throughout the Easter

celebration as the Holy Spirit flooded God's House through instruments, singing, liturgy, prayers and preaching. Worship concluded with "The Hallelujah Chorus."

I give thanks to God for leading us in these ways, and for the power of imagination and memory. My thanks to our stellar staff: to Ying, for your visionary leadership and direction of the choir and music program, and for your integration of instruments; to Ann Donkin, for creating a sanctuary-sized cross for Maundy Thursday--beautifully done; to Antoinette, who juggled multiple bulletins and produced graphic visions for each service; to Amy, who made Lent and Easter fun and meaningful for families, youth and children of the congregation – the ministry is flourishing under your care; to Ann, Amy, and John, for your partnership in transforming the sanctuary for Maundy Thursday (you may have a future in set design); to the Stream Team for your adaptability in accommodating diverse worship experiences; to the Deacons for coordinating and hosting the soup supper; to Worship for preparing the elements and lighting the way to the sanctuary; and to our Ushers and Church Growth for your sincere expressions of welcome and hospitality.

And to my friend and colleague, John, thank you for partnership and for sharing a love of daring worship throughout Lent, Holy Week and Faster.

Note: We are in the liturgical season of Easter until Pentecost Sunday, June 5.

Dear Friends,



Yesterday Deanne and I were heading to the ballpark to see the Cleveland Guardians play the San Francisco Giants. We passed a man with a sign warning of the approaching judgement of hellfire and brimstone. This person was clearly moved by his

message and committed to it. It cannot be easy standing in the midst of a passing crowd telling everyone they are going to hell.

Today is Easter. I am listening to the trumpeters practice the Easter hymns of joy and hope and resurrection. I wish the man with the sign would come to church and hear GOOD NEWS! The Good News is not about judgement as punishment – hellfire and brimstone. The Good News is about the judgement as reconciliation, restoration, and repair.

It gives me good hope that Jews, Christians and Muslims are all celebrating their defining moments of their origin stories at the same time this year. Passover, Easter, Ramadan: God is revealed as liberator and savior from oppression; God is revealed as triumphant over death; God is revealed in word and in deed through the prophet.

As a Christian I believe all of the expressions of faith. God is still liberating. Death does not have the final word. God is still speaking. If only we would listen. If only we would liberate. If only we would live in a manner consistent with this belief! It is up to you and to me.

I know there is a longing for God to act to bring peace in Ukraine, countries around the world and in our cities, homes and hearts. But I think God is waiting for us to take up the divine mantle of our call. We must offer our best to living out the narratives of faith: Good News! Be blessed this Easter!

May: The Month of the Garden

I'm a wayward gardener — I sometimes do a great job, often not. I suppose that's the uber metaphor for being a Christian. It's also, however, a metaphor for being a member of any community, a congregation in particular. Gardens are neat, messy, disciplined, chaotic, and everything in between. In all gardens, though, things grow.

Some gardeners plan very far ahead. The seed catalogs arrive in December. They pore over them and consider their capacity. They make decisions and order supplies. It's sort of like the autumn pledging season — making budgets, deciding on donation amounts, setting up auto-deductions.

Other gardeners take a more seasonal approach.
The pansies go in about now. Then, the petunias.
They see what the year brings and what seems



appropriate. It's like the folks who give several times throughout the year, which fits well with their income flow, budget, and lives. Still other gardeners go for the big bang. They have a spectacular magnolia tree or grow the best tomatoes in the neighborhood. Their African violets bring joy to everyone who visits and sees the balcony window. These are the yearly givers — the ones who wait until year end, or perhaps bonus season, to decide what makes sense for their giving.

And, perhaps most importantly, there are the gardeners who help all sorts of ways, financial and otherwise. They're the ones who show up on your doorstep with a saw and lemonade when they see that the magnolia lost a branch. They leave a zucchini with each neighbor. They help at the community garden, teaching children what radishes look like and which insects help pollinate plants. These are the volunteers, the members of ministries, the pantry workers, the myriad people who keep the church community strong with contributions of time, talents, and tenacity.

I know I've stretched this metaphor too far already, but you get the idea. It's all vitally important. WE ALL are vitally important. Without any one of us, the garden is a lesser place, the growing less robust. I wonder if, as we wander out into the newly arrived warm weather, we might think a bit about how we contribute, what we steward, what kind of gardener each of us is, and may we all celebrate the abundance that we make together.

NOMINATING COMMITTEE

Looking ahead to 2023, the Nominating Committee asks you: Have you thought about volunteering your time and talents but were unsure of where you might want to step in?

Serving in a ministry is a wonderful opportunity to connect with other members and contribute towards our mission of building the beloved community. The time commitment is generally one meeting per month (except for Elders who also meet once a month separately, as they comprise the session of the church) and as you can see, each ministry has a specialized focus.

The ask is for a three-year commitment to ensure continuity as the terms are staggered to have new people coming on as other individuals rotate off. While meetings over the past year have all been via zoom, as we return to in-person we are looking to keep that as an option for individuals who may not be comfortable driving at night or live at a distance that could make in-person evening meetings difficult.

Elders and Deacons must be members and are looked to as spiritual leaders of the congregation. Members or frequent visitors are encouraged to round out the balance of leaders on the various ministries.

Terms begin February 2023.

DEACONS care for our congregation, provide fellowship and hospitality, reach out to absent members, and maintain our membership rolls. Deacons generally have a heart for the well-being of others, and are welcoming, caring, organized, and/or creative.

ADULT EDUCATION & SPIRITUAL FORMATION includes helping to organize the Sunday morning educational offerings and other adult education programs, coaching members to discover and develop their gifts and discover their calling, and facilitating the formation of small groups.

FAMILY, YOUTH & CHILDREN supports the FY&C Director and is organized by age groups--from infants through high school and their parents or guardians-- so you can choose the age group you prefer. "Gifts, Skills and Passions" can include being imaginative or creative; passionate about the spiritual and intellectual development of children and/or youth, and teaching, playing games, and planning activities.

JUSTICE AND MISSION serves local and global missions, serves and advocates for marginalized persons, and distributes community grants. This can be a good fit for those with a passion for social justice and prophetic action; a heart for the poor, the outcast, and those in need.

STEWARDSHIP conducts the annual stewardship campaign and supports sustainable living and earth stewardship. Creativity, knowledge of budgeting and money, marketing, goal setting, relationship building, and/ or environmental awareness are useful in this ministry.

TRUSTEES are responsible for church administration; building, equipment and grounds; budget and finances; and the business of the church as a corporation. A variety of different skills can be helpful: knowledge of finances and spreadsheets, personnel management, understanding of buildings and grounds and maintenance needs, organizational skills, ability to oversee projects to completion, shared vision for enhancing the beauty and functionality of the church, ability to work well as a team, dependable, and committed to our mission.

WORSHIP is responsible for communion set-up, sanctuary upkeep, flowers, ushers, lay readers, dynamic leadership for liturgical seasons, worship styles, and envisioning aesthetic components in our worship space. Gifts, Skills and Passions can include love of worship, creativity or imagination, or artistic skill.

CHURCH GROWTH includes publicizing the work of our church to the greater community, welcoming visitors, offering Exploring Membership classes, and welcoming and affirming new members. Those open to meeting new people; possessing advertising, marketing, or technical skills; the ability to relate to different age groups; and/or a desire to make others feel welcome are good candidates for this ministry.

NOMINATING discerns and nominates Elders and Elected Leaders. Gifts, Skills and Passions can include spiritual gift discernment, ability to ask others to accept calls to leadership, patient, compassionate, dedicated to finding the right person for the right position.
