

Our first annual **Gingerbread House Event** in December was so much fun! Ninety-seven people, (ages 9 months to 75yrs!) filled Fellowship Hall with joyful conversation, laughter, and lots of creativity. The decorated gingerbread houses were FABULOUS!

On behalf of the Family, Youth and Children's ministry, thank you to everyone who attended and contributed to this event, which benefited Family Promise of Greater Cleveland. Thanks to your generosity, we will donate over \$1,000 to Family Promise, supporting their programs and temporary shelter for families facing homelessness in our city.

amily outreach included a weekly Children's Welcome in worship presented by Amy Wheatley and communication to every family including weekly emails, birthday card greetings, suggestions for faith-at-home activities, and special seasonal mailings, such as Advent Calendars.

ingerbread House Event - 100 people of all ages gathered to decorate houses and enjoy fun and fellowship. The event raised over \$1,000 for Family Promise of Greater Cleveland's work with families facing homelessness.

Dear GCC Colleagues:

The feedback from participants and media who attended our December 6th hearing on youth bindover has been overwhelmingly positive.

Going forward, we are inviting your involvement with our Bindover Team in this important work to reform the abuse of discretionary bindover in Cuyahoga County.

We have scheduled a meeting of our Bindover Team on Thursday, January 12th at 7 PM via Zoom. We hope that you can join us and help build on the considerable momentum we have garnered from the public hearing.




